#### Lieut. Crawford **Hughes Tells Of** Experience In Jungle

Lieutenant Crawford Hughes of the United States Army Air Forces, recently returned from the jungles of New Brittain Island in the South Pacific spoke Sunday morning at the Methodist Church and at the Baptist Church at the evening hour. Both churches were filled to capacity

to hear Lieut. Hughes, tell of the harrowing experiences of himself and companions during the ten months spent in the jungles, ever on the alert to keep out of the way of the Japs.

Lieut. Hughes tells the experiences of himself and his companions in a quiet way with no complaint, but impreses you with his complete faith in God and his belief that prayer by himself, his companions and his loved ones at home brought them safely through what seemed many times was almost certain death or capture by the Japs.

Lieut. Hughes, 23, is the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Hughes, He was born at Belle Plain where he attended school the first five years of his school career Mrs. Olaf South, of Baird was his teacher, and no one was happier to welcome him home than Mrs. South. He later attended Baird High School graduating in 1935 being Valedictorian of his class and his sister Clara Nell, 15 months his senior, being Salutatorian of the class. He Abilene in July, 1941, when he enlisted in the Army Air Corps and received his basic training at Ryan Field, Hermet, Calif. Later he was sent to Maxwell Field, Montgomery Ala., and the Pan-American Airlines school of Navagation at Miami Fla., where he was graduated and received his second lieutenant's com-

mission, Jan 17, 1942. He sailed for the Australian war area some weeks later.

On /May 24, 1942 while on a bombing mission over Rabaul, one engine of their bomber, a B-26,Glen Martin two-motored ship, was hit by anti air craft fire, one motor being shot out. The ship was flown about one hundred miles before crashing about a mile from shore. There were eight men in the ship, two lost their lives in the crash, the other five made their way to shore with the aid of natives. Lieut. Hughes had a severe leg wound, a cut near his right eye and a wound in the side.

They were fortunate to come in contact with a German and Australian Missionaries who gave them a small amount of medicine supplies, some food and cooking utensils.

They lived on the food of the natives mostly toro-a sort of potato. They also raised gardens. Later when fear of capture by the Japs become more apparent they went back in the mountains where one of their companions died and was buried by his companions. Two other of the five left were later captured by the Daps being betrayed by natives, many of whom were unfriendly.

The three left were Lieut. Hughes Lieut Eugene Wallace, of Los Angeles, Calif., and Sgt. Dale E. Broadner, Chillicothe, Ohio, They all suffered with malaria, hunger and want of water.

Lieutenant Sundarman is one of five sons, all in the service. His brothers are, Ens J. E. Sunderman, stationed with the Navy air force in Dallas; Cpl. J. E. Sunderman, San Angelo: Pvt. Frank T. Sunderman, stationed in the air force school at Oklahoma A and M colleke; and Pfc. Eugene Sunderman, Camp Ruskin, Ala.

The flyer was born in St. Mary's West Virginia, on Aug 26 1918, and moved to Phtnam in 1926, entering the second grade in school. He was graduated from high school and Howard Payne college where he majored in history and was an outstanding, football player.

He was called to active duty with the Army air forces Nov. 23, 1941, and received his wings at Victorville, Calif., in May, 1942. The following September hewas sent overseas to Australia. Upon his arrival in Australia, he wrote that pilots were allowed to name their Flying Fortresses and he was planning to christen his ship Liver Lip

For eight and one-half months they did not see a plane, but finally a reconnissance plane came over, but they were unable to attract their attention-but, on March 6th they managed to attract the attention of a B-24 by flashing a mirror The plane dropped a message telling them to identify themselves, which they did, and on March 25th at 2 o'clock in the morning the party was rescrued by a flying boat, and on March 30th Lieut. Hughes, who was reported missing in acton on May 24,1942 cabled hs parents, Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Hughes of his safety.



1% to 2 lbs. dressed rabbit 11/2 teaspoons salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 1 slightly beaten egg

2 tablespoons water

1 cup fine, dry bread crumbs Wash and wipe rabbit with damp Cut into 6 pieces for serving. Add salt and pepper to beaten egg. Dip rabbit pieces into egg mixture, then in crumbs. Brown in 1/4 inch hot fat. Then reduce heat, cover and cook slowly 30 minutes longer, or until ten-der. Serves 3 to 4. Serve on a bed of boiled rice with brown gravy. FOR BROWNING GRAVY, drain off all fat remaining in pan except 3 tablespoons. Blend in 3 tablespoons flour, % tea-spoon salt and % teaspoon pepper. Cock, stirring until brown. Stir in 1½ cups water or rabbit stock. Boif 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Serve at once.
