Yours of the 21st inst. received, contents noted. In reply will say, that having seen a great deal of New Mexico and having studied the political, social and economic conditions prevalent throughout the territory I am prepared to say that the opinions held by many respecting New Mexico and her people are derived from reading the mental aborations of a certain class of "Wild West" story writers whose literary preparations are as groundless as they are ridiculous. These opinions are wholly without foundation and evince a sad lack of information on the subjebt. On arriving here persons laboring under these false impressions are wonderfully surprised to find an advanced state of civilization and high moral standard in evidence on every hand, which, by the way, some of the older states would do well to emulate. Practically speaking New Mexico is only in its infancy, yet, however, she is well provided with educational facilities, good schools and religious institutions being a prominent feature of every community tending to the conclusion that hers are a God fearing and progressive people. 




