CAPT. E. P. BUJAC

Addresses Large and Enthusiastic Audience at Artesia Last Saturday.

Capt. E. P. Bujac, the able lawyer and eloquent orator of Carlsbad, spoke last Saturday at Artesia in behalf of his candidacy for county commissioner of District No. 1, which is his home.

Capt. Bujac first had a chance to make a few remarks to a number of the members of the commercial club and other citizens who had met in called session. He took occasion to assure those present that the iron bridge east of Artesia was to be repaired soon, as the contract had been let and when finished this time it was believed it would withstand the floods down the Pecos.

At the night meeting a large crowd gathered and Judge G. U. McCrary introduced the distinguished speaker. Capt. Bujac prefaced his remarks pertaining to his candidacy by telling the Artesia citizens how much they had accomplished in such short space of time and how well they had builded, and that their work was only begun, as their prospects for the future were very bright indeed.

Touching again the bridge east of Artesia, he called attention to the fact that it was he who circulated the petition to secure this bridge and had worked faithfully and continuously for it until its completion. He also said that this bridge and the one at Carlsbad would finally cost Eddy county nothing as the indebtedness of all the counties was to be paid by the munificent gift of public land made by the government in granting us statehood.

Capt. Bujac also called attention to instances when he had proffered his assistance to Artesia people to give them relief sought in tax reductions, and in other ways had shown his friendliness for the town and her people. Persons present verified his statements as to these instances of his willingness to grant the requests made.

He also took occasion to defend himself against the aspersions in the Carlsbad Current. His characterization of the editor of that paper is omitted, as it is not necessary in the reference we desire to make to Capt. Bujac's explanation. He stated that his appointment came as commissioner from the then republican governor, George Curry, solely on personal grounds, because they had been soldiers, comrades and friends during the Spanish-American war and also in the far away Philippines. He said that A. C. Heard had so much other business to attend to he desired to

resign and agreed to do so if Gov. Curry who was at Carlsbad with the senatorial committee viewing the project for putting in dams, would appoint Capt. Bujac. This, Gov. Curry readily consented to do.

As to his friendship and admiration for Ex-President Roosevelt, which the Current twisted into an indorsement politically, was also because of the Rough Rider association, for one thing, but mainly, because Carlsbad and that whole section that was devastated by the breaking of the dam, owed it to the then President Roosevelt, the starting and completion of the present project, because it had been disapproved by the secretary of the interior for lack of funds. Capt. Bujac said that he and his people would be ingrates if they did not admire Ex-President Roosevelt, under the circumstances, and that was as far as it went.

Capt. Bujac closed with an eloquent peroration and received enthusiastic applause, and then many gathered around him and grasped his hand and offered congratulations on the excellent and effective speech he had made.

BIG DAM BREAKS.

Hundreds of Lives Lost and Great Damage Done.

Coudersport, Pa., Sept. 30.--- One thousand men, women and children, more than a fourth of the total population were drowned, and countless numbers were injured this afternoon when the mammoth dam of the Bayless Pulp and Paper Company burst and with a roar surpassing that upon of the Niagra poured more than a half a billion gallons of water down upon the town of Austin, fourteen miles from this city.

Located in the valley between two high hills that extends east and west for miles, Austin was at the mercy of the flood which swept nearly every building away, piling them up at the mouth of a narrow gully east of town. Then fire quickly added its terror. The flames raging unchecked, roasting alive the victims who remain in the debris. 139 bodies had been recovered but they constitute only a fraction of the entire number of victims, many of whom have been swept on down the valley with the flood.

EL PASO BOOSTERS

Will Arrive at Artesia, Thursday 11 A. M in a Special Train.-- Will be Entertained.

President Reed of the Artesia Commercial Club had a called meeting of several members and also some other citizens last Saturday afternoon, to consider plans and arrangements for entertaining and showing the proper courtesies to the El Paso Trade Excursionists who are expected here next Thursday at 11 a. m. Their stop is only scheduled for an hour but may be extended a short while longer.

In an informal discussion and by suggestion, it was arranged to meet the party, which it is estimated will amount to fifty members, at the lower switch, with automobiles and carry them through some of the streets and around the city.

A number of loads of alfalfa have been promised to be on the streets that morning and also to have as many bales of hay scattered along Main street as can be conveniently arranged.

Apples will also be provided in profusion and a quantity furnished the visitors to carry with them.

Punch will be served in the commercial club rooms and several young ladies will be there to pin flowers on the guests.

Messrs. G. R. Brainard, S. W. Gilbert and Baughman were appointed a committee to see after the alfalfa exhibit.

Messrs. E. C. Higgins, A. C. Keinath and E. N. Requa, were appointed a committee to secure automobiles sufficient to carry the guests about the city.

Messrs. W. L. Bishop, W. E. Ragsdale, and Dr. T. B. Larrabee, were named as a committee on arrangements at the club rooms.

The visit to Artesia of these representatives from El Paso is an important event, and as we expect to have direct connection with that city by rail upon the completion of the San Diego, El Paso & St Louis R. R., it is well that an acquaintance be formed with them even this early. It will no doubt be mutually beneficially.

Not only the committee and those others who have signified a willingness to assist in the reception of our guests next Thursday, but it is to be trusted that the entire town will consider itself a special committee to assist in it.

The El Paso delegation of trade boosters will travel in a special train consisting of a baggage car, one coach, one tourist sleeper, two regular Pullman sleepers and a combination parlor and dining car. It is stated that the baggage and a diner will be sufficiently

stocked with eatables and drinkables to last the visitors through this "dry" territory.

The Twenty-third infantry U. S. band, will accompany the party and their excellent music will be a great treat. The band is loaned by Col. Edwin F. F. Glenn, commander of the post at El Paso.

What They Forget.

[From Albuquerque Morning Journal Rep.]

In their desperate effort to ram a rotten ticket down the throats of the republicans of New Mexico, there are several things that the state machine by the noble and affection inspiring Mr. Bursum forgets.

It forgets that the announcement of its present brazen program has already had the effect of driving hundreds of disgusted republicans into the democratic party.

It forgets that there is a limit beyond which the loyalty of true republicans will not go.

It forgets that the progress of education and enlightenment and development in New Mexico has enabled a good many citizens to see through the party label to the man underneath; and that there are many people who are in favor of a political pure food law, making misbranding a crime.

It forgets that a census has recently been taken. This census gives the official government figures on the population of such counties as San Miguel, Valencia and Sandoval. This census, we understand, enables one to find out pretty accurately how many voters there are, for instance, in a precinct like that of Cuba, Sandoval county, where the vote once exceeded the entire population of men, women and children and burros and goats. This census will make it a little difficult for the Valencia county manager to telegraph to the head of the machine, "How many votes do you need?" It is a generally accepted estimate that the population runs about one voter to four or five people; at the minimum not less than one to four. These census figures in fact will prove more invaluable when it comes to investigating how many freeborn and sovereign sheep cast their woolly votes in Valencia on the tariff question.

The machine forgets that the old regime of terrorism is passing rapidly with the increase in the number of un-muzzled newspapers, the increase in railroads and automobile lines and other means of communication and the resulting vast increase in publicity that has come in the past five years.

The machine forgets in short that the people of New Mexico

are not having as much of their thinking done by proxy as in former years.

The machine fails to consider the fact that there is a limit to the political digestion of the voter and that there are certain things which even the most hardened stomach must disgorge.

Mr. Bursum has a pretty fair steam roller; but the work of his machine is after all, rather crude as far as any average political sagacity or shrewdness is concerned.

The fatal defect in the whole program, now as heretofore is in the fact that neither Mr. Bursum nor his henchmen have awakened to a realization of New Mexico's progress; and utterly fail to take the hard-headed voter into account.
