AROUND THE COUNTY



ARTHUR BARLEMANN, JR. COUNTY AGENT

Persons who listen to the VOICE OF SOUTHWEST AG-RICULTURE on the radio have heard Roddy Peeples urge consumers to call the toll-free number, 800-424-3510 each Wednesday between the hours of 6:00 and 10:00 P.M. This is a service provided by the Agricultural Council of America in Washington, D.C. and is an effort to give the consumer the agricultural producers' side of the food and fiber cost story.

During the annual meeting of the National Association of County Agricultural Agents in Milwaukee in October we had the opportunity to hear a talk by Allan Paul who is the executive director of the Council. He gave some of the background of the organization and the thinking behind this service.

The phones at the toll free number are manned each week by agricultural productes-lives stock producers, grain producers, vegetable and fruit producers, feedlot operators, and others associated with production on the grassroots level. Mr. Paul said that on the Wednesday night preceding his talk, the phones had been in constant use until well past midnight with thousands of calls. He said that on that particular night, they got a phone call from the telephone company in Kansas City wanting to know what was going on and that their switching system there was completely blocked by the

He said that many of the consumers calling often were certain that agricultural producers were getting rich from the prices they were getting for their products. The producers on the line then pointed out what their production costs were, their labor problems, what they were receiving for their produce, and that this was just a small part of the consumer's cost.

By the time the two parties had discussed the situation, the consumer was aware of the fact that the producer really gets a small percentage of what the shelf price of food is. He said that in many instances the consumer calling, who in the beginning was often irate and knew that the man on the land was getting rich, had changed their viewpoint and ended up saying-Golly, Ithought that the man who raised that calf that produced that roast I paid \$1.48 a pound for got more than 30c a pound when he sold it.

We forget that millions of the consumers in the congested cities have no agricultural beckground. They know only what they read, hear on the radio, or see on televsion and this is deepndent on those telling it. Maybe more calls to 800-424-3510 and other producer groups are needed to tell the other side of the story.

Two more cases of screwworms were confirmed in Sterling County in the last week. Both were in the navels of calves. One was on the L.R. Stringer Ranch at Broome and the other on some of H.L. Hildebrand's country

southewest of town. There will be more worm cases even though the temperature did drop to 20 last week-a few of the tough flies will survive. Keep checking your stock and sending in the samples.



Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million peopleeligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

A SPECIAL NOTICE TO SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME RECIPIENTS



In order to qualify as a Cer-tified Bovine Brucellosis-Free Area all herds of cattle must be tested and found negative or at latest ten per cent of all breeding cattle in the county two years of age and older must be blood tested each year when shipped to market or at time of slauhter with follow-up testing of herd of origin of all reactors disclosed.

Notice of Intent to Engage in Weather Modification Activities

Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District, 400 East 24th Street, Big Spring, Texas 79720, who holds License No. 76-5 of the State of Texas, issued December 18, 1974, and renewed September 1, 1975, intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of atmospheric cloud forms for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P. O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79720, and will conduct the program of weather modification designed to increase precipitation by means of the aerial application of silver iodide or other artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over, or within which, equipment may be operated shall include the counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Martin, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Glasscock, Sterling and Coke.

2. The target area, within which the precipitation is intende to be enhanced, can be described as follows:

The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring. Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa, thence northnortheast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence east along the north border of Dawson, Borden and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence south-southeast to Maryneal; thence southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence southsouthwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

3. The materials, equipment and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 square miles include a 3cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.

4. The person in charge of this program shall be Owen H. lvie, Colorado River Municipal Water District, Big Spring, Texas

5. The program will be operational during the period from March 1st to November 30 due in the years 1976, 1977, 1978 and 1979.

6. Any persons who feel they may be affected in some adverse way by this program may file a complaint with the Texas Water Development Board, P. O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.



Increasing difficulty to confirm a diagnosis of rabies is being experienced with the submission of animal heads for rabies examination when shipment by air takes as long as four days between shipping date and receipt. If at all possible, we recommend to those who use the State Department of Health laboratory service in Austin, that they USE THE VARIOUS BUS COMPANIES. Pack the animal head in a leakproof plastic bag. Enclose a second leak-proof plastic bag filled with ice or use water frozen in plastic bottles. An outside container of sturdy construction (styrofoam serves nicely and is inexpensive) must be used. Also, use packing ma-terial to absorb water in the event of leakage. The box should be securely taped down and marked, KEEP UPRIGHT-PLEASE. A note to telephone the Health Department Laboratory (454-3781 Ext. 313) on arrival, should be prominently displayed.
