## Gangs Have no Political Principles.

The Advocate believes that it is the duty of the individual or paper to stand up for and defend the home and fireside first, the town or community next, then the county, the state and the nation.

It does not require any repetition of the facts to prove to any one, that neither Artesia nor its citizens, have had anything like fair treatment from the political gang at Carlsbad that poses as the democratic party. The people here have been excessively taxed, they have been denied proper representation in the commissioners' districts of county, and in the recent campaign as well as others, candidates here have been combined against and the prejudices of the people of the re-

mainder of the county aroused against them.

There is no democracy in such conduct as the Carlsbad gang has been guilty. It is no more honest nor democratic than the action of the republican gang in the heavy republican counties where they have voted or rather counted whatever was necessary to win.

A gangster-continuous-office-holder has no political principles. With him it is anything to win, regardless of the means. Such conduct has changed republican counties to democratic control in other parts of New Mexico, and if the people had another chance at the situation, it would result in some boss ridden and gang-ruled democratic counties setting aside the outfit that seek only their own gain. There is no political principles involved with such men—in either party.

The Advocate is against such political gangs of any party. Tammany in New York city is a disgrace and stench in the nostrils of all decent people, and that gang has just been repudiated, because Governor Dix turned the state government over to Boss Murphy of Tammany—and they ought to have been repudiated.

Ohio cities have repudiated the republican gangs that have held sway, and so the people will do elsewhere—in future—more so than in the past.

## The World in Turmoil.

Just now the temple of Janus appears to be open, with the front door firmly braced against the wall. There is the Turco-Italian affair that appears to have gotten outside of all the rules of gentlemanly conflict, with its charges of massacre of women and children made against the Roman forces and the counter charges of indiscriminate slaughter lodged against the Turco-Moorish allies. An appeal for intervention on the part of the United States has been lodged by the Ottomans, but this has been so quickly followed by reports of bloody reprisals by the protesting party that he may stay his hand, exclaiming with fervor; "A plague on both your houses."

Then there is the revolution in China, resulting in the threatened capture of Peking by

the insurgents and preparation for flight of the ruling Manchus. Here are fertile grounds for the deepest concern on the part of most of the commercial nations of the globe. Treaties are likely to be smashed in the midst of this tremendous melee, involving as it does the greatest homogeneous population on the globe. By the rule of contraries this most conservative of nations, having started on a career of radicalism, is likely to plunge into the horrors of anarchy before order can be evolved from the present turmoil. A republic has already been proclaimed by one of the victorious generals, but this is likely to come to naught for the genius of the Chinese people runs counter to the fundamental idea of a republic.

Then there are Chili and Peru renewing an ancient quarrel over the boundary between the two countries. Neither is disposed to back down, and neither can retreat from its position, because of the constitutional inhibition against the surrender of any territory of the fatherland. Peru is handicapped by a similiar situation with Ecuador, but is bravely striving to hold both her ancient enemies at bay.

The domestic tribulations of Spain are complicated by the fomentation of a revolt against the republic of Portugal by the partisans of ex-King Manuel. Fighting on either side of the frontier might involve the whole Iberian peninsula in the throes of revolution.

What a chance for hard work and intricate diplomacy, could all the controversies be submitted at once to The Hague for adjustment.

## Cuff and Collar Sets.

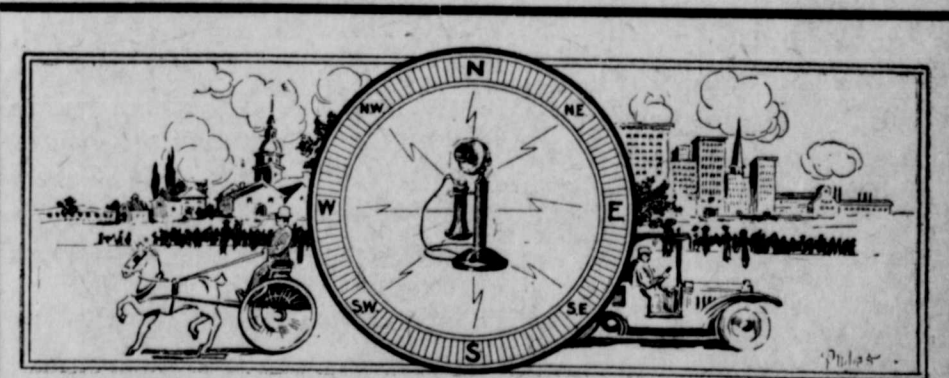

### INSTITUTE TEAM THE WINNER.

#### Snappy Game of Foot Ball Between Roswell and Artesia Teams.

(Roswell Morning News.)

The first football game of the season to be played on the New Mexico Military Institute grounds took place Saturday morning at 11 o'clock, the Cadets playing the Western College team of Artesia. The play was scheduled for 10 o'clock, but a heavy wind, accompanied by clouds of dust, made it almost impossible for the teams to take the field.

After an hour's delay, however, it was apparent that the wind would not subside, so it was decided to start the game in spite of weather conditions.

Artesia won the toss and chose to defend the south goal. The institute made three futile attempts at a kickoff, each time the ball being carried out of bounds by the wind. In accordance with the rules, the ball was then given to Artesia, who kicked off to the Cadets' 10-yard line.

The game was intended simply as practice for the Institute, but Artesia proved stronger than was expected, and for the

first quarter held the soldiers scoreless.

The first count came soon after the opening of the second quarter when the Institute's fullback, Lowry, went over the line for a touchdown and Thompson kicked a difficult goal. Shortly afterward Artesia attempted a play which resulted in an "incompleted forward pass," and should rightfully have been returned to the point where it was put in play. However, the ball was carried from the middle of the field to the goal line by an Artesia player, the Cadets making no attempt to stop

the runner, as the play was obviously illegal.

When the referee called for the ball to be returned, Artesia claimed a touchdown in spite of the interpretation of the rules sent out by the national rules committee. They childishly refused to continue to play unless a touchdown was allowed. Rather than have the game stopped and disappoint the crowd, the Institute permitted the score to be counted. While the Western team showed a lack of familiarity with the rules, yet they displayed considerable ability.

In the last half, however, the Cadets' superior training and physical condition became apparent and they twice again crossed the line.

The only substantial gains which Artesia was able to make were two end runs by their coach, Prof. Huff, of Tulane, whom the Institute permitted to play with his team.

Wind and dust made it necessary for both teams to play old style football and forward passes and open play were scarcely attempted. As the play yesterday on account of the weather was little more than a practice scrimmage, the official game will take place in Artesia next Saturday November 18.
