Rev. Cochran says that he
is more confident than ever of the success of the college at Artesia. He would not ask money for a small schoo, bu this is to be a great educational nstitution.

every postoffice patron in the United States, at the expense of the people, and the enlarge nent of the annual deficit of
which we hear so much, and which we hear so much, and cight source, though a plausi-
ble effort to do so was made when the department swooped down upon the weekly and
semi-weekly newspapers and laid out a set of rules which practically takes the management of his credits out of the However, since all are treated alike, few have objected to this phase of the matter and all legitimate publishers have ply with the rules.
