Short Cut in Time Limits.

Some changes were made in committee in the chronology of the formative work in calling the various elections for framing the constitution. As the bill now stands it provides that the governor issue the proclamation for election of constitutional delegates within thirty days. Said election must not be before sixty nor after ninety days after the approval of the act. Returns must then be canvassed, which will take twenty-one days. The convention shall be held on the fourth Monday following the election. It will remain in session not over sixty days. Nor earlier than sixty or later than ninety days after adjournment the election for ratification of the constitution shall be held. The returns shall be canvessed on the third Monday following. This makes a total of 250 days if all events are carried out at the least possible time.



Contrary as the popular conception, we of the west are conservatives, and while the movement for a sane Fourth of July will be felt over all the country, we will for the most part celebrate as in days of yore, with a wealth of fireworks and red fire, of noise and powder. Later on, perhaps, the sane idea will be taken up in New Mexico. It may even be one of the first enactments of the new state. It will be following a distinguished example, as seven legislatures and 246 city councils have passed stringent laws against the sale and use of fireworks since 1901, when the agitation began. A Partisan Convention

There has never been any doubt that party lines would be drawn by the Republicans in the selection delegates to the constitutional convention. The apportionment was made in such way as to insure a majority of the delegates for the Repulican party and for that express purpose. The filing of the census report was deffered until after the passage of the statehood bill in order to preclude the possibility of a fair apportionment which might have jeopardized complete Republican domination.

The New Mexican which nates Boss Catron more than it does the Democracy of Santa Fe county, wanted a non-partisan convention. Since the issue has been decided the other way the Albuquerque Journal has been strongly in favor of nonpartisanship.

There never was a proposal made by the Republican terririal committee or by anybody publican committee, looking to elimination of partisan politics in the selection of delegate.

from 12 cents to eleven cents. The Republicans will elect members of their own party whereever they are in the majority, and this will leave them a safe margin. If they can induce the Democrats in Democratic counties to divide with them their majority will be overwhelming.

Assuming the delegates all to be personally honest and intelligent, a fundamental law drafted entirely by Republicans would differ essentially from one written wholly by Democrats, while a constitution formed by a mixed convention would differ from both. It will be necessary to elect Democrats from every Democratic district in order to prevent the convention and the constitution from being wholly un-Democratic.
