PEARSON ROAD MAY BUILD THROUGH ARTESIA AND THE PECOS VALLEY FROM EL PASO TO QUANAH

Dr. Pearson's Mexico North Western railway line may be extended east from El Paso to Quanah, or some other point in the Panhandle where a direct eastern connection can be made with the railroads of the Panhandle. Dr. B. H. Bryant, chief engineer of the Mexico North Western railroad, left El Paso Thursday afternoon to make an inspection of the country between El Paso and Artesia. Before leaving Dr. Bryant was in consultation with county surveyor J. W. Eubank regarding the location of the surveyed line, which was made by A. Courchesne and his associates out of El Paso for the Panhandle.

It is known that the Pearson company has been looking for an outlet to the east for its milling products of the Madera, Pearson and El Paso lumber mills. The survey which was made by engineers employed by Mr. Courchesne and his associates, is considered the shortest route to the Panhandle and the eastern railroad connections.

More than six months ago the El Paso men were in conference with representatives of Dr. Pearson. Nothing was done regarding the new railroad deal at that time. But the arrival of Dr. Bryant in El Paso Monday and his departure Thursday for an overland trip along the route of the "El Paso Short Line" survey has revived the report that Dr. Pearson will build a road east from El Paso through Artesia to Quanah, or some other point in the Panhandle. Once the line is built, connections could be made with the Frisco line, giving the company an outlet direct into St. Louis and the east. In return the Frisco would be given entry into El Paso, by a route much shorter than any now reaching El Paso, also by connecting with the Mexico North Western at El Paso, the Frisco would have an outlet to Mexico, which could be extended from Chihuahua to the west coast by a route which would give the Pearson-Frisco line monopoly over a large virgin field in Mexico.

Dr. Bryant took only a camp cook and sleeping outfit, as the line has already been surveyed and the grade stakes established. Upon the report which he will make to Dr. Pearson will depend the fate of El Paso's newest railroad.

Dr. Bryant was particularly anxious regarding the water to be found at various points along the route and will make a careful inspection of this feature of the "El Paso Short Line" survey.—El Paso Herald 13th inst.

Storing Oil.

Sometime ago Oklahoma parties purchased the land on which the Williams oil well is located east of Dayton. These people have installed a system of iron tanks through which they run the water from the artesian well and by the means of which successfully separate the oil from the water. The outfit has been working only a week or so, but already a large tank of oil has been stored and the system has proven a perfect success. Several barrels of oil gathered each day. The oil has been thorough tested and is of high quality.

Survey on Quanah Route.

The engineering crew of the Quanah, Acme & Pacific railway, a branch of the Frisco system, has taken the field to locate a route west of Paducah. The new route will be the main line to El Paso and the Pacific coast.—Ft. Worth Record.

Big Hay Crop at Spur.

A. C. Jorns, who is weighing hay at the Spur below Artesia this season, states that he has weighed 200 cars already for shipment. There were 460 cars shipped from that point last season besides many cars that were stored and were loaded out later in fall and winter. It is believed that the crop this year will be greater than last season. The quality so far has been good for there has been but little rain to spoil hay.

Grinding Alfalfa.

The Alfalfa mill here is running steadily now, operating a day and night force. Hay is coming in as fast as the mill can grind it and the big 150 horse power engine is doing the work nicely. The Askew warehouse is being used to store alfalfa meal and cars are being shipped daily to market.

It Means Another Trans-Continental IF FRISCO AND NORTH-WEST- ERN COME TOGETHER

Of Great Import to El Paso and
Southwest—Will Open Port
of Agiabampo.

[El Paso Times 14th inst]

The story printed in the Times of the proposed extension of the Mexico North Western railway from El Paso to Quanah, Tex., is of import to this city and the great southwest. Additional information shows that it means an outlet of the great Frisco railroad system to the Gulf of California.

The Frisco now has its Southwestern terminal at Quanah. The construction of the Mexico North-Western line from Quanah to El Paso would extend the Frisco line through this connection to the continental divide in Chihuahua in a southwesternly line.

It was learned yesterday that the Mexico North-Western has five corps of engineers now at work from the Continental divide to the Gulf of California. The first corps is now located on the Rio Chico, west of Cumbre, which is 215 miles from El Paso. The North Western is now building a timber or logging line through the great Mesa Grande timber limits from Cumbre to Maiceb and El Tigre and across the Rio Melates and Tutuaca rivers. Later this timber and logging branch will be converted into a freight and passenger division.

From El Tigre and Sebastapal another link, which has been surveyed will be constructed to Agiabampo, a port on Gulf of California, and which is destined to be one of the largest terminals and ports of entry on the entire west coast.

With the completion of these three links—from El Paso to Quanah, from Cumbre or Divide to El Tigre and from El Tigre and Agiabampo—the Frisco system would have a direct line from the East clear through to the Pacific, and be in a position to establish an immense traffic after the opening of the Panama canal.

On the other hand, the North Western would gain an entrance to the important lumber markets of the central states served by the Frisco and its connections.

Carlsbad Shipping Peaches.

Carlsbad has just loaded and started on its way to market the first car of peaches for this year's crop. The fruit is fancy grade and are picked and packed under expert direction of a representative of the buyers from New York, to which market they go direct.

Mr. Ray is representative of the manufacturers of the Ford Machines for Eddy County in which Artesia is situated.

The party left Artesia June 10, last. They have traveled leisurely visiting points where scenery or other conditions were interesting to them, among others the Grand Canyon, petrified forests, some of the bi mines and several Indian Reservations. Going first to Northern New Mexico they turned west and traveled in that direction as far as Prescott.

Thence south to Phoenix and on to Yuma. From here they will go to Los Angeles and travel up and down the Coast seeing the interesting points and enjoying outdoor life in every way possible. Dr. Allison and family are likely to remain in San Diego. The others will return to New Mexico in the Autumn.—Yuma Ariz. Morning Sun.

If Artesia will raise \$1,000.00
in cash and turn over to the
commissioners, the County will
give another \$1,000.00, and the
state \$2,000.00 additional mak-
ing \$4,000.00 in all with which
to expend on building a high
grade, and a lasting road
through the deep sands be-
tween here and the Cap Rock.

The entire construction will
be done under the direct super-
vision of the state engineer,
and nothing but a first class
road will receive the attention
from the engineer. The road
will cost about \$1,000.00 per
mile, and will be such as Carls-
bad has now and other places
over the country and they re-
ceived their money in the same
manner as given here. Some
of the Carlsbad road has been
built something like two years
and has proven entirely satis-
factory. Every one knows the
value this road will be to Ar-
tesia as we are not getting any
trade from there at all. We
have a \$15,000.00 bridge
across the Pecos that is only
rusting out and doing no one
any good.

Over half of the money is in
sight three business men in
town will carry the big end of
the load.

The effort to put this through
will be continued until it is
done.

Ordinance No. ----

An Ordinance in relation to
Prize Fighting and other dis-
orderly Conduct and Assem-
blies.

Be it Ordained by the Board
of Trustees of the Town of Ar-
tesia, New Mexico, as follows:

Section 1.—That hereafter,
any person or persons who
shall engage in a prize fight,
slugging match or in any other
contests within the use of phys-
ical force upon the body of one
or more of such contesting
parties is the gist or substance
of the contest, in any private or
public place within the Town
of Artesia, New Mexico, shall,
upon conviction, for each of-
fense, be adjudged guilty of
disorderly conduct and fined
One Hundred Dollars and im-
prisoned in the common jail of
said town for a period of Thirty
Days.

Section 2.—Any persons who
shall attend any such exhibi-
tion as a spectator, wherever
the same may be given or car-
ried on within the said Town
of Artesia, shall, upon convic-
tion, be adjudged guilty of par-
ticipating in a disorderly
assembly and be fined One
Hundred Dollars and impris-
oned in the common jail of
said town for a period of Thirty
Days.

3. Any person permitting
the use of premises owned or
leased by him or her, within
the said Town of Artesia,
whether the same be private
premises or places of public
amusement or for the carrying
on of any private or public bus-
iness, for any of the purposes
herein above prohibited, shall,
upon conviction, be adjudged
guilty of maintaining a disor-
derly assembly and public nu-
isance, and be fined One Hun-
dred Dollars and imprisoned
in the common jail of said
Town of Artesia for a period of
Thirty Days.

4. It shall be the duty of any
and all police officers of said
Town of Artesia to arrest such
participants, spectators and
other persons guilty under this
ordinance, immediately, when-
ever any such exhibition or
contest is being begun or at-
tempted and effectually pre-
vent the carrying on of the
same, and such officer or offi-
cers may require any male citi-
zen above the age of twenty-
one years who resides in said
Town of Artesia, to assist him
in making said arrest, and any
such citizen, who having been
requested to assist such officer
as aforesaid, shall fail or refuse
to do the same, shall, upon con-
viction, be adjudged guilty of
a misdemeanor, and fined One
Hundred Dollars and impris-
oned in the common jail of said
town for a period of Thirty
Days

Section 5.—This ordinance as
proposed, shall be published
one time in THE ARTESIA
ADVOCATE, a weekly news-
paper of general circulation
published in said Town of Ar-
tesia, before it's final passage,
and if approved upon it's final
passage shall be published
thereafter two times in said
paper after which it shall be
and become in full force and
effect.
