Liquor sales, MAHD tax rate cap fail at the polls

The Muleshoe residents who turned out for the May election turned down the two questions on the ballot.

With the only candidates filing for local and area board positions being the incumbents, the May 9 election was quickly trimmed down to an "issues ballot," leaving the voters to decide whether the City of Muleshoe should be "wet," allowing the sell of alcohol for off-premises consumption; and Area Hospital District's be increased to 55 cents per \$100 valuation

It happens so quickly. One moment you're celebrating life, and the next you come to the reality that death is waiting just around the corner for you to make the wrong choice.

Students Muleshoe High School demonstrated how the wrong decisions about alcohol and drugs could have an eternal impact on a student's life, and the lives of the student's friends and family, as they portrayed the victims in a two-vehicle accident with injuries and fatalities on Wednesday, May 6.

This year's event included participation by local emergency services agencies, local businesses that could be expected to become involved in an actual fatality accident, and even medical transportation by AeroCare.

in this month's allocation race is Bovina with a 37.13 percent increase. However, even with this percentage increase, with year-to-date totals of \$35,383.45, Bovina falls far below the region's top sales tax revenue producers — Littlefield at \$328,517.82, Muleshoe at \$245,508.78, and Friona at \$139,456.38, in the total

revenue collected. Following Bovina in the monthly percentage increase was Friona which has a 4.05 percent increase and Littlefield which showed the least amount of drop in the remaining communities, a 1.47 percent decrease from the amount collected during the same period last year.

May's sales tax allocations to local governments represent March sales that were reported to the State Comptroller's office in April by monthly tax filers and January, February and March sales reported to the comptroller's office in April by quarterly tax filers.

According to Texas Comptroller Susan Combs, the state collected \$1.65 billion in sales tax revenue in April, down Continued on page 2



An Approaching Thunderstorm: When to Seek Safe Shelter: Lightning can strike as far as 10 miles from area where it is raining. That's about the distance you can hear thunder. If you can hear thunder, you are within striking distance. Seek safe shelter immediately.

Know the signs of a tornado: Weather forecasting science is not perfect and some tornadoes do occur without a tornado warning. There is no substitute for staying alert to the sky. Besides an obviously visible tornado, here are some

things to look and listen for:

- Strong, persistent rotation in the cloud base.
- Whirling dust or debris on the ground under a cloud base tornadoes sometimes have no funnel!
- Hail or heavy rain followed by either dead calm or a fast, intense wind shift. Many tornadoes are wrapped in heavy precipitation and can't be seen.
- Day or night Loud, continuous roar or rumble, which doesn't fade in a few seconds like thunder.
- Night Small, bright, blue-green to white flashes at ground level near a thunderstorm (as opposed to silvery lightning up in the clouds). These mean power lines are being snapped by very strong wind, maybe a tornado. • Night - Persistent lowering from the cloud base, illuminated or silhouetted by lightning — especially if it is on the ground or there is a blue-green-white power flash underneath.

Weather Advisory...

SEVERE THUNDERSTORM WATCH

Tells you when and where severe thunderstorms are more likely to occur. Watches are intended to heighten public awareness and should not be confused with warnings.

SEVERE THUNDERSTORM WARNING

Issued when severe weather has been reported by spotters or indicated by radar. Warnings indicate immediate danger to life and property to those in the path of a storm.

TORNADO WATCH

Tells you tornadoes are possible in your area. Remain alert for approaching storms. Watches are intended to heighten public awareness and should not be confused with warnings.

TORNADO WARNING

Issued when a tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. Warnings indicate immediate danger to life and property to those in the path of a storm.



What You Should Do...

- Watch the sky and listen to radio and television for further information. Remain alert for rapidly changing conditions.
- Sometimes which you live. Use a road map of your area to track storm path.
- If you can hear thunder, you are close enough to be struck by lightning. Take shelter inside sturdy structure.
- Go to safe shelter in a sturdy building.
- * Continue to listen to radio and television for further information. Postpone outdoor activities if thunderstorms are imminent.
- Tunplug appliances not necessary for obtaining weather information. Unplug air conditioners. Power surges from lightning can overload compressors.
- Avoid using telephone or appliances. Do not take a bath or shower. Use phone ONLY in an emergency.
- → LISTEN! Be aware of your Local Early Warning System.
- The Watch the sky and listen to radio and television for further information. Remain alert for rapidly changing conditions.
- * Know the area in which you live. Use a road map of your area to track storm path from weather bulletins. Remember: Tornadoes occasionally develop in areas in which a severe thunderstorm watch or warning is in effect.
- ★ LISTEN! Be aware of your Local Early Warning System.
- In a home or building, move to a pre-designated shelter, such as a basement.
- If an underground shelter is not available, move to an interior room or hallway on the lowest floor and get under a sturdy piece of furniture. Stay away from windows.
- Get out of automobiles. Do not try to outrun a tornado in your car. Instead, leave it immediately.
- Continue to listen to radio and television for further information.
- ◆ LISTEN! Be aware of your Local Early Warning System.






