The Mexola Oil Co. received the shipment of a new pumping outfit, Wednesday, for the Brown well and same will be promptly installed. The new pump is expected to deliver about 200 barrels of oil per day.

Drilling Work Resumed On Altus Well

Charles Sherman of Tulsa, Oklahoma, head driller for the Mexola Oil Co., is now at work cleaning at out and deepening the Altus well. This well, like the Brown well, just reaches the shallow oil sands, below the artesian strata, and if 100 to 200 barrels of oil per day can be produced from the shallow sands, something big may be expected when the deeper oil strata reached.

armies as well as those of our allies in this greatest conflict the world has ever witnessed.

We have the money, we have the brave men to fill up our armies but we must confess to the world that we haven't enough bread for our own, to say nothing of our obligations to our allies. Hence, we are now facing this crisis with empty graneries and empty corn cribs and still we are astonished at prices going higher and higher every month, but so far as our part of the war is concerned we haven't got started and it will take many months yet to get our armies ready for this great struggle, and it is high time that we who cannot enlist and go to the front can wake up the fact that the boys in the uniforms have got to depend upon us to feed them while they lay down their lives to save and protect the honor of our nation.

We believe every farmer is loyal and brave and when he can he will do his best to help relieve the serious food condition and we want to say that if the farmers will, this fall, begin to plant and plan for next year's production of bread we can and will say not only to our own armies, "we will feed you well while you fight" but we can say to our war impoverished Allies, "we will divide our abundance with you."

We have hundreds of acres in the Pecos Valley that will grow wheat and from the yield that men have made in wheat in the Valley it is very profitable, with the high prices it is bringing, and it is a crop that can be handled while the water is not needed for alfalfa or other crops, and the wheat can be harvested at a time when the farmer, if he has the water, can raise a good feed crop on the same field, and by this method of crop rotation the farmer is helping to feed the world and still provide feed for his live stock.

We would like to urge the farmers of this part of the Valley to plant for this fall grain crop and do your best to plow up a few acres of your land and plant it to wheat and use your surplus water this winter when you are not needing it for other crops and you will be surprised at what you can do with a few acres. The seed wheat can be secured from the Carlsbad project, as several good fields of wheat have been grown this year. Anyone interested in this proposition can get valuable information from the Co. Agent, Mr. J. W. Knorr or Mr. H. L. Muncy, President of the local organization.

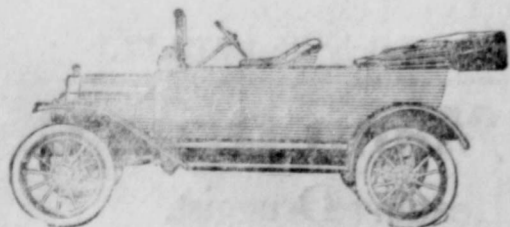

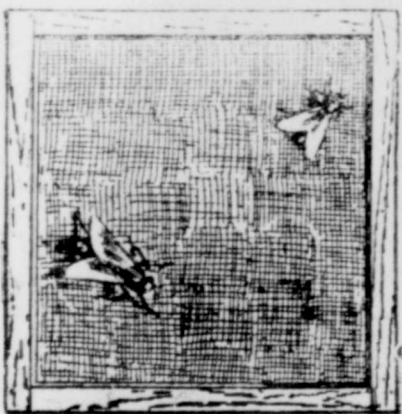

Pleasure Car Motor Sets New Records

Haynes Light Twelve Engine Which Won 100 Mile Chicago Classic Was Taken From Branch Manager's car.

89 Miles Per Hour the Speed.

Chicago, June 20 (Special) The Haynes "Light Twelve" which set the new amateur record for 100 miles at the Chicago Auto Derby Saturday June 16 and made a new non-stop record, had under its hood the engine which H. E. Doty, Chicago Branch Manager for the Haynes, has been using in his pleasure car the past winter.

Mr. Doty never expected his engine to win such signal fame. It has the regular stock valves and stock displacement. He had driven it over 3,000 for personal pleasure. Not having time, prior to the race, to limber up the engine sent from the factory, it was at the last moment decided to use Mr. Doty's stock engine instead.

A Hard Won Victory.

Percy Ford, Jr., an amateur driver and salesman at the Chicago Branch, lined up against an array of special \$4,000 racing cars. Fender against fender the Haynes Light Twelve and another contestant battled for nearly forty of the two-mile rounds, each fiercely fighting for leadership, and averaging 90 miles per hour.

Thereafter the lead was securely in the grasp of the Haynes. Without one stop for adjustment or tires, the Haynes completed the century at an average of 89 miles per hour, the new record for amateurs. Ford says he always had plenty of power in reserve and that if he had been pushed harder he would have maintained an even greater speed.

Despite this terrific tax upon his engine, following the capture of the trophy cup offered to the winner, Ford found his 12 cylinder power plant in even better shape than before the race and drove home in his racer.

A "Quarter Century" Engine.

That a stock 13-cylinder engine could be taken from a pleasure car, hurriedly fitted into a racing chassis and emerge triumphant from a hotly contested 100-mile race without even a suggestion of mechanical trouble during the grind or afterwards, speaks well for the engine which the Haynes people build. The Haynes engines have always been built by the Haynes factory and the twelve thus results from approximately a quarter century of engine manufacturing success.

Ford, the same driver, a year ago attained a 72 mile per hour gait in a Haynes Light Six on the same Speedway. A special gear ratio was used.

The Haynes Light Twelve used a set of Goodyear Cord Tires, which had previously been in two other races.

Oil News.

Millon McWorter, Geologist, Judge Steele, attorney for oil company, and Mr. Lincoln of Los Angeles arrived in Lake Arthur Monday. They say that they expect to begin drilling for oil within ten days provided they could get a rig from Stancliff. If not they will be delayed until they can ship a rig.
