Direct marketing by fruit and vegetable growers, in the form of roadside stands or "pick-your-own" operations, reduces packaging and labor costs and gives the grower personal contact with the buyer.

Someone should direct the consumer to the correct locations for harvesting. Powell adds, and someone should supervise harvesting. Variety is important in a direct marketing operation, he points out. The consumer should be made aware of different varieties and how to recognize the maturity of each.

The grower should produce or sell only high quality produce, Powell says. Plantings should be staggered for continuous supplies.

Technology has brought American consumers microwave ovens, food processors and any number labor-saving appliances. But one very simple change in the angle of handles on household equipment may do even more to change how we do our chores.

The idea of placing handles at a 19-degree angle --or "Bennett's Bend" -- as it has been patented by its inventor, makes things easier to hold and use, says University Texas A&M

Bonnie Piernot. The main effect of a 19-degree angle handle is that it eliminates "ulnar deviation," or the bend of your wrist that occurs as you pick up or use a tool, she explains. "The Bend" allows you to keep your wrist straight. To get an idea of this

Dear Uncle Bob:

We painted our house 8 years ago and are thinking about repainting this year. The surface is starting to chalk - or leave a powdery substance when you rub your hand over it. What steps should be taken prior to painting?

Before any painting is started, the surface must be properly prepared. Remember the surface to be painted must be "Clean, Dry, Dull."

"Clean" means that all dirt and chalk and loose or peeling paint must be removed. Chalk and dirt to be removed by washing with Tru-Test Siding Cleaner (XC-12) following directions on the label. Peeling paint to be removed by scrubbing or wire brushing. If any bare wood is exposed it should be primed with proper Tru-Test house paint primer. Any cracks or open joints between boards or around windows should be sealed with Tru-Test Caulk.

"Dry" means the surface should be dry when painting and no rain predicted for the next 12

Some of those favorite casual summer meals like hamburgers, pizza, tacos, quiche and chef's salad, can be high in nutrients and lower in calories with just a few variations.

Perhaps because children and teenagers like them so much, many people think these dishes are "junk food" or somehow inferior to other kinds of meals, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Mary K. Sweeten.

But in fact these dishes may contain foods from each of the four basic food groups: protein foods like meat, poultry, fish, eggs and legumes; fruits and vegetables; dairy products; and breads and cereals, she says.

According to Sweeten, you can enhance the nutritional value and cut the calories of these popular foods by doing the following:

been during the Korean or Vietnam wars. Because hose wars were not officially declared wars, the federalgovernment has determined that Korean veterans must have served at some point between June 27, 1950, and January 31, 1955, to be eligible under the program, and Vietnam veterans must have served at some time between August 5, 1964, and May 7, 1975. The veteran also must be currently umemployed or out of work for at least 15 of the last 20 weeks prior to applying for placement assistance under the program. Maximum training period for the veteran is nine months, though disabled veterans or those with serious employment handicaps may be trained for as long as 15 months. "Disability does

necessarily mean inability,' Lemons added, saying a disabled veteran could someone who had suffered a heart attack 10 years ago or someone who had diabetes. Employers who qualify under the program must have jobs available in a growth industry or one which requires new technological skills, or they must have a situation where there is a low number of trained workers for a certain position. Lemons noted that some employers might find these restrictions misleading.

"That sounds more limiting that it actually is," Lemons said. "In reality, vou can look at it as a fast-food restaurant. That's a growth industry."

Another example, Lemons said, would be a construction company. Just about any of the construction trades would qualify because the demand exceeds the supply for labor. Local Texas Employment Commission Offices can tell if your company or business falls into this category. Any new technological skills involving computers, lasers, microwave or nuclear energy would generally qualify for approval.

Those veterans or employers who are interested in the program should cortact a state veterans employment representative or call the Waco VA Regional Office toll-free number listed in your local telephone directory under "Veterans Administration" or "U.S. Government.'




