



#### VENTILATION OF OUR HOMES. Matter of Importance Too Frequently

Neglected. Ventilation has arrived at the position of a science, but the simpler rules must be mastered before the home can be healthy. Air and sun-

shine are the two best purifiers, and

free access must be given to both,

says the Philadelphia Press. A house should be so furnished that free admission of the sunshine can be given without fear of injury to furni-

ture or carpets. There are various gases emanating from all animals, human beings included. These gases fill space, and if not driven out by ventilation are capable of causing death, and in a lesser degree of undermining the health. They are lighter than pure air, and are expelled by means of ventilation, giving room for the pure air to fill the space.

Simple ventilation means egress for foul air near the roof, and ingress for pure air near the floor of a room. All heated air is lighter than cold air, so it ascends, and the more rapidly it does so, the more rapidly it draws the cold air after it. The carbonic acid gas which is exhaled is heated air, as a child may discover by placing the hand over the mouth while breathing. The poisonous carbonic acid gas ascends at once, but it can be got rid of by means of ventilation; otherwise it remains, filling up space which the pure air should occupy. The simplest form of ventilation is to have the window open from two to four inches while the door is kept slightly open.



Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the town of Artesia, N. M. That five days from and after the passage and publication of this ordi-

nance, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or partnership, to open up, keep, run, manage or conduct, or cause to be opened up, kept, run, managed or conducted, any house or other place, within the limits of the town of Artesia, N. A Bit of Greenery.

A green, thrifty plant will make a lonely room seem more homelike. The potted ferns and palms which supply this touch of green during the winter months must be carefully tended.

In the first place they must have fresh air. They are very like human beings after all. Once a week the room in which they are standing should be thoroughly aired. Care must be taken not to chill the plants.

They must be kept moist. A fern allowed to dry out is never again worth a cent. It has lost its grip on life, and sooner or later will die. Don't keep the jardiniere filled with water. but keep the earth moist to the bottom of the jar.

Both palms and ferns have need of a weekly bath. If it is impossible to set the plants into a tub and give them a good showering, sponge off the leaves at least once a week. It keeps the leaves clean and glossy, drives off lice and nourishes the plant.
