A LETTER FROM NEW MEXICO.
What A Visitor Thinks of the Artesia Country.

Lewis E. Ward, Esq
Dear Sir: -
Yours of the 21st inst, re ceived, contents noted. In reply will say, that having seen a great deal of New Mexico and having studied the politi cal, social and economic condi tions prevalent throughout the territory I am prepared to say that the opinions held by many respecting New Mexico and her people are derived from reading the mental aborations West" story writers whose lit erary preparations are as groundless as they are ridiculous. These opinions are evince a sad lack of information on the subjebt. On arriving here persons laboring under these false impressions are wonderfully surprised to find an advanced state of civiliza tion and high moral standard in evidence on every hand, which, by the way, some of the older states would do well to emulate. Practically speaking New Mexico is only in its infancy, yet, however, she is well provided with educational facilities, good schools and religious institutions being a prominent feature of every community tending to the confearing and progressive people Politically speaking the field Polically sually devid is about equally devided be tween Democrats and Republi no considerable proportions as yet.
Both New Mexico and Arizona were denied statehood for fear they would go Democratic and not for any incompetency of ther own as some would a large Mexican population in both territories but they are generally conceded to be good citizens, law abiding and industrious, many of them highly educated and holding important positions. I dare say that no one has ever yet seen a Mex ican "on the bum."
Comparatively speaking, both crime and insanity are very
rare in the territory, and but few names are dragged thru the slimy filth of divorce courts. Divorce lawyers, being connot tolerated.'

From what I have seen I believe that this territory is possessed of more natural resources than any state in the Union, however, they are practically undeveloped as yet.
Within. her boundaries are great forests of timber, im mense tracts of excellent land adapted to agriculture, large areas of "free" grazing land, vast deposit of coal while in calcuable mirreral wealth lies hidden in her every mountain range awaiting the enterpris erable other resources are only awaiting the intelligent invest ment of capital that they may yield untold benefit to mankind and add to the general ealth of the country. The yield of alfalfa, cereals and fruits is very prolific and Chicago market paid fifty cents per crate more for Artesia cantaloupes than for the Rock Ford product. Celery, toma oes and various other high priced garden products do ex siderable attention is being de voted to their culture. In the valley is one apple orchard of 500 acres and hundreds of malles ones ranging from 10 to 50 acres. Fruit is shipped by the train load,
