TEXAS CAMPS ARE CHOSEN

FORT WORTH, HOUSTON, WACO ARE THE LUCKY CITIES.

SAN ANTONIO GETS LARGE ONE

Tarrant County Capital of Opinion Fifty Thousand National Guardsmen From All Over the Land Will Be Trained There.

The following national army cantonment sites were announced by the war department:

Little Rock, Louisville, Battle Creek and Fort Sam Houston.

Following national guard camps were also announced: Fort Worth, Deming, N. M.; Waco, Houston, Fort Sill, Okla., and Linda Vista, Cal.

The choice of Petersburg, Va., for a national army cantonment site was revoked.

News of the selection of Fort Worth as one of six national guard training camps was received with great rejoicing at that city.

It is thought by citizens that 50,000 national guardsmen from all over the United States will be camped there to be trained for service and that about \$800,000 will be spent each month to maintain them.

The camp also will cause numbers of visitors to fill hotels and cause a general revival of business.

American Ship Submerged.

An American vessel, the Magnan, has been sunk by bombs and gunfire from a German submarine. The crew reached Faro safely.

Some Expenses.

Great Britain is spending 7,750,000 pounds a day (\$37,277,500) in the war. Chancellor of the Exchequer Bonar Law told British house of commons

Sheppard Bill Reported.

A big step toward national prohibition was taken when the senate judiciary committee reported the Sheppard prohibition bill with the recommendation that it be adopted by the senate. A second step in the same direction was taken when the senate committee on agriculture voted to report out a bill restricting liquor manufacture for the purpose of conserving the food supply. Senate finance committee decided recently to put into the war tax bill a prohibitive tax on distilled liquor. The Leever food control bill was ordered favorably reported by the house agriculture committee. Its becoming a law would give the president power to name Herbert Hoover food administrator.

LOVE RESTRAINED, TUCKER ALSO.

In addition to temporary restraining order applying to University of Texas Regents Mathis, Kelley and Fly, a similar order applying to Regent W. G. Love was granted at Austin by Judge Ireland Graves. These regents are restrained from dismissing John A. Lomax and other university employees. Petition alleges a conspiracy to that end. He also disposed of the John W. Hornsby quo warranto proceedings against Dr. J. P. Tucker of Galveston by continuing in force, for this term of the Twenty-Sixth district court, the temporary restraining order preventing Dr. Tucker acting or attempting to act as a regent. At the fall term there will be a hearing, if necessary, to determine whether the temporary order shall be made permanent. The order against the regents cannot be made permanent because the court is now in recess.

New Compress Company.

Waco Compress company has been organized with a capital stock of \$100,000 for the purpose of building a new compress at that city. It is understood that a north Texas compress will be moved there to furnish the nucleus for this plant.

To Secure Riot Guns.

Ten riot guns of 30-30 caliber will be purchased by Fort Worth at an early date and an armory established. Police will use them to protect packeries, refineries or other large industries or to suppress riots should any occur.

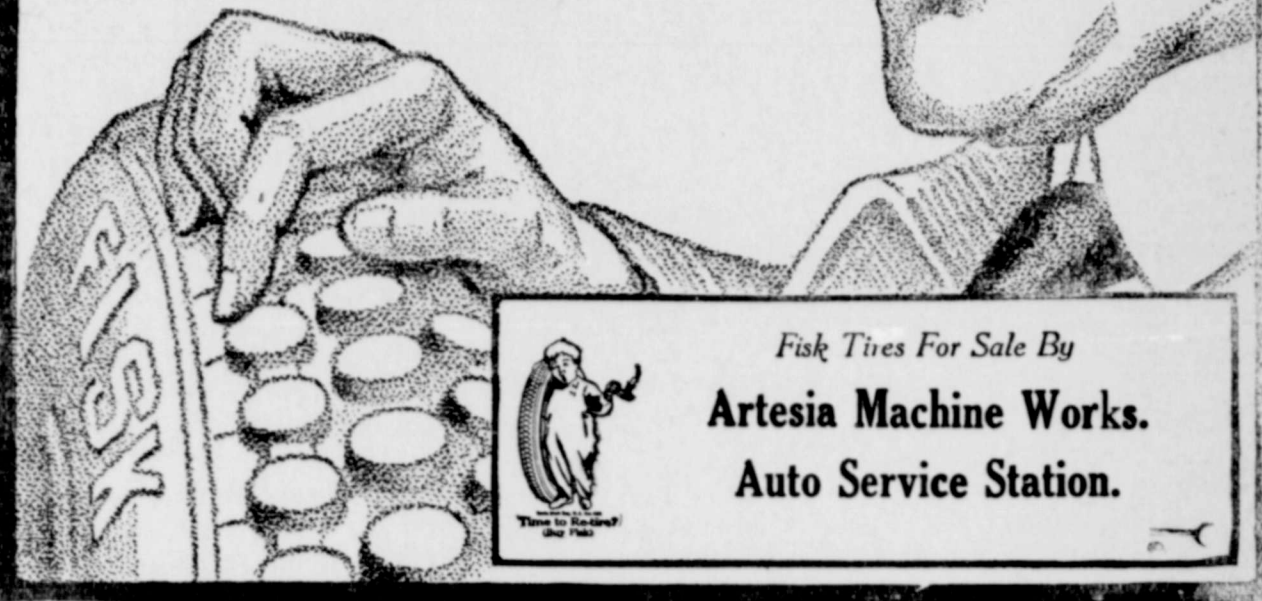
