

Mr. and Mrs. J. Sidney Highsmith, of Artesia, New Mexico, were welcome visitors in our community recently. Mr. Highsmith is a staunch business man of Artesia, a thriving town in the Pecos valley, one of the finest agricultural sec tions in the great west. At the tender age of five years he lost his mother, and five years later his father died. Twenty-one vears ago he left North Caro lina and located in the Panhan dle section. For seventeen years he made his home at Hale Center, Texas, where for several years he engaged in the merchantile business, also con ducted a small farm, and a few years later established a nursery business which he continued up to the time he left Texas, three years ago. About fifteen years ago he married Miss Margie Bell, a charming young lady of that section. Mr. Highsmith was very fortunate in securing a companion. Six bright, healthy, happy children add to the attractions of their home circle. She is an ideal housekeeper, is a fine lady, and if spared, will properly train her children for the duties and responsibilities of life.

Alfalfa and fruit are the lead ing products of the Pecos valloy. In this section these two products grow to perfection. Five cuttings each season of the finest alfalfa, from one to two tons at each cutting per acre, is the usual output, while no finer apples, plums, etc., are grown anywhere. He has established a nursery at Artes ia, which will prove a profitable investment. This little town is only five years old and already numbers nearly three thousand inhabitants, has a graded school with about 600 pupils, good banking institutions, and business houses, tel ephone and other up to date facilities. New Mexico is striving for statehood, and hopes that it will not be long before her hopes are realized. Very little rain falls in that section. The farming and grazing get their water supply from artesian wells, by which the crops are irrigated. The tall mountains plainly visible in the distance, are snow capped almost the entire summer season, rendering the nights pleasant, so that one can sleep comfortably all summer under a blanket.

Freedom from insect pests is one great advantage in that section. Just imagine no bed bugs, no fleas, no ticks, nor red bugs, and no mosquitos It almost makes me want to go there.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Parking Ordinance Passed and Routine Business Attended to at Adjourned Meeting.

The town trustees met again Wednesday night pursuant to adjournment motion on the evening previous. Numerous bills were allowed and some routine business dispatched.

City Attorney McCrary reported that it was his opinion that the town trustees had the privilege under the statutes of New Mexico to make a one mill levy for the purpose of supporting a Carnegie Library if the same could be secured thereby and it was the sense of the trustees that such a levy would be made if necessary This levy would amount to about two hundred and fifty dollars per year.

An ordinance was passed making it a finable offense for any owner or agent in charge of any artesian well within the corporate limits of the town to allow such well to go to waste either above or below the ground, thereby working injury to property adjacent. There is a Territorial statute covering this question and the intention is to bring the matter down to the jurisdiction of the town authorities, in order that the same may be more rigidly enforced, and the town benefitted financially thereby and property owners protected. Unless something of this sort is done, the trustees realize the town of Artesia stands a good show to get a few suits on its hands for allowing a nuisance maintained. The ordinance is published elsewhere n this week's Advocate.

The trustees discussed at length the matter of parking on streets in the residence districts of town. A number of property owners desire to arrange grass plats on the outside of their sidewalks and in order that these parkings become uniform it was deemed expedient that a regulation width be prescribed by the trustees. After lengthy discussion, it was determined that such parkings should extend into the streets ten feet from the outer edge of the cement sidewalks, making in all seventeen feet from the lot line. As most of the streets are one hundred feet in width, this will leave sixty-six feet from one parking to another.

Ordinance No 91.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Artesia, New Mexico:

Section 1 That it unlawful for any person or persons, corporation, partnership or association owning or controling any artesian well within the limits of the said Town of Artesia, to allow the same to get out of repair so that the same will leak or that the water from the same will come up around or on the face of the ground or soak such a way as to damage the property or endanger the health of any person.

Section. 2 That any person shall violate any of the provisions of section one of this free. ordinance after receiving ten days notice from the city Marshal; if said well is not repaired shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than twenty five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the Town jail for not less than ten days nor more than thirty days.

Section 3 That each day shall be deemed a separate offence.

Section 4 That this ordinance shall have full force and after its publication. Declared, passed and ap-
