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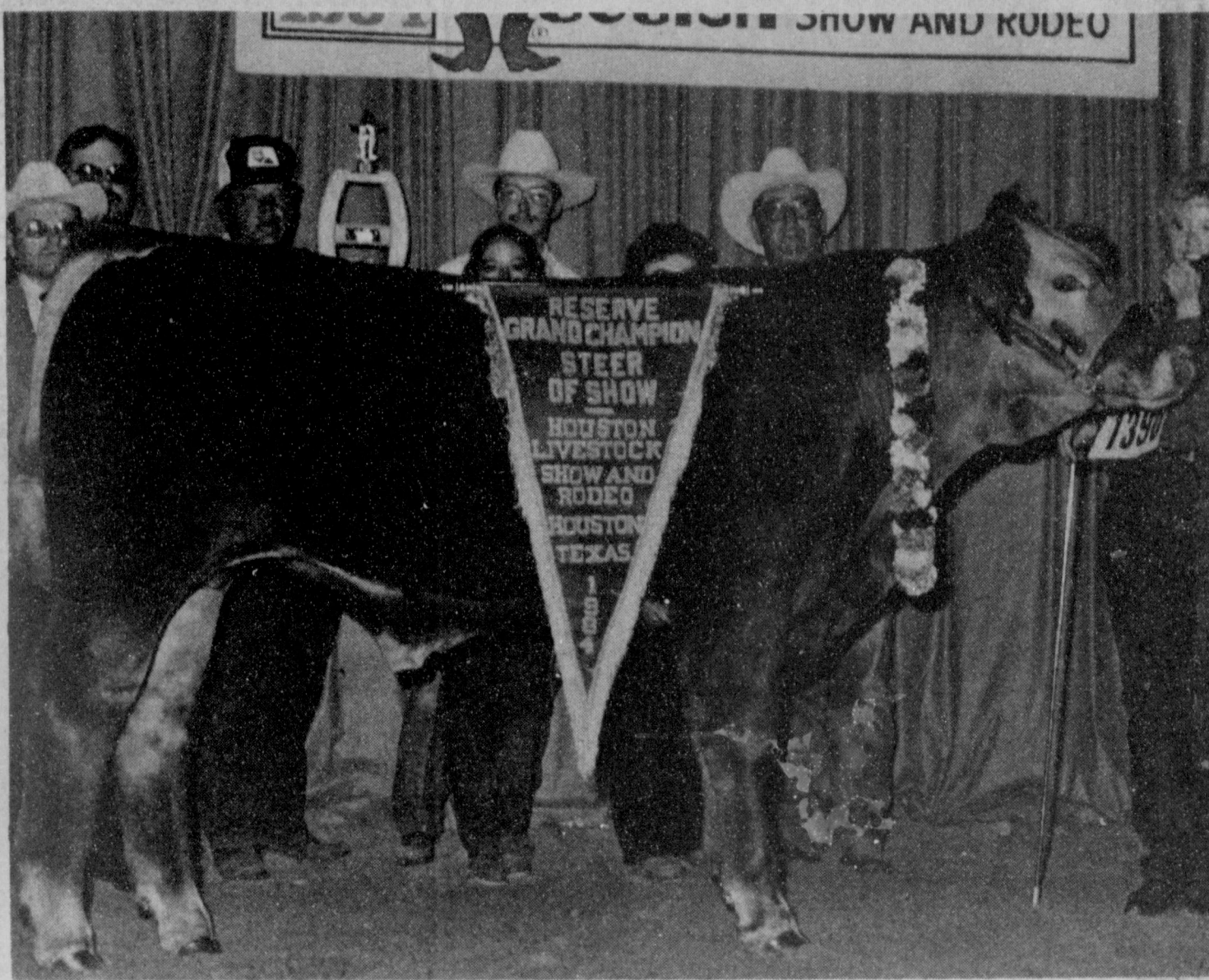

## '84 Edition Of Tracking-Mule Style Looking For Winning Season

Coach Kevin Wiseman has already begun to compile an impressive record once again in the annals of high school track, adding to several district championships, regional championships, and a state cross country championship. Some weeks ago, the Journal ran an article giving the top school record holders of track and field events in Muleshoe. Along with these are some district records. Wiseman looks for a good season this year, with

several returning lettermen and a lot of new potential in younger participants.

Varsity tracksters had eight open meets scheduled for 1984, having already won one of them. These meets are run in preparation of District, Regional and State Competition, for a total of 11 meets overall. District will be on April 17 in Abernathy, Regional will be in Odessa on May 4, 5, and State meets this year will be held on May 11-12 in Austin.

Wiseman has 24 men out for the track roster this year, with seven of them being seniors, 13 juniors, three sophomores and one freshman, and expects a winning team from the group. "Self-motivation is the key to track and field events," says Wiseman, "and if a man does not have that, then all the talent in the world will not help him." He believes in a strong mental program as well as a physical one, and stresses the importance of belief in one's self.

The following is a run-down on the 1984 track roster and their accomplishments and records, according to Coach Wiseman: Sen-

ior, Aldo Almanza is back for his final season and returns as one of the top scorers from the 1983 team. Aldo is a three time regional qualifier and is listed in the top ten in the 800, 1600, 3200, and 1600 meter relay. He is also a member of the Cross Country State Championship team. He is also a member of the two mile relay team which holds the school record.

Ranked fifth on the top ten list in the Discus with a personal best of 145'9" set at the Regional meet in Odessa in 1983, Cheyenne Bickel is another returning senior. Bickel has his sights set on the school record and should be one of the top throwers in the area this year, Wiseman says.

Thurman Coleman will anchor the 400 meter relay this year, along with running the 100 and 200. Running a "wind-aided" 10.82 in the 100 meter at Bovina last year, Coleman received a coveted Name Jersey. Wiseman stated that Coleman hoped to improve his standing on the top ten list in both sprints and will be after the school record in the 400R.

Another senior who will

be a double threat is Hector Garcia, who is a top contender in both the shot put and discus this year. Wise-

## Varsity Men Take Idalou Meet Honors

Muleshoe Boy's varsity track team traveled to Idalou on March 3 to take first place in that meet with a total of 90 points. Close behind was Idalou with 87/2/3 points, Kermit with 84 points, Frenship with 73, Littlefield with 60 and Floydada with 35 points. Placing second through sixth respectively.

Muleshoe's team in the 400 meter relay placed third with 44.87, with team members being Jeff McCarty, Darin Shaw, Trent Hysinger and Michael Del Toro.

In the 3200 meter run, Tony Luna placed first, David Medlin placed fifth, Tony Rojas placed sixth. In the 800 meter run, Ronnie Logsdon placed second, and Aldo Almanza placed third. Also running in this event, but not placing was Ralph Salazar.

Jeff McCarty placed sixth in the 110 high hurdles, being the only one of three competing here from Muleshoe. Mark Moton and Hector Garcia did not place. Darin Shaw placed first in the 100 meter dash. In the 400 meter dash, Muleshoe had Del Toro and Salazar competing, but had no placings.

Running in the 300 meter hurdles, Mark Moton placed second. Jeff McCarty also was in this event, but a fall caused him no placing in the event.

## Women Tracksters 'Pick Up The Pace'

Muleshoe girls track teams competed in a tournament of 2-3A schools at Plainview on Saturday, March 3 and came out winner with 132 1/2 points, beating out the second place team of Crosbyton by one point. Teams from eight different cities were competing in the meet. Third place was taken by Roosevelt with 86 1/2 points, fourth by Paducah with 76 points, fifth by Floydada with 75 1/2 points and Happy with 20 points taking sixth place. Other teams entered were from Silverton and Dimmitt.

To say the least, Coach Jerry Johnson was proud of his teams and has high hopes for them in upcoming district and regional events. Placing third in the Shot Put event was Kristin Wanner with 29'4". In the Discus, Meischelle Logsdon placed second with a throw of 85'7"; while Kristin Wanner placed sixth with a 73'7" toss.

In the High Jump, Debbie Isaac placed second with a 5' jump, setting a new school record; also, Teena Sisemore placed sixth in that event with a 4'4" jump. In the Long Jump, Brenda

Ellis placed fourth with a jump of 15'8 1/2".

Placing in the triple jump was Brenda Ellis with fourth and a 32' 1/2" jump and Penny Ford, fifth, with 30'7".

In the 3200 meter event, Muleshoe girls took three places. Juanita Garcia placed fourth with 13:34, Norma

## Reserve Champ Nets Local Girl \$65,000

Bailey County 4-H'ers made a "pretty good haul" at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo last week, coming back home with some real top honors under their belts. Sharla Morrison, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Morrison, won Reserve Grand Champion Steer of the Houston show with her 1145 pound Maine-Anjou steer, "Dillinger." Dillinger also placed first in the Middle Weight and Champion of

the Maine-Anjou Breed. The steer was bred and purchased at the Diamond Bar E Ranch in Thredford, Nebraska from Byron Eatinger, which is the same ranch that has been selling calves to Bailey County youth for the past 8-9 years. The Diamond Bar E Ranch also sold the Res. Grand Champion calf of the Houston show in 1978 to Belinda Wheeler. Sharla Morrison's steer, which was the Grand Champion Steer of the Bailey County Junior Livestock Show brought a grand total premium of \$65,000. County Agent, Spencer Tanksley stated that there were about 40 steers per class in this breed, with a total of 1400 head overall.

Also winning a top honor was Jamie Wheeler, who copped Reserve Breed Champion Charolais with "Hawkeye", a 1135 pound middle weight steer. This steer also was Reserve Breed Champ at the San Antonio show this year. Jamie's steer sold at a premium of \$15 per pound, bringing in approximately \$17,000.

Tanksley told the Journal that nine out of the 14 steers taken to Houston made the select sale for champions. Other county 4-H'ers who placed in the show included Chris Young, with a second place light weight Santa Gertrudis steer, Colin Tanksley with a third place middle weight Brangus, Larry Robertson with a fourth place light weight Charolais, Jeanine Robertson with a fourth place heavy weight Short Horn, Todd Bessire with a seventh place heavy weight Simmental, Jodie Wheeler also placed 14th with a heavy weight Simmental and Tracey Tunnell placed tenth with a heavy weight Brahman steer.

In the Calf Scramble Heifer Show, which is shown by breeds, two Muleshoe 4-H'ers placed well with their scramble calves won in 1982. Todd Bessire placed second in his division and Russell Brown placed third with the heifers they won last year.

Then, in the junior Heifer Show, Todd Bessire placed second with the same heifer in the Hereford Class and

## Local Courts Of Law Business On Increase

A number of filings on new cases and disposals of old ones have been made during the past two weeks in both Municipal and Justice Courts. Judge Linda Huckaby reported a total of 28 fines paid and 26 new cases filed during the period from February 21 to March 5. Justice of the Peace Jack Bates said for the period from February 21 to March 5, he had a total of 32 cases filed and 47 cases disposed of.

In paid cases, speeding violations topped the list in Municipal Court with a total of seven, followed by running stop signs, with six

cases disposed of. Two cases each were disposed of for no drivers license, failure to appear, expired MVI, and two for bad checks. One case each was paid on the following violations: expired registration, exhibition of acceleration, failure to drive in single lane, backing without safety, violation of drivers license restrictions, violation of city ordinance and expired drivers license.

New cases filed during the period in question in Municipal Court included seven for expired MVI and seven for speeding. Two

## Junior-Senior Extravaganza

### Theme 'Roaring Twenties'

The gala spirit and activities of the "Roaring Twenties" will be the theme for the 1984 Junior-Senior Extravaganza, Friday and Saturday, March 30 and 31, at West Texas State University.

The senior weekend is sponsored by the WTSU Student Foundation and chairperson Dean Tankersley, a senior computer information systems major from Ralls, said he expects about 200 high school juniors and seniors to participate.

"We decided to include high school juniors this time since most of them have already started making decisions on which college to attend, and this will just give them an earlier preview of college life," Tankersley said.

Last year a majority of the students who participated were from the five-state area of Oklahoma, Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico and Texas.

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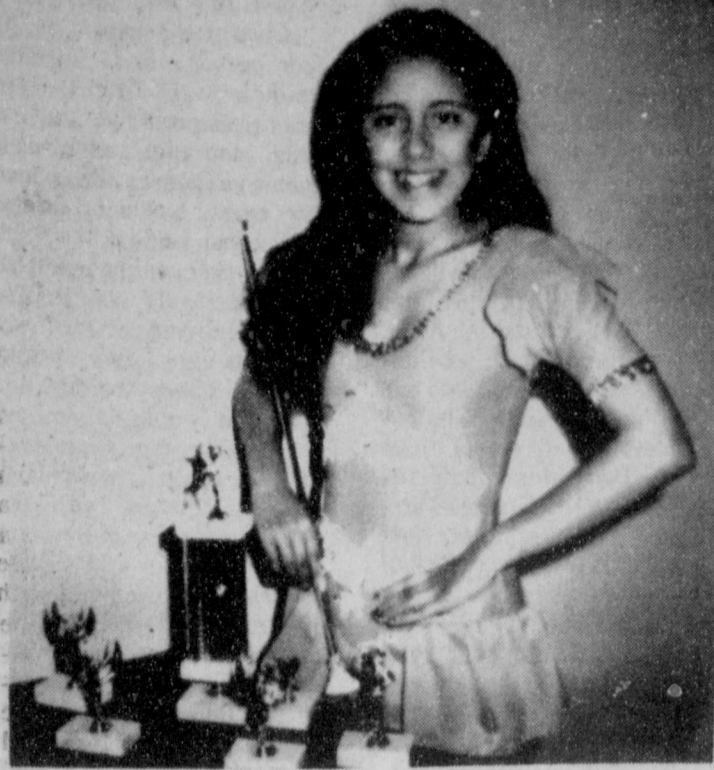

man says that Hector could very well break into the top ten in both events. He will run the 110 meter high hurdles where he could be a real surprise, the coach added.

Jay Gleason who had a knee injury in 1983 may try to regain his form in the pole vault event, if injuries received in a recent accident do not keep him inactive. Jay is a hard worker and determined. He had also planned to do the weight events, but time will only tell.

Missing most of the 83 season with an injury, Trent Hysinger has worked hard to strengthen his legs. He had an excellent football campaign and will run on the 400 meter relay where he already is ranked eighth, Wiseman stated.

Second leading scorer of the 83 season, with 112 points, Darin Shaw is the defending District Champ in the 200 meters with a 22.82, which also ranks fifth on the all time list. Wiseman expects Shaw to run a leg on, both relays this year and to return as the teams' best long jumper with a 21'6".

Junior letterman, Michael Del Toro has a best of 53.4 (relay split) in the 400 meters. Wiseman says that Del Toro is one of the strongest runners on this years squad and will lead off in the 1600 meter relay. He has a potential of running low 51's.

Rob Donaldson, also a junior, is a newcomer to this years team. Rob will specialize in the high jump, where 6' is definitely within his range. He will also throw the discus and Wiseman expects that he could be a real darkhorse in the district and could well move into the top ten.

Current J.V. record holder in the shot put with a toss of 42', is Hector Flores, junior. "He has great quickness and leg strength, and if he can develop his upper body, should throw well over 45' as a junior contender," Coach Wiseman says.

Jerry Gleason, who came on at the end of last season as one of the JV pole vaulters, should be able to be one of the top three vaulters this year. If he continues to improve, he should jump 11 foot or better said his coach.

One of the JV's top weight men last year, Chris Hernandez has improved a great deal over the summer says Wiseman; and could be one of Muleshoe's better throwers. His technique has improved along with his strength, and fans can look for a throw of 135 feet.

Big John Issac returns as the teams top high jumper. As a sophomore in the district meet, he sailed over six foot. "Don't be surprised if John clears 6'4" or better this season," Wiseman said. John is also working with the discus and could be a sleeper on this one.

Another newcomer to the cinders in 1984, Todd Jones is a very skilled athlete and will run the 110 meter high hurdles along with the 300 intermediate hurdles. Wiseman expects Jones to progress rapidly and be one of the school's top hurdlers in 1984.

Tony Luna placed third at the regional meet in 1983, narrowly missing a trip to the State meet. He improved on his school record in the 3200 to 9:53.6 and also ran a leg on the school record two-mile relay. For the second year in a row, Tony was the leading scorer on the team and a two time All-Stater in Cross Country.

A transfer from Colorado, Jeff McCarty, junior, should be able to help out in several events. He has good speed and will run on the 400 relay. McCarty will also run the hurdles and try the high and long jumps as well. Wiseman says that "McCarty could be a real 'hoss' this year."

"Mark Moton is one of the most versatile athletes on the squad," says Coach Wiseman. He can do many events and do them well. Moton returns as the top hurdler and is the reigning 2-AAA champ in the intermediate hurdles (40.32). Mark will anchor the 1600 relay and should break the 50 flat barrier, and has a best of 20'5" in the long jump.

Smiley Orozco is another junior who adds speed and endurance to the Mule squad in 1984. He will be called upon to provide depth in the relays and to run the 400 and 200. "If Smiley continues to work hard, his time should drop below 52

flat. Another fine distance runner, Tony Rojas, has had great success in Cross Country as well as on the track. Rojas is currently ranked fifth on the all-time list in the 3200 with a 10:38.7. He was a regional qualifier in 1983 and Wiseman expects him to be a much stronger competitor in '84.

Rounding out the juniors on the squad is Ray Vinson. Vinson was out most of last season with a broken thumb, but in 1982 placed third at the District meet in the pole vault event. Wiseman says that Vinson will improve this year to be one of the better vaulters and should soar over 11 foot or 11'6".

Three sophomores will help to round out the 84 Mule track squad. Ronnie Logsdon was a regional qualifier in the 1600m run in 1983 and is coming off of an excellent Cross Country Season. Wiseman stated that Logsdon was one of the toughest competitors around and would double in the 800 and 1600 and should run below 2:02 and 4:40.

Ricky Rasco, another soph, is currently school record holder in the indoor pole vault. He will probably be the top vaulter this season, according to Coach Wiseman. "If Ricky improves his strength, he could top the 12 foot barrier". As a sophomore, Rasco is already ranked tenth on the all-time list.

A fresh, new recruit out of physical ed this year is Ralph Salazar. Salazar has never run in a track meet, but Wiseman says just watching his workouts is encouraging. "He has a great attitude and will be tried in the 400 and 800 - A real sleeper," the coach added.

Finishing out the team is David Medlin, a freshman and the only one on varsity. Medlin ran extremely well in the Cross Country and will specialize in the 3200, where Wiseman feels he could move into the all-time list. He's a hard worker and shows a lot of promise, the coach said.

Amendments to the fiscal year, 1984 budget were made by the court, with Precinct One, operating expenses being increased to \$58 due to insurance on motor vehicles. approved increase of \$12,300 on Capital expenditures. Other amendments were made to the budget by adding additional funds to cover insurance on motor vehicles and for general liability insurance for various county departments.

and various other types of problems. They are acting as consultants and do not actually do the work.

Lutz explained some of the problems of soil conservation, the loss of top soils by wind and water erosion. Lutz also presented a film showing the results of lack of conservation practices. He stated that three major things caused the soil erosion problems: 1. improper use of ag chemicals; 2. owner-tenant relations which provide no time for proper conservation practices to be put into use, and 3. loss of agricultural lands to other projects, i.e.: the clearing of land for housing, buildings, and other man-made projects, leaving the land devoid of any natural protection against erosion.

The Soil Conservationist told the group that soil erosion would be stopped only when education on the subject and communications of the projects improved. Lutz also stated that a large majority of the wind erosion was in the South Plains - West Texas Area.

For every dollar the enlistee must also score in the top half on the entrance examination (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery), be entering the Army for the first time, and must enlist in one of some 70 skill training specialties which are critical to Army needs.

The Army College Fund is an enrichment to the Veteran's Education Assistance Program (VEAP), the follow-up to the GI Bill which was phased out in 1976.

To be eligible for the Army College Fund, the enlistee must take part in the VEAP and be a high school

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# Perot Challenged On Fines For Failure

A leader of the state's second-largest teachers' association has challenged H. Ross Perot's statement that parents could be fined if their children fail. Mike Morrow, executive director of the 37,000-member Association of Texas Professional Educators (ATPE), said that Perot's idea to fine parents for their children's failure to meet specific school objectives and perhaps to deny such students the right to attend public school, would turn Texas public education into a system for the privileged few.

"It appears that he has lost sight of the fact that children have differing educational needs and that public educators strive to teach each student to his or her fullest potential," Morrow said. According to an *Austin American-Statesman* report, Perot, chairman of the Governor's Select Committee on Public Education, suggested the fine for parents during an address to the Texas Association of Middle Schools on Thursday. Morrow added that the statement indicates Perot believes that the education of future generations is solely a parent's responsibility rather than society's commitment. "We've long maintained that a well-educated citizenry is the goal of every person," Morrow said. "ATPE has long supported the need for increased parental involvement in public education, but to fine

parents for not meeting educational objectives would signal to non-parents that their input is merely financial.

"Many school districts across the state already are having a difficult time passing school bond issues for needed improvements, the subliminal effect of Mr. Perot's idea would be to decrease public support of education."

Morrow also said that the idea leaves low-income Texans with few options and may cause more affluent parents to place their children in private schools.

"What if a parent is unable to pay the fine?" Morrow asked. "And furthermore, who is to evaluate whether a parent is meeting these objectives and who is to collect the fines?"

"The system of public education in this state is based on equal educational opportunity for all children. Are we to deny this right to some because they advance more slowly than the objectives demand or because their parents are not involved enough?"

Morrow said that ATPE has publicly supported the efforts of the Select Committee and will continue to do so. He added that Perot's latest statements "fortunately reflect only the with white, centered with one vote on the committee."

# School Art Contests Scheduled In March

In conjunction with the "Arts in March '84" Festival, the Plainview Chamber of Commerce Cultural Arts Council has announced deadlines for "The Texas Merge" junior high and high school art competition.

"Entries from all schools must be sent during the week of March 5 and received no later than 12 noon Saturday, March 10, to allow for the judging to begin at 2 p.m. in the PHS Cafeteria," said Terie Beth Dillard, coordinator. Artwork entered in the competition should be sent to her at the Plainview High School Art Department, 1501 Quincy, Plainview, Texas 79072.

Competition and exhibits with a Texas flavor will be on display March 18-31 at the Houston School, 12th and Houston Streets, in Plainview. "Cash awards starting at \$50, ribbons, certificates and prizes will be awarded at an award presentation reception at 2 p.m. Sunday, March 18th, at the Houston School," said Mrs. Dillard.

Professors from the Texas Tech University art department will serve as regional judges choosing awards in each category for each age group. The winners will be notified March 12-16 and must be present at the reception to receive the awards, according to Mrs. Dillard.

There are two groups for students based on school grade: Group I is for artists in grades 7, 8, or 9; Group II is for artists in grades 10, 11, or 12.

Students in grades 7-12 regularly and currently enrolled in public and non-public schools are eligible to enter the competition, Mrs. Dillard said. "Students graduating from high school before 1984 are ineligible. Only students under age 20 are eligible."

Mrs. Dillard stressed that all entries must be original. Work copied from published photographs or other art works will not be accepted.

Art classifications for the entries are: photography, textile design, graphic design, printmaking, mixed media, drawing (pencil, ink, pastels, crayon or charcoal) and painting (oils, acrylics, and water colors).

The Youth Art Council will be selling "Texas Merge" caps to earn money for awards for the public school contest.

# Taxpayers To Get All Refunds Due

State Comptroller Bob Bullock, Texas' chief tax collector, last year showed 87,000 Texas taxpayers he knows how to give money back as well as take it.

"These taxpayers shared in the \$64 million worth of refunds we paid out last year," Bullock said.

"We are going to collect every penny in taxes due the state," Bullock said, "but that is all we want. The taxpayer who sends us too much money is due a refund and it's only fair that we pay him the refund with as little hassle as it took him to pay us."

Beginning in 1982, Bullock said refunds of overpaid taxes have also carried interest payments at the same 10 percent rate the state charges on overdue taxes.

Taxpayers who overpay the state can choose to take a credit against their next tax return due the state or they can ask for a refund. Credits do not carry interest, but refunds do.

Interest on overpaid accounts begins to accrue 60 days after the due date for payment. "In 1983, my office paid taxpayers more than \$486,000 in interest on overpaid taxes. Most requests for refunds were processed in our office within 14 days. That's the way it should be. I want the taxpayer to deal with this office in a straightforward manner. And I want the taxpayer to know that we are going to give him a fair shake in return," Bullock said.

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## Financially Speaking

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If you own a business as a proprietor or a partner, you may want to consider incorporating.

Your FICA taxes (social security contributions on self-employment income) for 1984 will be 11.3% of net self-employment income up to \$37,800. A maximum contribution for a proprietor or partner to FICA will be \$4,271. It's possible to reduce the total contribution to FICA by incorporating and taking a salary of less than \$37,800. You must be able to justify your lower salary.

An incorporated business which files a Sub-chapter S election pays no corporate income tax. The shareholders of a "Sub S" corporation are taxed directly on their individual income tax return for all corporate profits. The shareholder pays income tax on wages from the corporation, as well as on profits in excess of those wages. Those profits in excess of wages, however, are not subject to self-employment taxes.

Suppose your company will have a net profit of \$40,000 in 1984. If you take \$20,000 as wages and the additional \$20,000 as dividends, your payroll taxes will be computed on only the \$20,000 of wages. The employer corporation has to match the employee FICA withholdings for a total in 1984 of 13.7%. In this example, the total FICA contribution would be \$2,740 for net savings of \$1,531 (\$4,271 minus \$2,740). If the company has more than one owner this savings would be multiplied accordingly. With the increase in self-employment taxes scheduled for 1985 and later years the savings will be even greater.

The savings in this example will be reduced somewhat by the requirement to pay "unemployment taxes" on your wages, as well as by the additional cost to operate as a corporation.

# Unemployed Increases End Of '83

Statewide actual unemployment rose slightly between November and December, with an additional 27,706 jobless in December. Total unemployment in mid-December was 549,200, and the actual unemployment rate was 7.1 percent compared to November's 6.8 percent. At the same time, employment also rose over the month, as 40,000 additional job-holders pushed the total to 7,191,800 -- once again a record high.

The seeming paradox of increases in both employment and unemployment occurred as more job-seekers entered the labor force in December than could be accommodated by the number of new jobs created over the month. Although the unemployment rate did climb moderately over the month, the current rate was still below the year-ago rate of 7.4 percent.

In the seasonally adjusted series, unemployment increased by 84,000 over the month, pushing the rate up a full percentage point, from 6.7 percent in November to 7.7 percent in December. The current seasonally adjusted rate was also lower than the 8.0 percent recorded in December 1982. The U.S. actual unemployment rate declined minimally, from 8.1 percent in November to 8.0 percent in December 1983.

Among the 26 major labor market areas, unemployment rose in 21 areas, while three areas had slightly lower rates and one was unchanged over the month. The 3.2 percent recorded by Bryan-College Station was the lowest rate in December, while Laredo once again recorded the highest, with 22.0 percent.

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
