To be sure, there was a class of Mexicans who were just like that, though they have practically disappeared. There were Mexican cattle thieves but there were cow thieves galore who were not of that race. The people of Mexico are divided good folks and let the intelliinto three classes; an upper class of polished, educated folk who are the pink of accommodating courtesy; a small, very small, middle class, fairly strata in the cities are on the same level with the slums of American cities and the nicipalities.

The average tourist from this country to Mexico has no more chance of meeting the higher class in that country than the average tourist from Mexico would have to meet the better class of Americans. He has no business that throws him in contact with them. The poor are everywhere; the result of their economic system, and the poor are all that the casual tourist has a chance to see. If he is shallow and predjudiced, in order to post himself and get in touch with things, as he thinks, he probably reads a few penny dreadful novels about bandits and the like and the result is that he comes back ready to believe anything about the "greaser". The gross caricature on the stage fits in with his previous conception of things and he is sure that that is the sort of men that inhabit the country to our south. To be sure this does not describe the average American tourist, but it does suit a class and the fact that it does, is what keeps the stage Mexican from "petering out." There is mighty little brigandage in Mexico at this time and the capital is confessedly the best policed city in the world. ### Ordinance No. 100.

An Ordinance In Relation To The Material And Construction Of Flues Within The Fire Limit Of The Town Of Artesia.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Artesia, New Mexico, as follows:

Sec. 1-That all flues in all buildings hereafter to be constructed, and all flues which may hereafter be reconstructed in buildings now completed within the fire limit of the A. B.
