PLANTING FOR NATION'S LIFE

This war will tax to the utmost the nation's resources in men and money, manufactured products and food stuffs. This is not an alarmist view, but is held by the highest authorities. The President said in his proclamation on April 15: "and to the shipbuilder the thought that the life of this war depends upon him. The food and war supplies must be carried across the seas no matter how many ships are sent to the bottom. The places of those that go down must be supplied at once."

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The food supply of the world today is alarmingly short, even though the submarines should spread no more of it upon the bottom of the seas. When it becomes necessary to furnish enough for the scourges of the sea to prey upon, and then to supply the nations that are fighting for humanity and the preservation of civilization, it is easy to see that the task Americans really is stupendous.

Men and women in every state in the Union are rising to the occasion and doing their

whole duty. The biggest and busiest men in New Mexico, answering the call of Governor Lindsey, have abruptly quit their work and come to Santa Fe to form the Permanent War Committee, which is organizing all of the state's latent resources. They are serving without pay and without any hope of reward, other than their own consciousness of duty well done. In addition, some of them are spending thousands of dollars of their own money, to plant beans, potatoes, and other food crops.

Unless New Mexico should make an enormous increase in her food production, some of her citizens will go hungry before the beginning of another year. Not to put too fine a point upon the situation some of those with small earning capacity may starve. Every square yard made to produce food will tend to relieve the situation in proportion to its area.

State Highway Commission

Passes Timely Resolution

At a meeting of the State
Highway Commission held in
the city of Santa Fe, on the
21st day of April, 1917, the fol-
lowing resolution was adopted:

RESOLUTION I.

Whereas it is necessary at

this crisis in the life of the
nation, and in view of the
threatened shortage of food-
stuffs in the United States and
in the world, that all the ener-
gies of the people be exerted to
the fullest extent for the plant-
ing and production of grain
and other crops; therefore

Be it Resolved, that it is the
sense of the State Highway
Commission that road work
except emergency work, be
suspended during the planting
season, and that all the equip-
ment and facilities of the State
Highway Commission and of
the several counties of the
State be utilized as far as
practicable to assist in prepar-
ing ground and planting and
cultivating crops.

**Home Defense League
At Lakewood.**

Lakewood, N. M., May 1.—
In common with every other
town in the Pecos valley, and
nearly all the cities in New
Mexico and Arizona, the cit-
izens of Lakewood have per-
fected the organization of a
Home Defense league, for
mutual protection, during the
continuance of the war be-
tween the United States and
Germany. Being so close to
the Mexican border, the forma-
tion of this league was deemed
to be a matter alike of prudence
and necessity.

Sale of all firearms and am-
munition to minors and aliens
has been forbidden. If known
to be a reliable citizen, one
may buy a reasonable amount
of ammunition, but in each
case the quantity, calibre and
name must be recorded by the
clerk who sells it.

Any person, man or boy,
who needlessly fires a gun,
thereby causing a false alarm,
or who uses the telephone
needlessly after 9 p. m. will
be punished. An alarm, it
given must mean something.

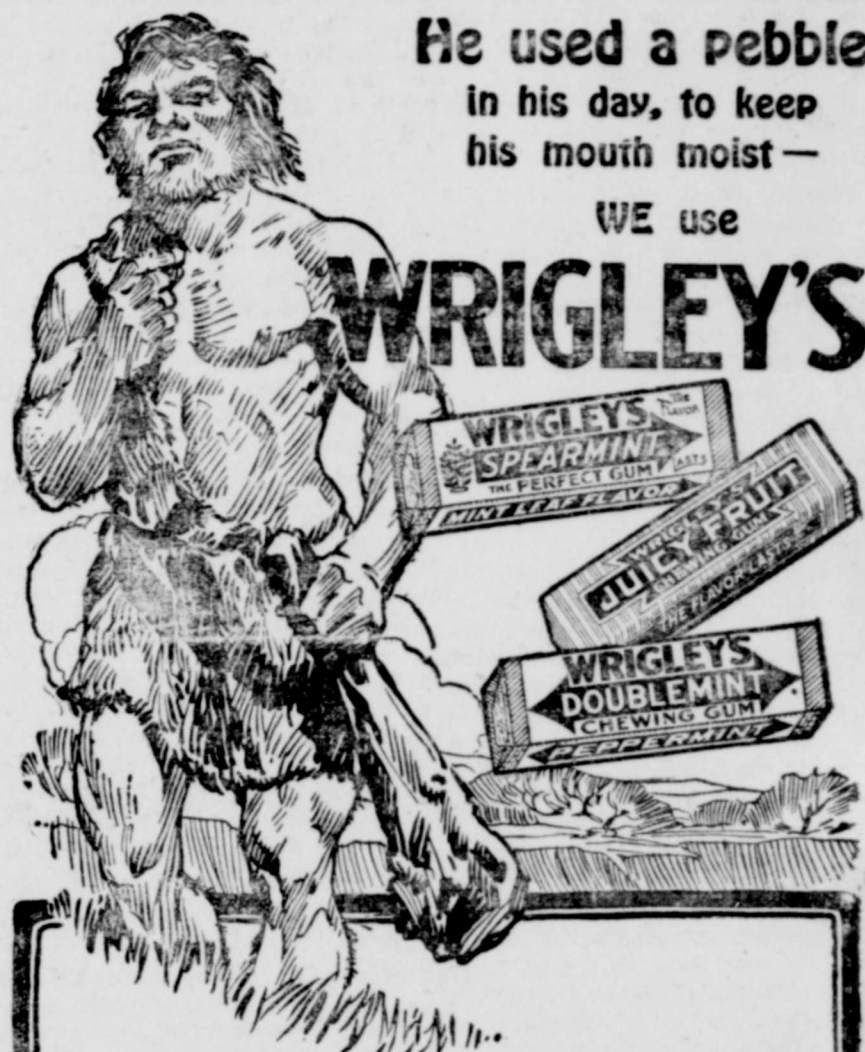
