Mr. C. P. Fish, lately stationed on the overnment Signal Service in the island of t. Prul, 1,000 miles west of Sitka, in Alas-St. Psul, 1,000 miles west of Sitks, in Alaska, reports that over 100,000 fur seals are taken in a year from St. Paul and the neighboring island of St. George, by the Alaska Commercial Company, while the Russians, in their occupation, took but 30,000. The large quantity taken necessarily includes an immense number of males, and as these become diminished the females betake themselves to the Asiatic side. In a few years it is feared that the seal fishery will be almost destroyed in those islands, and it is in them that the seals of the Alaska region are chiefly captured. The Government granted to the company the right to kill 100,000 a year, but reserved the privilege of

It is an object with the company, Mr. Fish says, to discourage white immigration, in order that their operations may not be observed. The charter of the company forbids the importation of liquer, but it is nevertheless imported and sold to the natives. He was removed or resigned in 1876, and the present Treasury Agent is John M. Morton, son of Senntor Morton.

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

A barrel of copperas would weigh probably 300 pounds, and can be purchased at wholesale price at a cent and a half per pound. A couple of handfuls of copperas thrown into a bucket of water will soon dissolve, and it can then be used freely, and is a valuably dissolvent. it can then be used freely, and is a valuably disenfectant. The best plan is to fill a half-barrel or keg with water and suspend within it a moderate-sized basketfull of copperas. In this way it dissolves more rapidly than when thrown to the bottom of the wooden vessel, and thus a supply is always at hand ready for use.—Boston Courier.
