ARTESIAN WELLS Theory Preparatory to Practice.

Nev. Wm. Hedson in the Meric Ledger.

On last Saturday morning, in the editor's office, the subject of "Artesian Wells" was the topic of conversation. Capt. Fishburn and another intelligent gentleman were present. Then, I was chiefly a listener deeply interested; but made only a few remarks. Now, I respectfully continue the subject. Fisids press downwards, unwards, sidewise, and in every direction equality. If we have used an irregular glass vessel having several tubes of crooked shapes, and pour water through these tubes into the interior of the vessel, we shall see that the water will rise so high in all the tubes as to be on a precise level with a perfect horizon.

The boring has to be formed vertically down through one or more of the geological strats of the earth until it reaches a natural reservoir of—water, or a porous gravel-bed containing water, placed under such incumbent pressure as to cause the water to ascend to the surface or above it. Sometimes,

Sometimes, as soon as an upper stratum of rock or clay is perforated, in consequence of the hydrostatic presence upon the lower strata, the water rises so high as to overflow the surface in a constant stream, providing the level from which the great body of water proceeds is proportionably higher.

In limestone districts, where the rock, though absorbent, is naturally much broken, and where the material is readily acted on and dissolved by water, there are usually caverna or open spaces into which the water collects.

If a large quantity of pure water is desired, (and who does not desire it?) the boring must be continued not only through all small sreams of nauscous mineral water, until a main reservoir or large spring of good water is reservoir or large spring of good water is reservoir of the produced. If this internal reservoir of water has its source in the high-lands or hills not far distant, it is very probable that a continual fountain will be produced. Practically, the boring of an artesian well may cost one dollar per foot, including the tabing or curbing. 
