You can start absentee voting for the May 1 Democratic Primary now. One can vote in the county clerk ofifce if they don't intend to be here on May 1.

One can vote in that primary for presidential delegates for 3 of the candidates-like Bentsen, Carter and Wallace. Or they can vote for uncommitted delegates. Say, Bentsen should win the largest number of delegates to the Democratic Convention. The delegates for Bentsen would have to cast their votes for him in the first two ballots. Then, if he just wasn't getting anywhere in the balloting for the nomination, they are free to vote for any candidate they choose. The same goes for Wallace or Carter.

We are building a new home and are going to rent our presnet house. We plan to leave the stove and refrigerator in the 'rent' house to better our chances of renting. How can we insure these appliances?

The rent property itself, should be covered by a standard Fire Policy specifically insuring the building. 
