London, June 30 .- The tragedy that has befallen the ill-fated house of -apsburg, according to news reaching London, was the result of a carefully prepared Servian nationalist plot in revenge for the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina, which defeated the dreams and aspirations of creating a greater Servia.

The assassins of the Archduke Francis Ferdinand and his wife have confessed that the plot was matured at Belgrade. The terrible event is only another illustration of how well justified is the anxiety always present in the minds of European politicians and diplomats about the unstable conditions prevailing in the Balkans and even in the dual monarchy itself.

The anxiety is considered likely to increase during the short period before the aged emperor who alone is believed able to hold together the heterogeneous components of the Austro-Hungarian empire, finally disappears from the scene. 


