MADERO WILL WIN

Old Mexico in a State of Turmoil but Election will be Held.

Mexico, City, Sept. 25.—Mexico's presidential election will be held on October 1, the date fixed by official decree. The petition for a postponement was rejected tonight by the senate and by the chamber of deputies. In both houses the majority against delaying the election was large, that in the chamber being 146.

The petition rejected by the senate was that presented by the Reyistas, whose chief claim was that the condition of the country was too near anarchy to warrant the holding of elections on the date fixed.

Little time was used by the senators in discussing the petition. Between Maderistas and anti-Maderistas the audience appeared about evenly divided. Those speaking against the petition argued that the state of affairs was not so bad as what might follow an alteration in the electoral plans, openly expressing the belief that civil war might be expected as the result.

Francisco Bulges, one of the most pronounced of the anti-Maderistas group, declared that the chamber had no right to change the election date, that the majority should always rule and that it was evident that the majority wanted to name Madero president and that as soon as possible.

Mexico City, Sept. 26.—Gen. Madero and his candidate for the vice presidency, Jose Pino Suarez, returned today from their southern campaign and were given a noisy welcome. The candidates were escorted by marching clubs with bands to the Madero home.

During their progress through the business district all other traffic was suspended. A feature of the reception was the presence of hundreds of white-clothed Indians from the south bearing banners. The candidates bowed their acknowledgements of the cheering.

The campaign in the north has been postponed for a few days while the campaigners rest.

Unlikely Italy and Turkey Will Clash.

London, Sept. 25.—According to the latest despatches here no overt act has occurred that would be likely to precipitate hostilities between Italy and Turkey, and the hope is held that peace will be maintained. It is pointed out that it is to the interest of all the powers to avoid reopening the near eastern question.

The Turkish porte has addressed a circular to the Turkish representatives abroad instructing them to invoke the good offices of the powers with a view to restraining Italy from hostile action in Tripoli. The grand vizer has abandoned his projected European holiday.

We, the undersigned in order to form a corporation for the objects hereinafter set forth under and pursuant to the provisions of the laws of the Territory of New Mexico, relating to corporations and the incorporation thereof, do certify as follows:

1. The name of the corporation is PECOS VALLEY ABSTRACT COMPANY.

2. The principal office of said corporation in the Territory of New Mexico shall be located in the Town of Artesia, New Mexico, and the name of the agent of said incorporation and upon whom process against said corporation may be served is Thos. F. Blackmore.

3. The objects for which this corporation is formed are as follows:

4. As a subsidiary to and in furtherance but not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the Territory of New Mexico or of the objects hereinbefore stated, it is hereby expressly provided that said corporation shall also have and exercise the following powers, to-wit:

(a) To do any and all things herein specified as objects, purposes and powers to the same extent and with like force and effect as a natural person might or could do the same, and so do them in any part of the Territory of New Mexico, as principal, agent, Attorney in fact, contractor, trustee or otherwise.

(b) To conduct said business above specified in all its branches and ramifications in any part of the Territory of New Mexico, and have and maintain one or more offices for the transaction of business and hold without limit, purchase and convey, real and personal property in the Territory of New Mexico.

(c) To incur indebtedness in such amount as may be deemed necessary or proper, to evidence such indebtedness by the bonds or other written obligations of this corporation; to secure the payment of such indebtedness by mortgage, deed of trust or other form of incumbrance of and upon all or any part of the property rights, privileges or franchises of this corporation.

Contemplated Prosecution.

New York, Sept. 25.—Attorney General Wickersham in a statement issued today declined to commit his department or himself regarding the possible prosecution of the United States steel corporation. He said in part:

"It has been the consistent policy of the department not to state in advance of actual proceedings that action against any particular party was in contemplation. There are many reasons why this is the proper position to maintain. In the first place, until the investigation is complete, it is not known whether a case of violation of law exists, and in the second place, the character of the proceedings can not be determined until then and if the facts shall require criminal proceedings to be resorted to, ordinary prudence would demand that publicity be not given to that fact until indictments are found.

"It would go without say-

ing that a great complex combination of corporations under a centralized control, dominating the trade of the country in an important industry would not escape the careful study and consideration of the department. Whether that examination would result in a proceeding to compel a disintegration of the combination into separate, disconnected parts could not be determined until such study and examination is completed. Each case stands on its own footing and depends upon its own particular suit and against a particular combination would not, of course, prevent it from disputing the government's contention and defending the suit."

Explanation

I wish to say that the report about to be circulated against me that I am ineligible on account of not residing in New Mexico for last three years is absolutely false and erroneous. I have lived on the Plains in New Mexico for little over three years and the Plains people have got me out and I expect to stay with the people.
