BOARDING DEPARTMENT

Is CO-OPERATIVE. that is, the students furnish the money as a common fund. It is spent in their interest alone. "They pay for nothing they do not get and get all they all they pay for." An exact account of expense is kept, and any money not spent is returned, prorata, to the students. To secure

MINIMUM OF COST

The products of the college land are passed, less the cost of production, to the credit of the students. Thus: If potatoes can be produced at 1 cent per lb., the student pays that price (1 ct. per 16.) If pork can be produced for 2 cts. per lb., it goes to the student at that price. And this rule is observed throughout. Thus good board will be cheap.

I will not make money from the Boarding Department of a school; and I shall do all in my power to reduce this. the largest expense, attending life at school. By this means it becomes possible for many to attend boarding school, who could not otherwise attend. It were folly to give 10 ct. or 15 ct. per lb. for meat or lard, if the goods of same quality can be had 50 per ct. cheaper. /Under our plan this can be done.

TUITION FEES

Belong to the teachers. | They do the teaching and for this, but for nothing else, they must be paid; and they must be well paid. Therefore the tuition fees must be liberal.

DOMESTIO HELP

Is an item that comes in Boarding Department, Good cooks command good wages. The students, of course, pay the wages. So of fuel, wear and tare of funiture, etc. But the school is to have he profit from this Department.

EXCHANGE OF VALUES

The teacher has values that the parent wants for his child, viz., school facilities,-Instruction, care, discipline, etc; and for these the parents are willing to pay money. It is often the case that parents who live near the school have values that the teacher needs, such as farm products, live stock, etc. In such cases an exchange of these surplus values is quite convenient. The other day a gentleman said. I do not know that I shall have any money, but I shall have corn and other products. I replied, all right, I shall need such things. So let us thus help one another.

the government, where the wnership of the roads normally lie. Let us all petition the postal

department and see if we cannot secure more prompt and efficient service.
