This display of apples car ried to Denver, is a part of the exhibit that was at our Alfalfa Festival and also at Roswell Exposition, where it aided in taking the fine silyer cup for est display of fruit
In this lastexhibit, there was competition with apples from the entire West, where they are supposed to grow the prize apples and the Artesia product gain comes out first best.
Messrs. Cecil and Love are deserving of the thanks of the people here for going to the expense and trouble to tak he apples to Denver for dis play
These repeated premiums and ribbons for fruit will soon convince the country at large what we have known for some time-and that is, this imme diate section cannot be beat in the world, for the growing of fruit.

## THE BANDITS KILL OFFICERS.

Leader of Bandits Also Killed and Another Wounded.--Two Escape.

Deming, N. M., Nov. 20.-A battle that has been daily ex pected between the various posses headed by the Deming officers and the three outlaws has taken place at the Cross T ranch about 85 miles northwest of Engle. The poss Stephens, asist by Stephens, assisted by deputie Hall, Smithers and Simpson came upon the outlaws from behind a ridge of hills. A fierce fight followed in which officers Al Smithers and Tom Hall were instantly killed, one outlaw was killed, another wounded, the wounded outlaw together with the third mem ber of their gang, escaped

Two of these outlaws were the men who held up the jailor at Deming on the evening of November 17th and released one of the inmates, John Sates. Thomas H. Hall, one of the posse that was killed, leayes a wife and five children. Mr. Hall first came to this part of New Mexico in 1884; his home is at Nutt station. He was a prominent cattleman was a prominent cattleman and P. Hall, who resides at Hach a.

Allen Le Rue Smithers has resided at Deming for several months and during this time has been connected with the sheriff's office on various occasions. He came to Deming from Clifton, Ariz. He has a brother living at Deming.
John Greer, the outlaw who was killed in the battle with the officers, has been identified as being the leader of the bandits who held up the automo bile last August as it was go ing from Santa Rita to Hurley The bandits then supposed hat the money to be used to pay off the employes at Hurley was being carried in the automobile at that time.
Greer was also wounded in the battle of Casas Grandes, Mexico, during the recent revoution. Greer, it is said, leaves bad record and was known as a dead shot with a rifle. In his pockets were found the keys to the jail at Deming, together with a Colt's revolver that was taken from one of the deputies at the time of the jail delivery.

Well, the work has finally been begun, and it is a safe bet that there will be no cessation until the structure is completed The depot will cost about $\$ 12,000,00$ and will be of brick and stone trimmings. It will and stone trimmings. It will be exclusively a passenger station, and roomy enough for the uture growth assured Artesia. The railroad track is being torn up along where will be the west side of the depot, so there will be no obstruction in reaching the depot from town. As has previously been stated, the old depot will be moved and remodeled so as to propen y be fit for a freight warehouse. This will also be a great conrenience to the business men and freight bandlers here. Stock pens, which this town has never had, and always needed, since it became a staion, will be put north of the reight depot
Ample trackage will also be put in, and in fact, the Santa Fe is apparently going to do a nice job of preparing for the handling of its large volume business, which so far has neyer been appreciated to that extent.

DYNAMITE DITCHING
The Experiment to be Tried Near Artesia on Dec. 14th.

Roswell, N. M., Nov. 20, 1911. Artesia Advocate
I have just received a letter from the Du Pont Powder Company setting date for public demonstration in blowing out open drain ditches with dynamite at Artesia on December 14th. I wish you would make this fact known through your columns.
There is considerable drainage work to be done in the vicinity of Arlesia which can be more cheaply done by the use of dynamite than any other method. The channel of the Cottonwood needs enlarging for a considerable distance on the lower end clear up to the railroad track, or possibly tarther, which is a distance o probably three or four miles,
and the lakes on the flat southand the lakes on the flat south-
east of Artesia, starting at the east of Artesia, starting at the
Sperry and Lukins place and Sperry and Lukins place and
extending down to the Hastie pasture, need a large outlet. Mr. Hastie and a few others of us made a small test of this method of digging ditches in
these flats some months ago these flats some months ago
which was sufficient to convince most of us that this method of construction will be successful, and the Du Pont

that this demonstration is to be made is not yet published, and if any one near the city has a place where they would like to have a large drain ditch something not less than six feet wide on the bottom and not less than six feet deep, and in a location where it will be convenient for the public to visit it, it might be well for either to myself at Roswell the E. In this method of digging digches where it is desired to of probably six feet, a width holes are made along the cen ter line of the ditch, probably wo or three feet apart, and a depth approximately equal to the desired depth of the ditch, and these holes are loaded with dynamite according to the fall and dimensions of the ditch desired, and a section of ditch varying from probably 100 fee o one quarter of
time. It is only necessary to put cap and fuse to the charge in one of the holes, usually in
the middle hole in the line bethe middle hole in the line be-
ing used for this purpose. The ing used for this purpose. The
explosion of this charge of ynamite explodes the charges in the other holes, and in wet round blows all the dirt and other material to both sides leaving the ditch complete. The cost of digging ditches by his method is usually very mall compared to that of any ther method and the people Artesia should take an in ut in in this work and turn ut in large numbere and see what can be done.
