

ANOTHER GIRL IS ABDUCTED

PLACED IN AUTO AT DALLAS AND IS TAKEN TO DENISON.

TWO MEN PUT UNDER ARREST

Martha Clem, Fourteen Years Old While Playing With Other Children, Seized by a Couple of Individuals and Spirited Away.

At Dallas Martha Clem, a resident of Mesquite, Dallas county, and fourteen years old, was playing with some other children near the offices of the Clem Lumber company. Her father was in the building attending a business meeting and she was waiting for him when two men drove up in an automobile, threw her into the car and sped away.

The other children, frightened at her screams, immediately called Mr. Clem and he notified the police, Sergean Trammell and other officers made a quick search of the city and officers rushed to the different interurban stations and to the union terminal, as it was feared the child would be taken from the city.

Officers learned two men and a girl had appeared at the interurban terminal depot and bought three tickets for McKinney. Calls were sent to the McKinney officers, but they were too late. At Denison, however, officers were waiting when the car arrived. The two men were arrested and the girl taken to a hotel and shortly returned to Dallas.

Detective DeWitt filed at Dallas affidavits against Floyd Dowell and Jim Davenport, charging them with alsely imprisoning, kidnaping and wilfully detaining Martha Clem. They were taken back to Dallas.

The girl was not harmed.
