

This is simply permitting the accused person to all or recline upon a bed upon which water is continually dropping. At the apprarance of sleep attendants, by means of bells, drums, fire, and other appliances, render repose impossible; the sufferor grows wild and disordered, his mind wanders and eventually he becomes a raving and oftentimes a bropless manise.

This (kamaboko) signifies "baked fish," and is a significant title for this mode of tortuse. A charcoal fire is made in a kole in the ground and covered with a grating. The accused is then bound, the backs of his legs and thighs are covered with a coating of mud or clay, and he is placed in a sitting posture on the grating. The fire is then stimulated, the clay dries, creeks, and is replaced, until the clay dries, cracks, and is replaced, until the continued heat causes it to near away the inflamed and burned flesh. This was consi-dered so horrible a practice that it was abol-ished in 1651.

This inhuman device equals in cruelty the mathed just described. A wooden horse with edged back is prepared, on which the necessed is placed in a nude state. Two executioners then seize the arms and feet and draw the sufferer down backward upon the wooden edge. A machine is also used for the purpose, by means of which sufficient force can be applied to dislocate every joint, and to inflet an agonizing death upon the unfortunate wretch subjected to the torture of the Mokuba.

In a cage of green bamboo the accused, bound hand and foot, is suspended, with head downward. This machine revolves slowly in a circle of charcoal fires, fanned into a flereeness by the executioners. As its name imports, this torture is simply the application of boiling oil to the person of the sufficer.
