Feemster Replies to Graham.

Artesia N. M. Nov. 16 1908. I notice in the Ft Worth Record a blast of hot air, attributed to one J. A. Graham of the Roswell Commercial Club, which reads as tollows: 'Roswell has shipped 450 cars of apples this year and you don't know apples till you know the Roswell kind. They won all the prizes at Albuquerque Irrigation Congress.' Now we don't know how many cars of apples Roswell has shipped but she certainly has reason to be proud of her apples, for they have always been prize winners, until they came in competition with the Hope fruit at the 16th National Irrigation Congress at Albuquerque. But I do know what apples won the prizes at Albuquerque for Mr. J. R. Cannon and myself were in charge of the Artesia-Hope exhibit, and were present during the entire exposition. Now Roswell did receive one half of the T. B. Catron prize for the best exhibit of apples from a singled irrigated orchard, and Hope received the other Lalf of the same prize, Hagermans orchard received also the Continental Oil Co's Trophy for the best display of fruits of all kinds, raised by a single individual. It has never been explained to the public how this Trophy could have been given to Hagerman for under the specifications he was not even entitled to compete for it, as he had only apples and only 26 varieties of them. Hon. Bradford L. Prince should have received the Trophy as his display contained 44 varieties of apples, 17 of pears, 7 of peaches, 11 of plums and prunes, 8 of grapes and 6 of miscellaneous, making a grand total 93 varieties.

The representative of the Continental Oil Co at Albuquerque told me that he could not allow the Trophy to be delivered to Hagerman as he was not entitled to compete under the specifications. And one of the gentlemen in charge of the Roswell exhibit told me that he did not think that they had entered for it, and that it took the hardest kind

of wire pulling to land the Trophy. Roswell also won a premium on onions, making a grand total of 3 premiums in all. Now the apples raised at Hope won the following.

First on five varieties of winter apples; first on plate fall apples; first on plate winter apples; first on plate Ben Davis, Jonathon, Winesap, Missouri Pippin, Wealthy Grimes Golden, Bell-flower, and Paragon. One half T. B. Catron prize. Second on Arkansas black; second on display of apples, a total of 14 prizes. Then the display from Artesia in the Artesia-Hope exhibit won first premiums on corn on stalk, large white dent corn: Kaffir corn: Banana melons: rhubarb: sheaves of alfalfa and cling peaches, and second on white elephant potatoes, 1st cutting alfalfa, 2nd cutting alfalfa, peaches of any variety, white onions and the Morning Journal cash prize for best ten pounds onions raised by child under 18. Making a total of 13 prizes, or 27 for the Artesia-Hope exhibit. Now in conclusion we all give Roswell credit for raising fine apples, and the Pecos Valley apple leads the world. But after the judges had made the awards at Albuquerque, I weighed on the Toledo scales, in the presence of two witnesses every plate of apples of the same varieties exhibited by the Hope orchard and the Hagerman orchard. And I have on file the weights and can furnish affidavits to the same. And each plate of five apples from Hope out weighed the five of the same variety from Hagerman's orchard from five to forty per cent.

So it is unnecessary to comment further as anyone can see that the statement that, 'Roswell apples won all the prizes at Albuquerque' could only have emanated from a mind abnormally influenced by a surrender of its faculties either to the alcoholic or the Ananias spirit.

While rather severe, the letter of Mr. E. J. Feemster which appears in another column of the Advocate is warranted by facts as he plainly shows in the figures he gives to support his contention. The fact is that the entire irrigated belt of the Pecos Valley constitutes the finest fruit belt in America and that anyone who settles in any part of it is not making any mistake. If the Hope orchards had not taken most of the prizes they would still have remained with the Valley. The Advocate does not desire to stir up a row as we believe that "there is glory enough for all" but Hope won the prizes and as a matter of simple justice is entitled to credit, and we desire to see that she gets it. Now that the little amenities are over let us all get together and boost for the whole Valley. In the meantime paste Mr. Feemster's figures in your hat, they will come mighty handy for refer-


