## LARRAZOLA IS THE MAN.

**Who Will Lead the Democratic Hosts to Victory in New Mexico This Year.**

The most enthusiastic Democratic Convention ever held in New Mexico was held in Roswell this week, and the stalwarts have returned to their homes happy in the knowledge that New Mexico will be



brought out from under the domination of Republican misrule this year by the election of a Democrat in whom the entire people of the Territory have confidence. Hon. O. A. Larrazola, who was so mercifully counted out by the sheep vote of Valencia county two years ago, was nominated for Delegate to Congress by acclamation. The voice of fairness and justice of New Mexico called for another chance for the man who carried the banner of Democracy to victory two years ago, and the people will see that no political combination shall put the ballots in the box this year. The selection of Mr. Larrazola is pleasing to the people of New Mexico, regardless of political affiliation. He is a lawyer of exceptional ability and a very popular man personally. The territory does not contain within its borders a more competent man, and his election in November is a foregone conclusion.

A conservative estimate gave his majority two years ago over Andrews at one thousand votes, but the disgraceful manner in which he was counted out by the Republican machine is a matter with which every citizen of New Mexico is familiar. Since the election of 1906, thousands of voters (a vast majority of whom are Democrats) have come into New Mexico and the tricksters who manipulated the registration list at that time will be unable to do so again. Delegates to the nominating convention from the different counties of the Territory have pledged their efforts to see that no ballot box stuffing

shall take place in this year of our Lord.

Mr. Larrazola was placed in nomination by Hon. W. B. Bunder, of San Miguel county. His nomination was seconded by Hon. H. B. Ferguson of Bernalillo. Judge Morrow, of Colfax seconded Mr. Larrazola's nomination in a fine speech and Grant county, W. B. Walton speaking did the same, promising Larrazola at least 500 majority, possibly 750. Guadalupe followed suit with a promise of 1,000 majority. Lincoln county was "still in the Larrazola bandwagon." Luna county promised two-thirds of its entire vote for Larrazola. Mora county voted two years ago for Larrazola, but defeated the Democratic candidates, but the speaker, a defeated candidate himself, promised harder work and more votes for Larrazola this time. McKinley county was enthusiastic for the great Larrazola. Quay county was short on speeches but was long on votes for Larrazola. Rio Arriba seconded the nomination. Roosevelt now had only one candidate, and would add 1,000 to any of the majorities promised.

San Jaun promised a majority for Larrazola. Santa Fe, unanimous for Larrazola. Socorro county for Larrazola out of simple justice and party expediency. Taos county will celebrate the triumph of Larrazola next November. Torrance county for Larrazola first, last and all the time. Union county promised 600 majority for Larrazola. Valencia seconds the Larrazola's nomination without counting the sheep, the cattle, the dead and the absent.

On motion Larrazola was nominated unanimously and escorted to the platform by Delegates Baca, McDonald and Walton. He was greeted enthusiastically by a perfect uproar of cheers and yells and was introduced by the chairman as the next Delegate to Congress.

Editor Ernest L. Carroll of the Benjamin (Texas) Post, and formerly a valuable man on the Advocate force, has gone poco loco it seems entirely. A girl and a gasoline engine are at the bottom of it all. In defending his actions in the case, Carroll says:

## KILLING AT CARLSBAD.

**City Marshall is Forced to Shoot a Desperate Prisoner.**

Carlsbad, N. M., June 8.—Marshall Carl Gordon shot, and it is thought fatally injured a Mexican prisoner who attempted to assault Jailer Patrick Middleton in the Eddy county jail at six o'clock last night. The prisoner was serving a term for participation in a shooting scrape and is believed to be crazy. He had set fire to two beds in the jail when the jailer went in to extinguish the blaze. It was then that the Mexican secured a pick handle and was about to strike the jailer, when the marshal fired twice, the first ball entering his arm and the second his lung, just above the heart. He was not dead at three o'clock this afternoon, but cannot live.

PROHIBITING THE SELLING OR GIVING AWAY OF ANY INTOXICATING, MALT, VINOUS, MIXED OR FERMENTED LIQUORS WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF ARTESIA, NEW MEXICO.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF ARTESIA, NEW MEXICO.

Sec. 1 The sale, barter, giving away or otherwise furnishing, except as herein after provided, of any intoxicating, malt, vinous, mixed or fermented liquor within the limits of the Town of Artesia, New Mexico, or any part thereof is hereby prohibited.

Sec. 2 Any person, individual or incorporation who shall sell, barter, give away or otherwise furnish any intoxicating malt, vinous, mixed or fermented liquor, contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, or who shall within the town of Artesia, New Mexico, advertise for sale or solicit the purchase of any such liquor, or who is in actual possession and control, as lessee, owner or otherwise of the premises upon which such liquors are sold, offered for sale or given away, except as hereinafter provided shall be punished by a fine of not less than Twenty-five Dollars nor more than Three hundred Dollars, or by imprisonment in the Town Jail for not less than thirty days nor more than ninety days in the discretion of the Court trying the case:

PROVIDED, the Board of Trustees of the said town of Artesia may issue licenses to registered druggists and pharmacists which said license shall authorize such druggists and pharmacists to buy and sell such liquors for medicinal, sacramental and chemical purposes only, and to buy and sell alcohol for scientific purposes for such scientific institutions, universities and colleges as are authorized to procure same free of tax under the laws of the United States PROVIDED, that no sale of such liquor for scientific purposes shall be made except upon the sworn statement of the applicant in writing setting forth the purpose for which the liquor is to be used, and no sale of any such liquor shall be made for medicinal purpose (except sales to registered druggists) unless the purchaser presents to the registered druggist a bona fide prescription signed by a regular licensed practicing physician of the Town of Artesia, which prescription shall not be filled more than once and shall state for what particular malady such prescription become necessary. Each said sale shall be duly registered in a book kept for that purpose by such druggist and the register thereof and the prescription pertaining thereto shall be open to inspection by any officer, citizen or resident of the Town of Artesia, at all times during business hours.

Any Physician who shall prescribe any such liquor, except for treatment of disease upon his own personal diagnosis, shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars nor more than one hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the town jail not less than thirty days nor more than ninety days in the discretion of the Court trying the case; and any druggist who shall be convicted of making any sale or otherwise disposing of liquor contrary to the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than Twenty-five Dollars nor more than three hundred Dollars or by imprisonment in the town jail for not less than thirty days nor more than ninety days in the discretion of the court trying the case and in addition thereto he shall have his license herein provided for revoked.

Sec. 3 All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed and this ordinance shall be in

full force and effect on and after the 1st day of July, A. D. 1908, after the date of its publication.

The Record, however, does not deny the proposition that the Honorable Delegate is the main speechifier of the affray, and we can accept the Record's correction only on the theory that the Roswell boosters think his appearance on that occasion will not be of benefit to that astute politician. And what a back-handed rap that is!

the issue be submitted to the people as to whether or not the next legislature should order an election on a constitutional amendment prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors in the state. On such a vote, Texas would have undoubtedly gone prohibition. Saloon and whiskey men suddenly turned local optionists and asked the committee to include a call a vote on the issue of instructing the legislature to submit a vote on local option instead of prohibition. The committee acceded to the demand of both pros and antis and both questions will be voted on. This move was made to confuse the voters and leave matters in the state as they now exist. The prohibition guard of the state will now have to vote against local option and the scene will be presented of the whiskey interests voting the local option ticket in order to save themselves from a worse fate. Thus confused, the issue of prohibition may be lost for the present. It will teach the prohibitionists that none but true men must be placed on the executive committee next time.

The promoters of the new town of Lovington, over on the Plains, are allowing nothing to stand long in their way in the matter of town building. The town is about one mile south of the Chaves county line, in Eddy county, and about twenty miles this side of the Texas line. It is being built upon the land of Florence Love, who is associated with C. M. Burke in the enterprise. The first business house was erected about sixty days ago and others have followed. Liberal inducements have been offered to investors and the new town starts off with splendid prospects. The land surrounding it is fine, level prairie, like all the plains country, and Mr. Burke has found homes for many settlers on public domain in the vicinity. Almost every day, some family moves in and files upon public land, and thus the country is being settled rapidly. The quality of grass growing in the vicinity shows that more rain falls there than on the mesas west of the Pecos. There is no good reason why, with intelligent effort, the farmer should not make a good living on 160 acres, and the first settlers are confident that the population will double several times over within the next twelve months. While visiting there recently, the Advocate editor had the pleasure of forming the acquaintance of the townsite manager, Mr. Burks, and we are sure that he will take pleasure in giving information and assistance to anyone who may want a home in the vicinity.

## The Redemption of Kansas.

It is reported that in September of this year one of the most remarkable religious revivals ever attempted in this country will be started in the state of Kansas. Every town of 3000 population in the state will be visited, and thirty evangelists of more or less reputation will begin work in

different parts of the state simultaneously. The visits in the different towns will last from one to six weeks.

## DEATH OF R. W. TERRILL.

**Without a Moment's Warning, a Well Known Citizen Expires—Heart Failure the Cause.**

While standing at his garden fence, Monday morning, talking to a neighbor, Mr. R. W. Terrill, the well known real estate man and popular citizen, suddenly sank to the ground with an exclamation of pain and was dead in an instant. Having known that his heart's action was not good, Mr. Terrill had abstained from any violent exercise for several months past, but on Monday morning, feeling unusually well, he went into the garden to help his grandson do some plowing. While thus engaged, Mr. M. S. Lee passed by and stopped at the fence to talk a moment. Mr. Terrill paused, passed a cheerful word or two, when the stroke came and he was a corpse. Medical assistance was summoned, but to no avail.

Impressive funeral services were held at the family residence Tuesday afternoon by Rev. T. C. James, and the day following the body was laid to rest in the family burying grounds at Denton, Texas, all the children being present.

Reuben Willis Terrill was born in Howard county, Missouri, December 9, 1847, died in Artesia, New Mexico, June 8, 1908. He moved from Missouri to Denton county, Texas, November 1877, from there to Amarillo in 1903 and to Artesia February, 1906. Joined the Baptist church at the age of eighteen and remained a consistent and valuable member until death. Married Miss Ann E. Terrell September 29, 1869, who died October 22, 1896. On December 28, 1898, he married Mrs. Laura M. Hawkins, of Denton county, Texas. He leaves surviving three daughters, Mrs. Ada C. Wray, wife of Prof. E. H. Wray, of Hereford; Stella L. Terrill, of Denton and Ruby R. Terrill, of Austin; three sons, Aubrey Terrill, of Canyon City, Dr. James R. Terrill, of Galveston and Ben A. Terrill, of Dallas.

The sudden death of R. W. Terrill was a distinct shock to the people of Artesia, as well as a grief. Although a citizen of the town less than two years, the impress his life and character made upon his neighbors was such that no words can express the sadness and loss they feel at his sudden taking away. His daily walk was that of modesty and unobtrusiveness, yet no one came in contact with him but to quickly appreciate the fact that he was a man of an individuality that knew no weakness or vacillation, but, on the contrary, was animated at all times by high ideals, deep convictions and an abiding love for the better things of life. In his every-day walk and business life there was no such word as expediency. No question was settled with him until it was settled right. The question was never with R. W. Terrill "can I do this," or "will it be profitable to do this" but always and every-

where it was "is it right." Once convinced that a course of action was entirely in conformity with right, he never questioned, faltered or looked back. He was happy to at that which he considered the duty of a patriotic citizen and Christian gentleman, and the consequences were of no moment. After intimate business associations with Mr. Terrill, the writer believes him to have been every bit the man such words imply. As tender-hearted as a child and as pure-minded as a woman, he was as brave as a lion and all the financial and social considerations of the world could not make him afraid or cause him to swerve from the path of honor as he saw it. The good he did in this world will live after his body shall have been consumed into the elements of creation. No community ever possessed him as a citizen without having cause for congratulation. Although a comparatively new citizen, he rendered a service in the recent fight for banishment of saloons from Artesia that all appreciate.

Those best acquainted with the private life of R. W. Terrill can testify that his years were spent in service for others. Even to the hour of his death, his every thought was for the welfare and pleasure of those dependent upon him. His six children are highly educated, Christian men and women, and their splendid attainments are a monument to the self-sacrifice and devotion of a father who builded that the world might be made better. Thus the honors of the dead will live long after him. No child could disappoint the memory of a father like that.

The editor of the Advocate personally feels that no words can express his sorrow in the sudden death of Mr. Terrill. After an acquaintance dating back a number of years, our association had ripened into more than friendship and his place cannot be filled in our memory. He has gone to claim the reward of God's own and we can but live and labor to the end that when the journey is laid out before each of us we can approach an all-wise Tribunal with the same assurance of eternal life as did he.

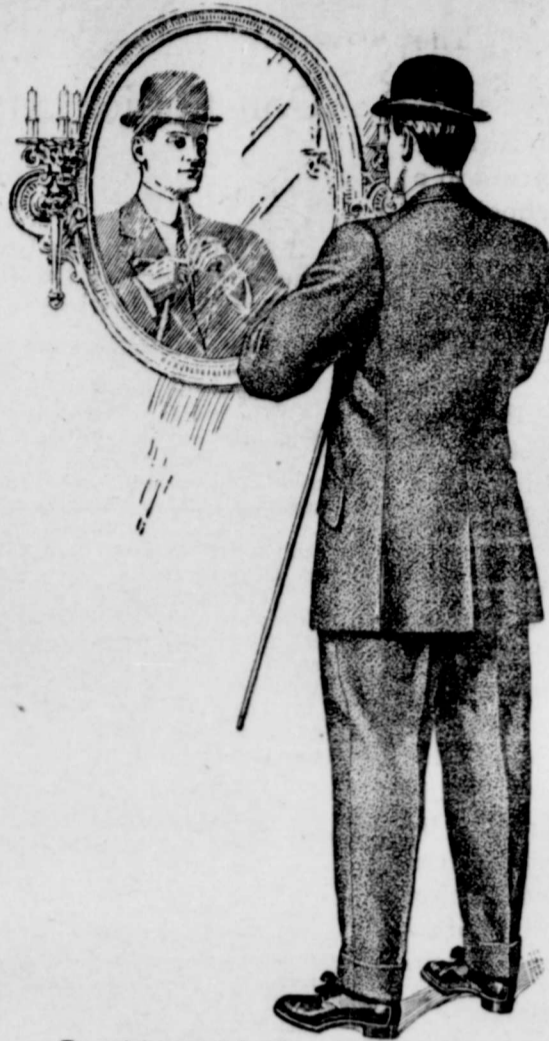

The lecturers have agreed to give their services without cost to us, but we feel under obligation to pay their traveling expenses. In order to do this we shall request all persons who feel able to do so and are willing to do it, to pay an enrollment fee of two dollars each which will be used to defray expenses. No charge

will be made, however, and the matter of paying this fee is entirely voluntary. The purpose of the school is to give a measure of training to those Christian workers who feel the need of it and who are not in a position to attend a school for special training for their work, or who have not the time to do so.

## A MERITORIOUS ORGANIZATION.

### Constitution and By-Laws of the Benevolent-Beneficial Association of the Pecos Valley.

Organization has been perfected, articles of incorporation filed with the Secretary of the Territory and will be published in a short while of a splendid mutual insurance order and following is the constitution and by-laws governing the operation of same:

This organization shall be known as the BENEVOLENT-BENEFICIAL ASSOCIATION, OF THE PECOS VALLEY.

The main office of this association shall be kept and maintained at Artesia, in the Territory of New Mexico. The officers of this association shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Chief Medical Examiner and General Agent, all to be members of this association and to be appointed by the Board of Directors.

An annual meeting of the members of this association shall be held at the office of this association in said town of Artesia on the second Tuesday in January in each and every year, and the members present at said meeting shall vote on all matters pertaining to the management and welfare of said association.

Each member of this association shall pay on or before the first day of December in each and every year the sum of one dollar as library and incidental fund, to be applied to either fund by the Board of Directors as necessity may require.

The officers of this association shall have such powers as are usually vested in the officers of such organizations; the treasurer shall be an officer of some banking institution, engaged in said bank in the active management thereof, said bank to be located in the district included in the scope of this organization. He shall receive all moneys paid in by the accepted members of this association and pay out the same only upon proper vouchers.

The chief medical examiner of this association shall be a regular practitioner of medicine in the district aforesaid and his duty shall be to pass upon all applications for beneficial certificates and report his decision to the president and secretary.

The general agent shall have charge of the appointment and management of the agency force of this association, and shall himself be an active, soliciting agent therefor.

Any regular practicing physician, located in the counties of Roosevelt, Chaves or Eddy, in the Territory of New Mexico, shall be entitled to examine applicants for beneficial certificates.

Any white male or female citizen of the United States or Territories, and who shall reside in Roosevelt, Chaves or Eddy counties, in the Territory of New Mexico, may become a member of this association by paying to the agent thereof the sum of six dollars and fifty cents, and if said applicant only desires to become an honorary member, he or she shall furnish satisfactory evidence of good moral character. Where such person shall apply for a beneficial certificate, the application and answers made to the medical examiner shall contain sufficient information as to the good moral character of the applicant. Provided, that all persons applying for membership shall be between the ages of eighteen and fifty years. Any application for beneficial certificate shall be accompanied by a strict medical examination report showing that the applicant has appeared before the medical examiner making said report and submitted to a physical examination in that behalf.

Out of the membership fee, one dollar shall be paid to the secretary as his pay for writing the certificate, one dollar shall be paid to the physician who examines the applicant and fifty cents to the chief physician who shall pass upon the application; one dollar shall be paid into the treasury as the first advance assessment and three dollars shall be paid to the agent who secures the application. All membership fees must be paid in advance and forwarded with the application to the secretary, who, if the application is accepted, shall pay out and apply the sums as hereinabove provided for. In case any applicant only wishes to become an honorary member, he or she shall pay the same membership fee as if applying for beneficial certificate, one dollar of which shall be paid, if application is accepted, to the soliciting agent, fifty cents to the secretary, and the remainder shall be paid into a benevolent fund, said fund to be disbursed in behalf of any member of the association, who may, while in good standing, become sick and needy, or in need of medicine, medical attention or nurse. This fund shall be controlled by the board of directors and a complete report of their transactions in this behalf shall be made to the annual meeting of this association. Any sums arising from the payment of annual dues, which may not be needed for library or incidental expenses, shall, at the discretion of the board of directors, be applied to this fund.

In case of the rejection of any application for honorary membership, the whole membership fee shall be returned to the applicant; in case of the rejection of any applicant for beneficial membership, the entire membership fee, except one dollar for the examining physician and fifty cents for the chief physician, shall be returned to such applicant. A person may become an honorary member who is not physically qualified to receive a beneficial certificate if such person is otherwise qualified, and such honorary member may, upon satisfactory recovery, submit to a medical examination as in the case of any other person, for the purpose of obtaining such certificate, and shall further pay examining and chief physicians' fees as herein provided for and be subject to the usual restriction as to age and location, and shall pay one dollar advance assessment.

The purposes of this association are to promote morality, literary information, temperance and sobriety, and when any member of this association shall become guilty of continuous, grossly immoral conduct or habitual drunkenness, or engage in any occupation calculated to impair the morals or sobriety of the public, such member shall, after having been notified of the charges against him or her, and having been found guilty thereof by the board of trustees sitting as a tribunal, be suspended from membership and shall forfeit all rights and benefits accruing by reason of such prior membership. The accused shall have ten days notice of the charges made against him or her and shall have the right of trial thereon. It is the further aim of this association to aid such persons as constitute the families, heirs, blood relatives, and persons depending for support upon deceased members. To that end a beneficial certificate may be issued to members payable only to persons within the above named class at the death of the member holding such certificate. Any change of beneficiary shall be made upon the written application of the member holding such certificate and such application and the record of the granting thereof shall be strictly kept and maintained by the secretary of the association.

Any member of this association, who can pass a satisfactory medical examination, may receive a beneficial certificate payable at the death of the holder to the beneficiary designated by the applicant and within the class herein provided for, in the sum of One Thousand Dollars; provided that should the last assessment made prior to the death of said holder result in a sum less than one thousand dollars, the amount to be paid to the beneficiary, shall be the amount derived from the said last assessment, but should last assessment result in more than one thousand dollars, only the sum of one thousand dollars shall be paid to such beneficiary and the remainder, if any, shall remain in the treasury until the surplus thus acquired shall be sufficient to pay a one thousand dollar death claim, in which case no assessment at that time shall be made and the accumulated surplus shall be used to pay such claim.

At the death of any member holding a beneficial certificate the secretary of the association, shall within ten days after satisfactory proof of such death has been received by him, mail, at the postoffice in Artesia, New Mexico, to each surviving member holding such certificates, a written or printed notice of the death of such member and that an assessment thereon is due. Said notices to be addressed to the last known residences of such members.

Upon the death of any member holding a beneficial certificate, each surviving member holding such certificates shall pay into the treasury of the association the sum of one dollar, except when sufficient surplus is on hand as herein provided for.

The failure to pay such assessment within thirty days from the time such notices have been mailed or of the one dollar annual dues within thirty days after the first day of December in any year, shall render the certificate held by such delinquent member null and void. An honorary member shall lose his or her membership and any benefit accruing therefrom upon his or her failure to pay such annual dues within the time aforesaid.

Any member, whose certificate has been rendered null and void by reason of such failure to pay assessments or dues, may be reinstated by furnishing a certificate of good health signed by any physician qualified to make original examinations, with statement of the fact that the person seeking reinstatement has not removed from the territory included in the three counties aforesaid and has not reached the age of fifty years. Such certificate shall be accompanied by the sum of three dollars and fifty cents, one dollar of which shall be paid to the agent who forwarded the same, one dollar to the physician who makes the certificate, fifty cents to the secretary of the association, and one dollar into the treasury as an advance assessment.

Benevolent action being one of the purposes of this association, in addition to the operation of the fund herein provided for sick and needy members, it is declared the fraternal ethics of this association that all members thereof, who are accessible to such sick and needy members, use due diligence in visiting and otherwise assisting any member who shall become sick or needy or personally in need of encouragement or moral support.

The constitution and by-laws of this association shall be made a part of its beneficial certificate, and shall be taken and construed in connection therewith.

The following persons shall act as election officers at said election: C. L. Heath, J. D. H. Reed, Wm. Idler, judges, and C. F. Erb, and J. E. Swepston as clerks thereof.

Said election shall be held and conducted and the result thereof canvassed as provided by law in the case of such elections.

Polls will be open at 9 o'clock a. m. and will close at 6 o'clock p. m. on said day of election.

The register will be open for the registration of voters pursuant to title 28, chapter 2, of the Compiled Laws of New Mexico, at the store of Fatherree & Enfield Hdw Co in said town on and after the 15th day of June, A. D. 1908, at which time the registration shall begin and shall continue for ten days thereafter and will close on the 25th day of June, A. D. 1908, and the following named persons shall constitute the registration board: V. E. Fatherree, J. E. Swepston and J. D. H. Reed.

Every legal voter in said school district, who is the owner of real or personal property subject to taxation therein shall be entitled to register in the manner provided by law.
