## ORGANIZE ASSOCIATION

Newspaper Men Meet at Roswell Wednesday and Organize the Pecos Valley Press Association—Will Take Trip Next Year—Attend Reception at Judge Pope's.

## ARTESIA GETS MEETING NEXT YEAR

Thirty devotees of newspaperdom met in the city of Roswell Wednesday and organized the Pecos Valley Press Association. Editors, special correspondents and other sorts of journalists and ex-journalists made up the bunch.

Will Robinson, editor of the Register-Tribune called the meeting to order; he was elected temporary chairman and J. M. Hall of the Elida News was elected temporary secretary.

A committee on permanent organization was appointed to report as soon as possible; a committee on bylaws and constitution was appointed to report at such time as may be convenient, submitting these documents to the members of the association by referendum; a third committee was appointed to recommend a name for the association. The last named committee was first to report, recommending the title Southeastern New Mexico Press Association. After some discussion this was changed to Pecos Valley Press Association. The territory will comprise all the towns east and south of the Rock Island Railroad in New Mexico and all of the Pecos Valley between Las Vegas and the Rio Grande river.

The report of the committee on permanent organization reported in favor of Will Robinson for chairman and James D. Whelan for secretary. These with J. M. Hall, W. H. Mullane and J. F. Newkirk, constitute the executive committee. Artesia was selected as the next place of meeting to be held during the annual alfalfa festival. It was determined to make a trip to the Grand Canyon next year. The following was the afternoon program:

At night the members accepted the cordial invitation of Judge W. H. Pope in behalf of Mrs. Pope and himself and attended a reception at the Pope home in a body. This was the most enjoyable social feature of the affair.

survey, schools opened Monday, September 2, with teachers all rested and ready to work. Many of the children present at the schools in the various parts of the valley, on the west by the upper

Sierra Blanca and the united mountains, which swathe in semicircular form from their north to the south, giving a watershed of 4,000 square miles which will furnish for all time water to irrigate the alfalfa belt, and also a large area where the water does not rise to the surface and where it can be pumped for irrigation purposes.

The winters are short and mild, the thermometer seldom dropping below 16 degrees above zero in winter nor rising above 96 degrees in summer. He says it was perfectly delightful to get into the bracing atmosphere of this valley after traveling through the melting heat of Nebraska and Kansas; and the nights were so cool covering was required to sleep comfortably.

With a soil unequalled in the world, a water supply inexhaustible and a perfect climate, it requires no effort of the imagination to see the future of this country.

Driving out from the town of Artesia, which lies back from the Pecos river five miles and by its elevation commands a sweeping view of the valley—the dozens of great, gushing wells sparkling like immense diamonds in the morning sunlight, the green fields of alfalfa, kaffir corn, milo maize, Indian corn, canteloupes and melons and dozens of other products, forming a carpet of green more beautiful than any that ever fell from the loom of the weaver, the orchards with their promise of golden fruit and the purple haze that veiled the mountain tops, made a picture

of southern California.

The editor of the first birth has traveled in southern California, which outrivals the portions of southern Italy, and it is in every way the most wonderfully developed and beautiful spot on the face of the earth. This lately discovered alfalfa belt country in the Pecos valley has added advantages to those of southern California. It is predicted by government experts and horticulturists that this Pecos belt is to soon become world-famed as the most wondrously and marvelously fertile spot on the globe. Government surveyors and experts who have visited the country have been amazed beyond expression at the inconceivable fertility of the deep, rich soil, and to see it is only to be convinced that it is to become a fruitland, flowerland and beautyland to out-variety and out-rival the most fertile valleys of southern California.

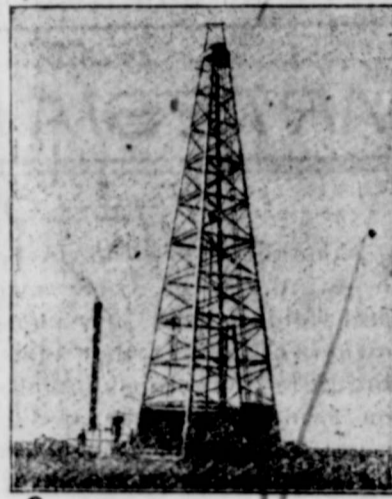

#### FATE OF A TALEBEARER

Even-Handed Justice Administered in Government Department.

There was a clerk who spat and a stenographer who told in the department of justice. The clerk spat by habit, and scorned the signs hanging around on the walls reminding him that it was not only unhealthful to expectorate on the floor, but was also forbidden by the rules of the district board of health. Also the clerk scorned the protests of the stenographer, who, being a nice man, one who does not eat tobacco and has no imperative need to spit, objected bitterly to the habit of his fellow servant.

At last, realizing that his protests were in vain, the stenographer told. But instead of telling his superiors in the department of justice, he wrote a formal letter to the tuberculosis commissioners of the district. Shocked that such a flagrant violation of the law could be going on unchecked in the department of justice, the tuberculosis commissioners descended in a body upon Attorney-General Bonaparte. They told on the stenographer who had told on the clerk who spat. Thereupon Mr. Bonaparte dispenses justice on the spot. He discharged the clerk who spat, in violation of the district law. And then, that justice might be even handed, he discharged the stenographer who told, not for telling, but for telling the wrong people.—N. Y. Times.

#### ICE AND ICES.

Though the ancient Greeks and Romans used ice for table purposes, they knew nothing of "ices." These were introduced into France from Italy about 1660, and known at first as "fromages glaces," iced cheeses, although they were made of strawberries, apricots and so forth, and contained not a drop of cream. From 1762 the use of "glaces" in the plural was sanctioned by the academy, but not before 1825 did "une glace" force its way into recognized acceptance. "Ices" are referred to from time to time in the eighteenth century in English people's letters from abroad. "Iced creams," however, were known as early as the year when William of Orange came over, and by the middle of the eighteenth century "ice cream" figured in cookery books.—Boston Budget.
