

Nothing gives character and dignity to a city like uni form, unbroken, broad and clean cement sidewalks. That is the one thing the peoplewhether home people or strangers-come in contact with first, the one thing that makes the first, the last and the most permanent impression. A city of palaces with broken-up, unkept sidewalks would lose all its attraction. A city of modest cottages and one-story buildings, provided they are clean and trim, with broad and uniform sidewalks, without a break, would be the more attractive to live in.


