## Weekly Crop Bulletin.

Santa Fe, N. M., May 8, 1905  
The temperature of the week averaged nearly 4 degrees daily below normal. Frost occurred on Wednesday and Thursday morning, light frosts reaching southward in the Pecos Valley to Roswell; little damage however, resulted. Light scattered showers and snow flurries occurred in the northern counties on Wednesday and Thursday, but elsewhere the week was dry. Moisture, nevertheless, is abundant, rivers and creeks are full and little or no irrigation is required.

The soil continues in excellent condition for plowing, seeding, planting and the growing of crops. Practically all available valley land is being brought under cultivation. The early sown small grain is growing finely.

In the southern valleys the first cutting of alfalfa is in progress and the plant is rapidly nearing cutting in all sections. Range grasses are growing well and cattle, horses, sheep and goats are generally in good condition, only northeast counties reporting adverse conditions, with poor range and losses of cattle and sheep.

Fruits continue very promising, apricots, peaches, cherries, plums, and early apples blooming and setting fruit abundantly, little or no warm apparently resulting from frost.

R. F. Crowley, of near Lake Arthur, and who has been advertising shepherd pups for sale, was called from his house last Sunday night about bed time by the continued barking of his old dog, the mother of the pups. He investigated and found she held a large mountain lion at bay, which he finally succeeded in killing with his pistol.

The city of Dallas, Texas, spent \$5,028 during the past six weeks to advertise itself. It was all spent for printers' ink and like bread cast upon the waters it is sure to bring returns, in fact, it has already commenced to bring returns, and \$30,000 more are to be spent this year for the same purpose, because the first \$5,000 have been already more than repaid.

**Starting Celery Seed.**

Celery is a crop that is to be transplanted. The seed must be started in a seed-bed and there cared for until they are large enough to be transplanted either into a temporary bed or to the field. Celery seed is very small, light, and quite slow to germinate, and for these reasons great precautions are necessary in starting the plants. Methods employed for starting cabbage, onion, or tomato seed would in most cases, prove failures with celery. Very few other vegetables require such careful and constant attention of the seed-bed, and, this is particularly true in this climate.

The seedlings, as they germinate are delicate and it takes a few days before they are strong enough to withstand any neglect of the seed-bed. During this time one must not forget to water the little plants regularly, or else the hot sun or drying winds are liable to cause many of the delicate seedlings to die.

The seed-bed should be well prepared. The soil, aside from being light and rich, should be perfectly fine on the surface. The seed should be planted as shallow as possible. Sometimes it is broadcast and thinly covered. While this way may give a good germination, if the seed-bed is properly taken care of, at this station we have had excellent results in the germination by the drill method. The seed is planted quite thick in drills about 3 to 4 inches apart and from 1/4 to 1/2 inch deep, and then covered very shallow with the lightest kind of soil. Immediately after the seed is planted the bed is watered. From this time on a careful management of the seed bed is necessary, remembering that the surface soil must not be allowed to become too dry and hard. To keep the soil from baking, it should be watered at regular intervals. The frequency of the watering of the seed bed will depend largely on whether it is exposed to our hot suns and

drying spring winds. If the seed-bed is open, it is advisable to have it in a place where it can be sprinkled every evening. While the ideal seed-bed is one that is open or unprotected, better results and with less care, can be had when some kind of a covering is used. Boards, straw mats, cloth, gunny sacks and glass can be used to prevent evaporating, and to keep the soil from baking.

Straw mats, cold-framed glazed ashes, gunny sacks and common cotton cloth have been used at the Station on the seed-bed. In each case the results in germination have been quite satisfactory, but the stand has been slightly more uniform from the beds covered with the cotton cloth. The beds covered with the glazed ashes usually bake more, and more frequent watering is also necessary. It has been found necessary to water such beds every two days, and when the days are very hot and windy, every day. Beds covered with cloth have been watered on an average of every three or four days.

In covering the beds with the different materials above mentioned, it is generally better to have the seed bed made in such a way that there will be a space, from three to six inches, between the covering and the soil. Beds made in the form of a cold-frame are very satisfactory. If lumber cannot be had, the border on the outside can be raised to the necessary height.

It is advisable in using cloth covers, to stretch the cloth over a light frame made from inch lumber. The frames can be made 3x6 feet or larger. Such cloth covered frames are easily handled and when placed over the seed bed the wind does not blow them around. As soon as the seedlings are well started the covering should be removed. If left too long, the plants tend to grow too tall and spindling. When the cloth is simply laid right on top of the ground as the little plants germinate, they strike the cloth and bend over to one side, and are liable to grow spindling.—Fabian Garcia, Agricultural Experiment Station, Mesilla Park, N. M.

**Municipal Ownership of Public Utilities.**

Mayor C. E. McConnell, of Durango, Colorado, who has visited Santa Fe several times in recent years, is not a Socialist, nor is he an Anarchist. He is rather a member of the class whom Colonel Bryan calls "bloated plutocrats." He is president of a bank, a railroad promoter and a capitalist. Yet, he believes in the municipal ownership of public utilities and advocates that Durango, which is not larger than Santa Fe, should furnish its own street lights, run its own water works, operate its own street railway and build its own sewers. He seeks a large revenue and better service in sight with municipal management of these public utilities, while under corporate management, these utilities yield no revenue to the city and the service is very poor. Mayor McConnell, who is a shrewd business man and not a visionary, believes that it will pay the city of Durango to buy the present water and light works and the street railway at a fair price and in the future to manage these for itself. When men of Mr. McConnell's standing and acumen take a view of this kind, it is well to look into the matter closely, even in New Mexico towns, which as a rule are ultra-conservative.—New Mexican.

Main street and Quay Ave., have been graded from end to end, men are now busy with scraper and plows grading Richardson and Grand avenues. Grading the streets certainly adds wonderfully to the beauty of the town and will enhance the value of all the property to an extent that will far exceed the amount of money required to do this work. Some, however, will complain, as long as the earth goes round and if it should stop they would complain.
