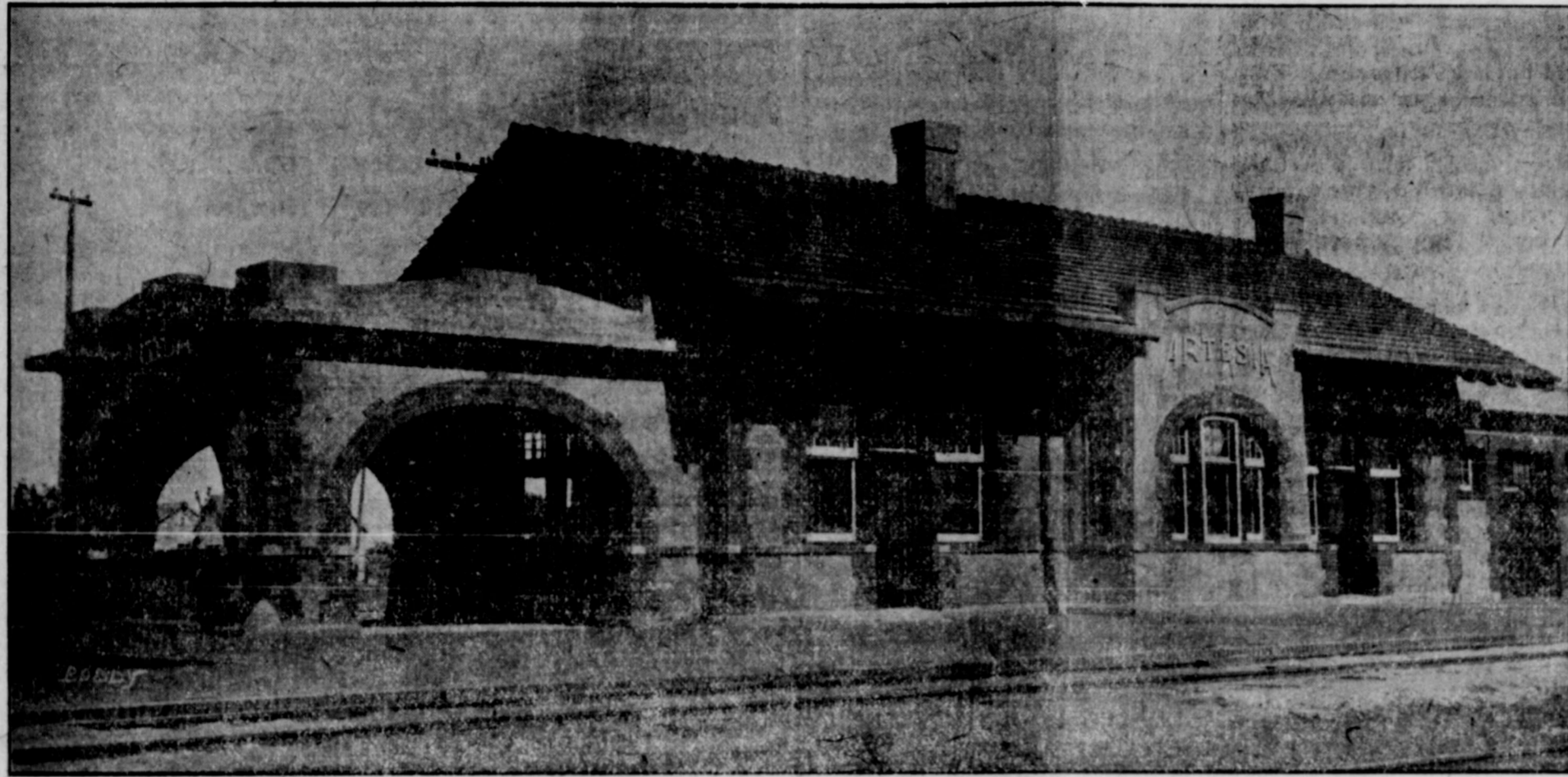

R. 26, thence West 18 miles to the place of beginning.

Artesia has been busy the past week preparing for the May Festival, an event that had been planned for several months.

The MacDowell Club of Artesia had arranged to give a concert April 30th while the Monday Musical Club of Roswell had kindly consented to furnish a program on May 1st.

Tuesday afternoon as the south bound train came to our handsome new depot, the flying colors of the automobile parade attracted the attention of all by-standers while the guests who came from Roswell were driven about over our town.

In the evening the MacDowell Club rendered the Rose Maiden in oratorio form. The soloists were Mrs. Nell Withington Gates, Miss Freda Hecht Mr. I. N. Corrington, Mr. Walter Kauffman, with Miss Nell Lucile Sullivan director and Miss Lillian McIlhany accompanist.

The MacDowell Club was up to its usual standard and the concert given was greatly appreciated.

The C. Major of this life; so now I will try to sleep.
