## February Rationing Reminders

Important dates on the ration calendar:

FEB. 15--Institutional users of sugar begin registration for the next two months. Deadline for the registration is Mar. 5.

FEB. 20--Last date for buying canned foods before "freeze" period.

FEB. 24--Registration starts for war ration book No. 2.

FEB. 28--Tire inspection deadline for holders of B and C gas coupon books.

MAR. 1--Rationing of canned and frozen fruits and vegetables, dried fruit, canned soups, canned baby foods begins.

MAR. 15--Deadline for use of sugar stamp No. 11 which becomes effective Feb. 1.

MAR. 21--No. 4 coupons in gasoline rationing books expire.

MAR. 31--Tire inspection deadline for holders of A gas coupon books.

## Mr. and Mrs. Roy Kendrick Receive Official Notice Of Son's Death

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Kendrick of Denton Valley, received official notice from the War Department Tuesday evening that their son, First Lieut. R. B. Kendrick, was killed in action in the South Pacific war theatre on December 26, 1942.

The first news of their sons death came Saturday, January 31st, when a letter written him by his parents was returned to them with the words "killed in action" written across the envelope. They at once enlisted aid of the Red Cross and representatives in Washington in quest of further information.

Lieutenant Kendrick had been in the Pacific war theatre as a pilot of a B-24 bomber since September 19, 1942. Last word his family had from him was a letter written Dec. 18 from New Guinea. His wife received a letter written Dec. 24 from Australia.

R. B. Kendrick was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Kendrick of Denton Valley, where he was born Dec. 19, 1917 and grew to young manhood there, loved and honored by all who knew him. He attended Clyde High School and after graduating there he attended A and M Abilene Christian College and McMurray Colleges.

Employed in the engineering division of the state highway department prior to volunteering for service Lieut. Kendrick had CAA training under H. R. Harwell at the Abilene airport and held an instructor's license. He received primary training at San Diego and basic at Gardner field in Taft, Calif. He completed his advanced instruction and was commissioned with honors at Victorville, Calif., April 24, 1942. After graduation, Lieutenant Kendrick asked for combat service, and was trained at Tucson, Ariz and at Barksdale field, Shreveport. There he was married to Anita Moak. The couple lived several months at Ann Arbor, Mich., before he was assigned to foreign service.

Lieutenant Kendrick is survived by his wife, who is reported ill at her home in Shreveport, his father and mother and two sisters, Mrs. Anthony Hunt of Abilene, and Miss Ouida Kendrick, student in McMurray College.

## Charles L. Ruhrup Died In Big Spring

Charles L. Ruhrup, 42, of Toyah died suddenly Saturday in Big Spring.

Mr. Ruhrup was the son of Chas. A. Ruhrup, deceased veteran T and P locomotive engineer, and Mrs. Annie Ruhrup of Toyah.

Chas. Ruhrup was a native of Big Spring He served in the army as a lieutenant until failing health necessitated his medical discharge last May. Since then he had been in the hospital much of the time but was preparing to retrain at the time he was stricken.

Funeral services were held at Big Spring Tuesday and burial made there. Deceased was a nephew of Mrs. Joe McGowen of Baird who with Mrs. Harry Ebert attended the funeral.

Survivors include his widow; his mother, Mrs. A. Ruhrup of Toyah; and two sisters, Mrs. Morris Johnson, Milwaukee, Wis., and Mrs. Jim Morris, El Paso.

## Renewal Of Gasoline B and C Ration Books

Motorists holding supplemental "B" and "C" gasoline rations may obtain renewals by mail rather than by appearing personally before the Callahan County War Price and Rationing Board, Ralph Ashlock, Chairman, announced today.

The simplified method for renewing rations for essential mileage will apply also for renewals for non-highway rations, such as gasoline-pumper farm equipment and industrial machinery.

This procedure is authorized under a new amendment to the mileage rationing regulations and became effective February 8th.

"Renewal application forms can be obtained from most filling stations."

This is a new form taking the place of the original renewal certificate, which was attached to the first application for a supplemental ration.

"On this for man applicant should re-state his driving needs for the next period. Then he should mail the application form, together with his tire inspection record, to the rationing board."

Each motorist obtained a tire inspection record from the local board at the time of registration for mileage rationing, when it began last December 1st.

While motorists must send this record to the board in applying for a renewal of "B" and "C" rations, they are not required to have their first tire inspection until the previously established deadline for "B" and "C" ration holders, on February 28. The board in considering an application will use the tire record in two ways. First, it will know that proper tire inspections have been made, and second, the board will write on the tire record the number identifying the new ration book. Thus the tire record in the future will be a record of both tire inspections and ration books issued to the holder.

Previously, the regulation required that the ration book number be written on the car registration card. This requirement precluded the possibility of handling renewal applications by mail, since most states require drivers to keep their registration cards with their cars at all times. This has now been avoided by the amendment directing that the tire inspection record be used for the notation, instead of the car registration.

When the board renews a ration, it may mail the coupons back to the applicant, and the tire inspection record will be sent back at the same time.

"The new plan simplifies the procedure for renewing supplemental rations" but it will not affect the policy of the board to exercise the utmost care in granting new or renewed rations. While the plan is designed to obviate the necessity for a personal appearance, the board may still upon the applicant to explain in person any mileage request that may not appear justified on the written application."

Employees in war plants with organized transportation committees, must have their applications for renewals certified by the plant transportation committee before they are mailed to the ration board.

Applicants for basis, special or transport rations must continue to apply directly to the board for coupon books, as previously.

All unused coupons must be returned to the board within five days from the date of expiration, which date shows on the front of the book. Gasoline dealers are urged to pay strict attention to the expiration date of the book, and to take care not to deliver gasoline to anyone on expired coupons.

Everyone who holds either the "B" or "C" books which expire soon are urged to send in their renewal applications as promptly as possible, as the board desires to get the books issued before the point rationing goes into effect.

May the observance of National 4-H Mobilization Week, February 6 to 14th, reach into every rural home. We have faith in your ability to render a great service in this way. We know that you, like your brothers and sisters in the Service, have the spirit and perseverance that will bring victory in the fight for human freedom and a world of peace.

**GROW A VICTORY GARDEN**

Vacant lots growing up in weeds or "laying out" are saboteurs this year. Every available spot of ground should be put to use in producing food for some family.

The main job of farm people in 1943 is the production of food and war crops. Town people can do their share of food production by growing as much of their own food as possible. Why? The town family needs food as well as any other. Some foods were hard to get in 1942. More will be hard to get in 1943. Much food will be rationed. The United States Government has already purchased over half the canned foods to be processed in 1943. Crowded transportation facilities will make it impossible to supply shipped-in fresh vegetables in quantities large enough to feed civilians.

The Axis strategy is to use starvation to beat conquered peoples into submission. The United Nation's strategy is to use food in building new power to throw against the Axis American-grown food for the hungry French of North Africa was a definite part of military strategy. Our own soldiers, sailors, marines, flyers industrial workers, and people must have food.

An abundance of food will help all people everywhere have mental and physical health and vigor, strength and energy to do their jobs high morale.

If you live in town, use your backyard or some space at the edge of the lawn, part of the flower beds, or a vacant lot nearby. Don't destroy established lawns and shrubs but fit food growing plans into the landscape.

If you live in the country, use as much space as possible and practical around houses and barns and in the fields for growing food for the family and for market.

Take care of what is started, for a garden planted and not cared for properly is precious seed wasted.

Suggestions for the varieties of seed to use and help in growing may be secured at your home demonstration agent's office in the court house.

Let's not have a single vacant lot or garden spot going to waste. If a vacant lot is too big for you to cultivate by yourself, get your neighbors interested in sharing it with you.

**4-H MEMBERS "MUSTS"**

4-H members, the nation over, have agreed on the following wartime 4-H "musts":

1. We must raise and conserve food needed for our Armed Forces, Allies and Civilians.
2. We must conserve essential materials and equipment.
3. We must participate in all wartime activities.
4. We must be ready for more rationing.
5. We must manage our money wisely and buy only what is absolutely necessary.
6. We must buy more war stamps and bonds.
7. We must carry on as never before if mother is needed to do farm work or is employed.
8. We must assume more farm labor responsibilities.
9. We must collect more scrap.
10. We must ask ourselves before

deciding what to do, "Will it contribute to winning the war?"

The 1943 home canning program will not be ready until sometime in March, but the Callahan County War Price and Rationing Board may accept applications and authorize sugar in reasonable amounts where the conservation of early strawberries requires prompt action. Ralph Ashlock, Chairman of the Callahan County Board, reported today "We believe that in most cases the new canning program will be announced in time to take care of the fruit crop in this section," Mr. Ashlock added.

He said the Board may accept home canning applications on Form R-315 and authorize sugar in reasonable amounts, using the ratio of one pound of sugar to four quarts of the finished product, as outlined in these sugar regulations.
