Local Courts Of Law **Business On Increase**

A number of filings on new cases and disposals of old ones have been made during the past two weeks in both Municipal and Justice, Courts. Judge Linda Huckaby reported a total of 28 fines paid and 26 new cases filed during the period from February 21 to March 5. Justice of the Peace Jack Bates said for the period from February 21 to March 5, he had a total of 32 cases filed and 47 cases disposed

In paid cases, speeding violations topped the list in Municipal Court with a total of seven, followed by running stop signs, with six

cases disposed of. Two cases each were disposed of for no drivers failure to appear, expired MVI, and two for checks. One case each was paid on the following violations: expired registration, exhibition of acceleration, failure to drive in single lane, backing without safety, violation of drivers license restrictions, violation of city ordinance and expired drivers license.

Four More File For School Board

At about 4 p.m. Tuesday, four additional candidates for the Muleshoe Independent School Board of Directors had filed for seats subject to the April 7, 1984 election.

Those candidates who filed on Tuesday included: Gene McGuire, incumbent; Butch Vandiver, Howard Watson and Dewey Moore, incumbent. Others who had previously filed included Ben Roming, incumbent and Sam Harlan.

The deadline for filing was set for Wednesday, March 7 when the school administration office closes at 5 p.m.

The additional candidates filing gives a total of six filed for the seats to be filled on the school board.

No other filings have been reported in City Councilman races; and only the two incumbents Ronnie Shafer and Paul Wilbanks have filed for re-election to those open seats. The filing deadline in City elections was also Wednesday, March 7.

The steer was bred and purchased at the Diamond Bar E Ranch in Thredford, Nebraska from Eatinger, which is the same ranch that has been selling calves to Bailey County youth for the past 8-9 years. The Diamond Bar E Ranch also sold the Res. Grand Champion calf of the Houston show in 1978 to Belinda Wheeler. Sharla Morrison's steer, which was the Grand Champion Steer of the Bailey County Junior Livestock Show brought a grand total premium of \$65,000. County Agent, Spencer Tanksley stated that there were about 40 steers per class in this breed, with a total of 1400 head overall.

Also winning a top honor was Jamie Wheeler, who copped Reserve Breed Champion Charolais with "Hawkeye", a 1135 pound middle weight steer. This steer also was Reserve Breed Champ at the San Antonio show this year. Jamie's steer sold at a premium of \$15 per pound, bringing in approximately \$17,000.

Tanklsey told the Journal that nine out of the 14 steers taken to Houston made the select sale for champions. Other county 4-H'ers who placed in the show included Chris Young, with a second place light weight Santa Gertrudis steer, Tanksley with a third place middle weight Brangus, Larry Robertson with fourth place light weight Charolais, Jeanine Robertson with a fourth place heavy weight Short Horn. Todd Bessire with a seventh place heavy weight Simmental. Jodie Wheeler also placed 14th with a heavy weight Simmental and Tracey Tunnell placed tenth with a heavy weight Brahman steer.





Jay Gleason who had a knee injury in 1983 may try to regain his form in the pole vault event, if injuries received in a recent accident do not keep him inactive. Jay is a hard worker and determined. He had also planned to do the weight events, but time will only

Missing most of the 83 season with an injury, Trent Hysinger has worked hard to strengthen his legs. He had an excellent football campaign and will run on the 400 meter relay where he already is ranked eighth, Wiseman stated.

Second leading scorer of the 83 season, with 112 points, Darin Shaw is the defending District Champ in the 200 meters with a 22.82, which also ranks fifth on the all time list. Wiseman expects Shaw to run a leg on, both relays this year and to return as the teams' best long jumper with a 21'6".

Junior letterman, Michael Del Toro has a best of 53.4 (relay split) in the 400 meters. Wiseman says that Del Toro is one of the strongest runners on this years squad and will lead off in the 1600 meter relay. He has a potential of running low 51's.

Rob Donaldson, also a junior, is a newcomer to this years team. Rob will specialize in the high jump, where 6' is definitely within his range. He will also throw the discus and Wiseman expects that he could be a real darkhorse in the district and could well move into the top

Current J.V. record holder in the shot put with a toss of 42', is Hector Flores, junior. "He has great quickness and leg strength, and if he can develop his upper body, should throw well over 45' as a junior contender," Coach Wiseman says.

Jerry Gleason, who came as one of the JV pole vaulters, should be able to be one of the top three vaulters this year. If he continues to improve, he should jump 11 foot or better said his coach.

One of the JV's top weight men last year, Chris Hernandez has improved a great deal over the summer says Wiseman; and could be one of Muleshoe's better throwers. His technique has improved along with his strength, and fans can look

for a throw of 135 feet. Big John Issac returns as the teams top high jumper. As a sophomore in the district meet, he sailed over six foot. "Don't be surprised if John clears 6'4" or better this season," Wiseman said. John is also working with the discus and could be a sleeper on this one.

Another newcomer to the cinders in 1984, Todd Jones is a very skilled athlete and will run the 110 meter high hurdles along with the 300 intermediate hurdles. Wiseman expects Jones to progress rapidly and be one of the school's top hurdlers in

Tony Luna placed third at the regional meet in 1983, narrowly missing a trip to the State meet. He improved on his school record in the 3200 to 9:53.6 and also ran a leg on the school record two-mile relay. For the second year in a row, Tony was the leading scorer on the team and a two time All-Stater in Cross Country.

A transfer from Colorado, Jeff McCarty, junior, should be able to help out in several events. He has good speed and will run on the 400 relay. McCarty will also run the hurdles and try the high and long jumps as well. Wiseman says 'McCarty could be a real 'hoss' this year."

"Mark Moton is one of the most versitile athletes on the squad," says Coach Wiseman. He can do many events and do them well. Moton returns as the top hurdler and is the reigning 2-AAA champ in the intermediate hurdles (40.32). Mark will anchor the 1600 relay and should break the 50 flat barrier, and has a best of 20'5" in the long

tion against erosion. The Soil Conservationist told the group that soil erosion would be stopped only when education on the subject and communications of the projects improved. Lutz also stated that a large majority of the wind erosion was in the South Plains - West







Students in grades 7-12 regularly and currently enrolled in public and non-public schools are eligible to enter the competition, Mrs. Dillard said. "Students graduating from high school before 1984 are ineligible. Only students under age 20 are eligible."

Mrs. Dillard stressed that all entries must be original. Work copied from published photographs or other art works will not be accepted.

Art classifications for the entries are: photography, textile design, graphic design, printmaking, mixed media, drawing (pencil, ink pastels, crayon or charcoal) and painting (oils, acrylics, and water colors).

Unemployed Increases End Of '83

Statewide actual unemployment rose slightly between November and December, with an additional 27,700 jobless in December. Total unemployment in mid-December was 549,200, and the actual umemployment rate was 7.1 percent compared to November's 6.8 percent. At the same time, employment also rose over the month, as 40,000 additional job-holders pushed the total to 7,191,800 -- once

again a record high. The seeming paradox of increases in both employment and unemployment occurred as more job-seekers entered the labor force in December than could be accommodated by the number of new jobs created over the month. Although the unemployment rate did climb moderately over the month, the current rate was still below the year-ago rate of 7.4 percent.

In the seasonally adjusted series, unemployment increased by 84,000 over the month, pushing the rate up a full percentage point, from 6.7 percent in November to 7.7 percent in December. The current seasonally adjusted rate was also lower than the 8.0 percent recorded in December 1982. The U.S. actual unemployment rate declined minimally, from 8.1 percent in November to 8.0 percent in December 1983.

Among the 26 major labor market areas, unemployment rose in 21 areas, while three areas had slightly lower rates and one was unchanged over the month. The 3.2 percent recorded by Bryan-College Station was the lowest rate in December, while Laredo once again recorded the highest, with 22.0 percent.



If you own a business as a proprietor or a partner, you may want ot consider incorp-

Your FICA taxes (social security contributions on self-employment income) for 1984 will be 11.3% of net self-employment income up to \$37,800. A maximum con-

tribution for a proprietor or partner to FICA will be \$4,271. It's possible to reduce the total contribution to FICA by incorporating and taking a salary of less than \$37,800. You must be able to justify your lower

An incorporated business which files a Sub-chapter S election pays no corporate income tax. The shareholders of a "Sub S"

corporation are taxed directly on their individual income tax return for all corporate profits. The shareholder pays income tax on wages from the corporation, as well as on profits in excess of those wages. Those profits in excess of wages, however, are not subject to self-employment taxes.

Suppose your company will have a net profit of \$40,000 in 1984. If you take \$20,000 as wages and the additional \$20,000 as dividends, your payroll taxes will be computed on only the \$20,000 of wages. The employer corporation has to match the employee FICA withholdings for a total in 1984 of 13.7%. In this example, the total FICA contribution would be \$2,740 for net savings of \$1,531 (\$4,271 minus \$2,740). If the company has more than one owner this savings would be multiplied accordingly. With the increase in self-employment taxes scheduled for 1985 and later years the savings will be even greater.

The savings in this example will be reduced somewhat by the requirement to pay "unemployment taxes" on your wages, as well as by the additional cost to operate
