## Flu Shots Here Next Week

**Tuesday - Wednesday at Hospital 4 to 7 p.m.**

The flu vaccine shots will be given at the local hospital on Tuesday and Wednesday of next week between the hours of 4 and 7 p.m., said Mrs. Joe Emery, administrator. The shots were to have been started last week, but a hold up statewide, made this latter date feasible. The shots are free.

Persons getting the shots will read the forms and sign consent papers before receiving them.

The vaccines cover two kinds of flu, both Swine and Victoria, it was said.

So, make a date with yourself for getting the shots here at the hospital next Tuesday or Wednesday afternoon (October 26 and 27.)

Persons 18 years old and up are eligible for the shots, it was said. There might be some exceptions in the age, if one's pediatrician or doctor deems it safe or necessary.

In fact, all persons under 18 must have a doctor's note and also get parental consent.

People 65 years or older and those with chronic medical problems, will get priority, said W.J. Swann, county health officer.

## Doe Permits

**DOE PERMITS TO BE ISSUED HERE NEXT WEEK**

Landowners may get doe permits here next Tuesday, Oct. 26 in the library at the courthouse. So said game warden Wayne Posey this week. He and Glenn Schneider of the Parks & Wildlife Department will be in charge of issuance.

They will be in the courthouse from 8 to 5 o'clock.

Doe permits will be issued for all parts of the county except that part north of 87 and west of 163, a sort of pie shape area of the county northwest of Sterling City. A map is on file at the courthouse showing the excepted area.

Four Sterling County 4-H Club members brought home a total of \$1534 in prize money from the State Fair of Texas Sheep shows. In addition to the cash, they brought home seven champion banners, six reserve champion rosettes, and four trophies.

The club members competing in the shows were Becky Hodges, Wesley Hodges, Delmar Radde, Jr. and Paula Radda. Rules of the State Fair permit the juniors to participate in the open shows as well as the junior shows on payment of double entry fees. Open shows are open to the world while competition in the junior shows is limited to Texas youngsters.

Wesley showed the reserve champion ram of the open Rambouillet Show, the reserve champion ewe of the Open Show, the champion ram of the Junior Rambouillet Show, and the reserve champion ewe. Becky exhibited the champion ewe in the Open Show, the reserve champion ram of the Junior Show, and the champion ewe of the Junior Show. Becky and Wesley tied for the trophy awarded the premier exhibitor of the Junior Rambouillet Show—a rare happenin. This award is based on the amount of prize money won in the junior show; it is given by the State Fair.

In the Open Delaine competition, Paula showed the champion ram; she also showed the same ram to the championship in the Junior Delaine Show. Delmar showed the champion ewe of the Open Delaine Show with the ewe winning the same honors in the Junior Show. He also entered the reserve champion ram of the Junior Show as well as the reserve champion ewe. Premier exhibitor honors in both the Open Delaine Show and the Junior Delaine Show went to Delmar. In addition to the State Fair trophies, he also won the trophy given the Premier Junior Delaine Exhibitor by the Texas Delaine Association.

Numerous other class placings were won by the four exhibitors in the two breeds competition.

Sterling County notched up two more confirmed cases of screwworms last week. Samples sent in from the Foster and Hilderand River Ranch and the R. T. Foster, Jr. Ranch on the Barnhart Road were both identified as screwworms according to the lab report received last week. Both were taken from calf navels; these are almost 'guaranteed' to be screwworms.

The low temperatures —26 degrees on Jim Hinshaw's official weather bureau thermometer Wednesday morning—will not help the screwworms. Even though the heavy frost and low temperature may put some of the screwworm flies on cold storage, livestock producers need to keep up their vigilance. A missed case of worms now could result in some fertile flies overwintering in sheltered areas and producing trouble next spring. Check your livestock carefully, take samples of worm cases, and send them to the Mission laboratory. Collection vials and mail-in tubes are available if you need them—get them at the county extension office or the feed store.

The low temperatures Wednesday morning could produce trouble where livestock are grazing fields with any of the hybrid sorghums or forage crops. These plants are especially prone to produce prussic acid poisoning, or hydrocyanic acid poisoning, after a freeze. The sugars in the plant undergo a change resulting in the poisons which act rapidly on livestock. It takes

very little of the affected forage to kill an animal when this happens.

Symptoms of hydrocyanic acid poisoning consist of rapid breathing, uneasiness, stupor, depression, convulsions, paralysis and death. The entire process may require only a few minutes or may last several hours. Treatment by a veterinarian may be successful but it must be done quickly.

Cattle having access to any of the sorghums or johnsongrass should be removed as soon as frost hits these plants. The plants themselves can be made into hay and usually the curing process removes the dangerous element. They may also be grazed if allowed to cure for two weeks with a lesser degree of risk. If turned in on affected fields, give some hay prior to turning in as the animals will not be hungry thereby cutting down on the danger.
