The call published hereunder marks the beginning of the labors of that great organization, the W. C. T. U. in Artesia. The Advocate will gladly give a column weekly to the organization and will be glad to help forward the work. This week's "Tenderfuot" contains an excellent writeup of the society. The call follows:

In a recent letter from Mrs. Nutter, the president of the W. C. T. U. in this territory, she advises that in view of the approaching election of delegates to the constitutional convention, it behooves the tem perance workers to do all in their power to secure such leg islation as will further the cause of temperance in the new state.
"She calls our attention specially to the need of prompt and vigorous action in our own town, where local option was of the temperance workers seem to think the cause is in danger.
"It has been our aim to organize a local W. C. T. U. and in view of the crisis that confronts us we are convinced that now is the accepted time. When the railroads recently freight rates on cattle and dressed beef from Chicago to
New York the Beef Trust objected. The veto of the Beef Trust is a serious matter. It has been known to modify acts
of Congress when they were on their passage. It has held up laws after they were duly en-
rolled upon the statute books. The Beef Trust is not organized like Standard Oil. There is a National Packing Company which is a trust, but the rea
Beef Trust embraces most of the big packers of the West and is held together, it is assumed, more by agreement than by
charter. Its combined capital is in the neighborhood of $\$ 500$, 000,000
When $\$ 500,000,000$ says "No" to anything nowadays it is nec essary to stop and consider.
Ninety millions of people migh protest against higher freigh rates on beef, leading directly to higher price of meats, and not much would be said about
it, but when the Beef Trust' $\$ 500,000,000$ spoke everybody listened.

Among those that gave heed was the house of J. P. Morgan \& Co,, whose Mr. Perkins was gotiate. The capital under the contral and innuence thi has shown, amounts to $\$ 10,000$, 000,000 and more. It happened therefore, that while Mr. Per kins was visibly present when
J. P. Morgan \& Co. called the Beef Trust to account, the real argument, the close reasoning, was in fact between $\$ 10,000$, 000,000 and $\$ 500,000,000$. Why control of one man can do many things. In this case they si lenced the opposition to higher pers of freight in the world. We have ne details of the arrangement, but it is that the $\$ 500,000,000$ of the

ance in the public shools, which is undoubtedly the rea cause of the wonderfully pernanent growth of the temper ance impulse, being almost equally effective upon both parent and child. The laws forbidding the sale of tobacco to minors, and the anti-cigarette acts are both fruits of the union campaign of education. So are the statutes raising the age consent and providing for the better protection of women and girls, the limitation of the
hours of labor for women workhours of labor for women workers (in some states), the estab lishment of the system of police matrons, the plan for the help many phases of the pure food laws, the practical abolition of printing of bad books and pamphlets, and many other items which have been attained through the influence of some department or other of the un on system. Naturally with uch an active history, the unon has been favored with many enemies, which is perhaps the best test of its usefulness, as the real value of all leformative societies is gauged by the enemies it makes.  Produces thousand cars annual ly-Largest shipping point in territory.That Artesia is the largest shipping point for Alfalfa in the Pecos Valley and conse quently in the territory none can now doubt. During the haying season of 1909 the Art Artesia country shipped 476 cars. So far this season whic includes the last half of May and the months of June and July the shipments from Art esia according to the Santa Fe records amounts to 405 cars with two crops yet to be har vested. Besides this there ha been stored in the Askew-Beasley warehouse about' 50 cars Also a number of the farmers have built hay barns with ca pacities from 100 to 300 tons and put all of their first and second cutting away for the winter trade. Since the first of April there have been 25000 heep in in here off the rang hat has has created a hom market for approximately 100 cars. On account of the con tinued dry weather on the range the sheep are still here and are requiring lots of alfalfa.
Taking all these facts into consideration it is safe to say that the alfalfa produced in the country tributary to Artesia so ar this season amounts to mor than 600 cars and that the ag gregate for the year will exceed thoul Arsia these inure nite Aners. In my opinion the convention ought o adopt a constitution, omitting the objectionable features which I have attempted to point out. The bond holders will tell us of course that if that is done they will not allow the president and the congress to approve only by the consent of the bond holders, and on their own terms, we can stay out a little longer; better stay out forever as a free people, than come in on such degrading terms as hat proposed.
