LATEST YELLOW FEVER NEWS.

The Fever Most Prevalent Among Negroes—Work of Infection Begun.

Six internments have been reported by the undertaker—Frank Cunningham, Mary Dinsell, Kate Forbes, Patrick Lige, Catherine Phillips and Amanda Nelson, the two last named colored.

An attempt is made to isolate Cholera, a southern suburb of Memphis. Hereafter the only cases will not be permitted to enter its limits. There is not a single case of fever within its boundaries.

With the elements of wealth thickly strewn on every hand the people of western Texas complain of hard times, of scarcity of money, of actual poverty, but do we ever stop to reason as to the cause? It is because we do not utilize our resources, do not display the proper energy, industry and economy, do not intelligently combine labor and capital.

With an enormous supply of raw hides, an excellent tannin in the mesquite tree on every hill and in every valley, and everything needed to successfully conduct a tannery and to manufacture the leather into goods, we buy our leather, nearly all our boots and shoes and nearly all our saddlery and harness ware in northern cities.

With a climate and soil especially adapted, with proper and intelligent effort, to the successful cultivation of peaches, pears, plums, cherries, strawberries, raspberries, blackberries, etc., we send some fortunes out of the country each year to purchase canned goods. And although we have the greatest country in the world, on the shelves of every grocery store and peasant or apple stand in the country are preserved goods brought from a distance.

With immense herds of cattle grazing on every head, living without cost maintenance to the owner from one year's end to the other, we bring our hauled and chosen from the north by the car load. And it would surprise any one not acquainted with the facts to learn the amount of milk—condensed milk—sold in western Texas, even to those who have thousands of cows in their herds.

The country abounds in forests, the fruit of which is worth a yearly average of \$1.50 per bushel, yet thousands upon thousands of bushels of these are eaten by the hogs every year, and thousands upon thousands of bushels are left to lie and rot under the trees.

Among the finest oyster reefs in the world are those along the coast of southwestern Texas—every bay and bayou is filled with the delicious delicacy—and we send fortunes annually to Baltimore for canned oysters.

It has been demonstrated that the wheat crops can be grown here, yet nearly every freight train coming to San Antonio brings large consignments of northern flour, which is distributed to almost every point in southwestern Texas.

Good crops are as near a certainty in western Texas as in any other section of the whole country. Train load after train load of corn is brought from the north every year.

We have within a few hours' drive of San Antonio, immense beds of the finest fire clay. All our pottery comes from abroad.

And then it occurs to nearly every citizen who sits down to nearly everything we use overseas down to a wooden rake or a hoe handle to be made by other people, and we have to pay heavy tribute to those and to the transportation companies for bringing the manufactured articles to us. Had not western Texas been blessed in many ways above other countries, this colossal drain would have destroyed her people long ago.

GERMAN INSTRUCTION. From what has been said and written in regard to the introduction of German instruction in our public schools, we take it that there is existing some misapprehension about the matter.

From what we can learn of those who have the matter in charge, it is not the intention to change the schools into German-English schools, but they are to remain, in connection with the genius of our civil institutions and laws, English schools, wherein German, as a language, is to be taught daily throughout the scholastic year.

As has been announced, German is commenced in the sixth grade, from which point the pupil will have six years of study and instruction, before he completes the common school course; and if he does not learn to read, write, and speak the German language in that time, he is to be dropped.

The method to be pursued in the introduction of German in our city schools is no experiment, for it is the same as pursued in the St. Louis, Chicago, Cincinnati and Cleveland schools. The method has been thoroughly tested and proved successful, not only in acquiring the command of another tongue, but also in promoting a broader culture in both speech and thought.

It would have been well if native teachers could have been secured to teach the German language, but as it is not an easy matter to find combined in the same person an equal facility to teach English as well as German, and as the lack of finances forbids the employment of a visiting German professor, the board did the best they could.

Native teachers are to be preferred generally, yet there is no reason why German may not be successfully taught by those who have acquired the language, for were this not so, all attempts to acquire a knowledge of Latin and Greek would be vain, since native teachers, in those tongues, have ceased to exist.

Distinguished Greek and Latin scholars have given reason to their age and country, although taught by those who had studied those languages as they did themselves.

Bishop Chastard is personally well known to the Pope and is very popular at the Vatican. He is a native of this country, a good master of French, and a most accomplished linguist.

It is a bitter opponent of the free public school system in the United States; a collector in aid of Archbishop Purcell will be taken up—in all the Catholic churches of the New York Diocese in October.

THE SOLDIERS AND SAILORS "RICKING." The republican congressional committee have felt called upon to issue an address in relation to an "important address to the soldiers and sailors of the union."
