**Direct Marketing Considerations**

Direct marketing by fruit and vegetable growers, in the form of roadside stands or "pick-your-own" operations, reduces packaging and labor costs and gives the grower personal contact with the buyer.

Successful direct marketing depends on several fac-

tors, says Gordon Powell, economist in fruit and vegetable marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The production area should be located near a major highway. It should have soda facilities, rest-rooms, and a separate entrance and exit. Adequate parking facilities are also essential to accommodate buyers.

Large buyers should be able to drive their cars close to the field, Powell says. However, limited volume buyers should park their cars and be transported to the field to avoid traffic congestion.

Someone should direct the consumer to the correct locations for harvesting, Powell adds, and someone should supervise harvesting.

Variety is important in a direct marketing operation, he points out. The consumer should be made aware of different varieties and how to recognize the maturity of each.

The grower should produce or sell only high quality produce, Powell says. Plantings should be staggered for continuous supplies.

From the standpoint of safety, children under 12 years old should not be allowed in the field. If they are allowed, they should stay at the end of the rows.

The checkout counter should be in an obvious place, says Powell. A grower may operate on the honor system, but a check-out supervisor is helpful during critical harvesting periods.

Charge a fair price, Powell adds. Prices should be posted and produce priced per box or pound.

Savings on packing and labor can be high for the grower and the consumer if the operation is managed properly.

**A New Concept In Handles**

Technology has brought American consumers microwave ovens, food processors and any number of labor-saving appliances. But one very simple change in the angle of handles on household equipment may do even more to change how we do our chores.

The idea of placing handles at a 19-degree angle -- or "Bennett's Bend" -- as it has been patented by its inventor, makes things easier to hold and use, says Texas A&M University

Agricultural Extension Service home economist Bonnie Piernot.

The main effect of a 19-degree angle handle is that it eliminates "ulnar deviation," or the bend of your wrist that occurs as you pick up or use a tool, she explains. "The Bend" allows you to keep your wrist straight.

To get an idea of this angle, says Piernot, make your hand into a fist, as though you were gripping a pot handle. Push a pencil into the space between the fingers and palm. With your fist palm-side down on a flat surface, the pencil will slope upward about 19 degrees

from horizontal. One cooking utensil manufacturer has already conducted consumer research on the new design, says Piernot. The research indicated that 91 percent of the women participating in the study recognized the benefits of the new handle angle.

Persons with lifting problems, including those with arthritis, the handicapped or the elderly, may find angled handles especially useful, she says.

Products currently available with a 19-degree angle handle include kitchen cutlery, pots and pans. Hammers, pens and even

softball bats with the bend handle are under development. Virtually all basic household equipment, including vacuum cleaners, mops and brooms may be affected by this development in the future, Piernot

says. Although the angled handle seems a little strange after years of using straight handles, it should provide better grip, control and balance for many household equipment items, notes the home economist.

**TRU-TEST PAINTS**  
**PAINTING HELP SPOKEN HERE.**

**By Uncle Bob**

Dear Uncle Bob:  
We painted our house 8 years ago and are thinking about repainting this year. The surface is starting to chalk -- or leave a powdery substance when you rub your hand over it. What steps should be taken prior to painting?

Dusty

Dear Dusty:  
Before any painting is started, the surface must be properly prepared. Remember the surface to be painted must be "Clean, Dry, Dull."  
"Clean" means that all dirt and chalk and loose or peeling paint must be removed. Chalk and dirt to be removed by washing with Tru-Test Siding Cleaner (XC-12) following directions on the label. Peeling paint to be removed by scrubbing or wire brushing. If any bare wood is exposed it should be primed with proper Tru-Test house paint primer. Any cracks or open joints between boards or around windows should be sealed with Tru-Test Caulk.  
"Dry" means the surface should be dry when painting and no rain predicted for the next 12 to 24 hours.

### ENMU Plans Celebration

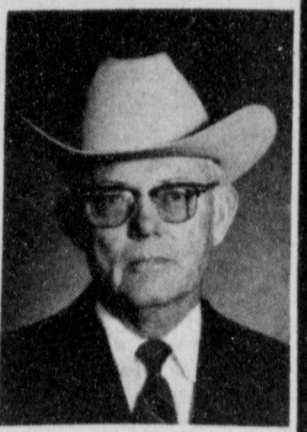

## Nacel Cultural Exchanges Needs Additional Families

Nacel Cultural Exchanges, a non-profit organization now in its fourth year in Texas and Arkansas, is seeking host families for 125 French students ages 13-19 in its annual exchange program July 1 - July 28. Interested families should contact Sue Kimbro, 2105 Wood Street, Texarkana, TX 75501 (214/ 794-8273).

"Families are especially needed for boys" said Mrs. Kimbro, who explained that most of the applications she has received are requests for girls and that 60 percent of the French students are boys. Students are matched to families according to preferences expressed by families and mutual interests.

For the past 27 years the purpose of Nacel has been to foster international understanding by arranging four week summer homestays in France and the United States. This July 5300 French students will experience our culture by living with American families at the same time that 1400 American students will be living with French families. Students from this summer's host families will be offered the opportunity to take part in the 1985 reciprocal French Homestay Program.

Already, 65 families in northern Texas and in

Arkansas have applied to host these French teens coming to our area; but 60 additional families are still needed to host. "Being part of a family is the best way to experience a country's culture and language" said Mrs. Kimbro, a high school French teacher, who has coordinated the Nacel Exchange for the past four years. "Hosting gives us a chance to show people the best of our country.... our families."

The French students, who have studied English 3-8 years, provide their own airfare, insurance, and spending money; and the American families provide the welcome and include them in their daily lives for the month of July.

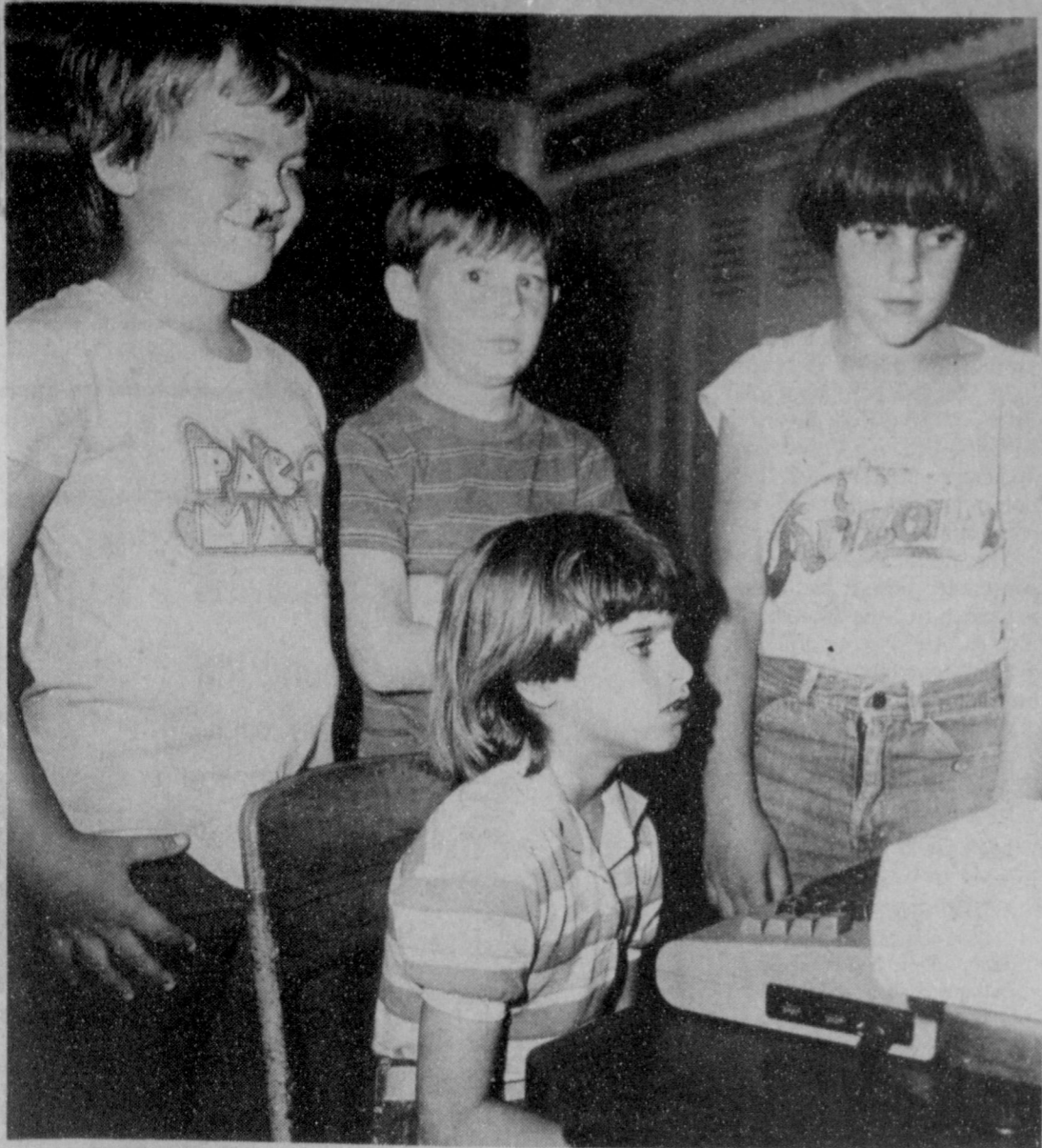

Popular Foods May Contain Fewer Calories, Nutrition Too

Some of those favorite casual summer meals like hamburgers, pizza, tacos, quiche and chef's salad, can be high in nutrients and lower in calories with just a few variations.

Perhaps because children and teenagers like them so much, many people think these dishes are "junk food" or somehow inferior to other kinds of meals, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Mary K. Sweeten.

But in fact these dishes may contain foods from each of the four basic food groups: protein foods like meat, poultry, fish, eggs and legumes; fruits and vegetables; dairy products; and breads and cereals, she says.

According to Sweeten, you can enhance the nutritional value and cut the calories of these popular foods by doing the following:

Add the nutrition of dairy products by making your hamburger a cheeseburger and serving tacos with cheese.

Include vegetables in these dishes by adding fresh green lettuce and a tomato slice to your cheeseburger. Serve tacos with shredded lettuce and tomatoes. Add a generous amount of mushrooms, sliced green pepper or other vegetables to pizza, and add spinach or broccoli to quiche.

Reduce calories from meat by starting with lean ground beef. Make sure you drain the fat from beef before preparing taco filling or using it on pizza.

Add protein to a chef's salad by including hard-cooked eggs, strips of cheese, lean ham, beef, chicken, or turkey, and croutons.

Reduce calories from dairy products by choosing a low-fat process cheese for tacos and cheeseburgers, and mozzarella cheese made

further if you'll accompany them with a glass of milk, says Sweeten. Again, to lower calories, you can select skim milk or buttermilk.

While the calories and nutrients will vary according to serving size and specific ingredients, these summer favorites can be good nutrition choices for the calories they provide, notes the nutritionist.

Use high-calorie condiments sparingly. Eliminate rich salad dressings and use commercially prepared reduced-calorie dressing or make your own with buttermilk and herbs or lemon juice and tomato juice.

The nutrition of these meals can be increased even

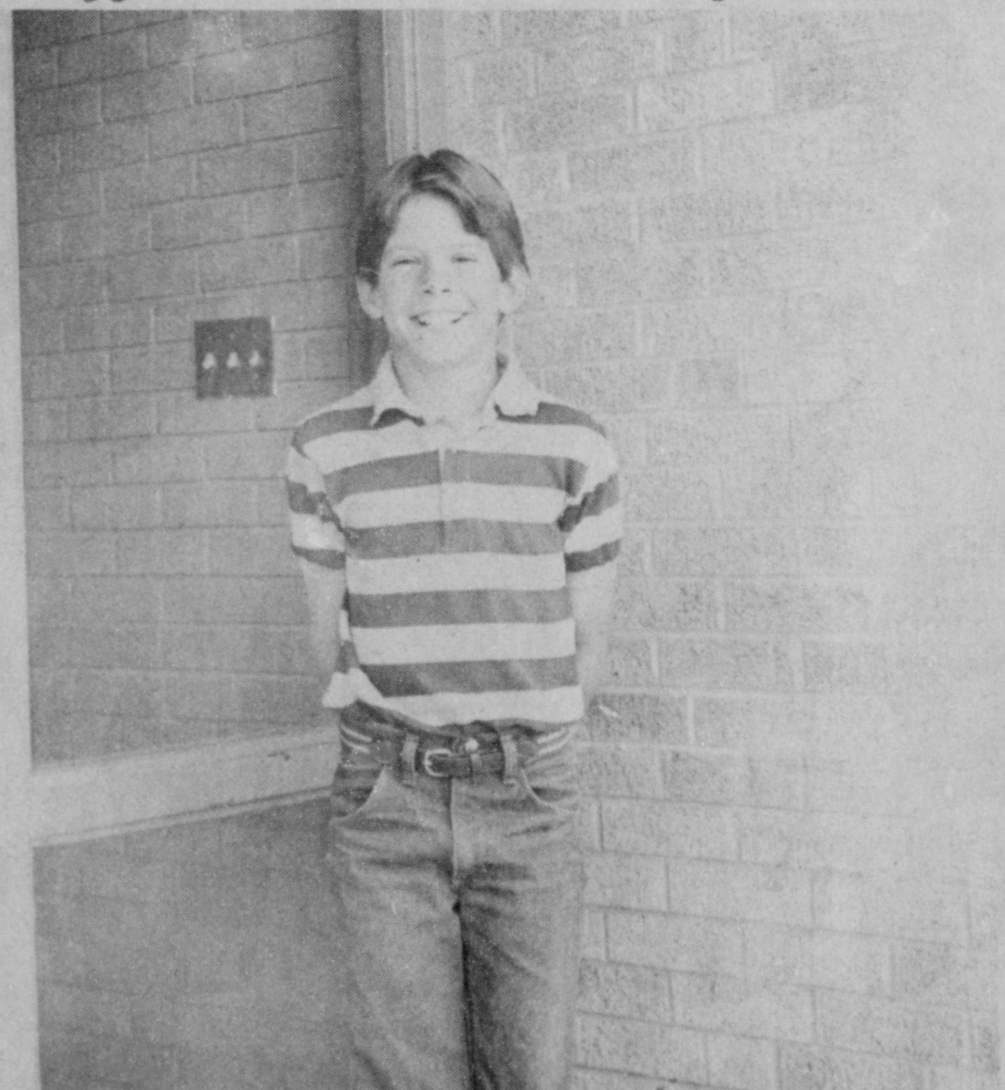

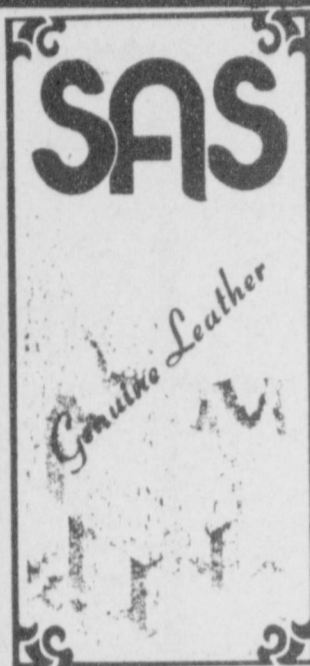

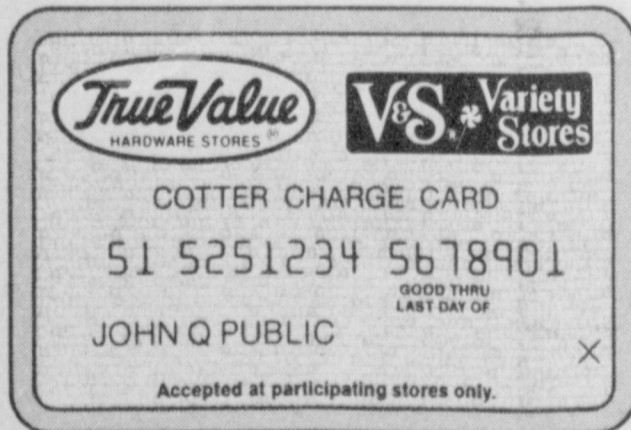
