A Story of An Intensive Farm

"Rosedale"—A Farm of
Twenty Acres Raises
Everything Known
in Agriculture.

The Conn Farm within Walk-
ing Distance of Post
Office does this.

All Kinds and Varieties of
Grain, Vegetables, Fruit,
Shrub and Flower.

Even the Water Tank
Abounds in Fish for
the family table.

Olive Schreiner once made a reputation and a fortune by writing a book entitled, "The Story of An African Farm." I shall lack a little in both money and reputation of making what Olive did, but am presenting herewith "A Story of an Intensive Farm". I am giving it purely pro bono publico.

One and a quarter miles southwest from the Artesia Post Office, just beyond the city limits, is a tract of land embodying only twenty acres that furnishes a good illustration of the success and profit that accrue from intensive farming when carried on industriously and intelligently. The owner of the place is J. M. Conn, and he raises about all the stuff an ordinary mortal ever heard of; and the source of all his unhappiness and discontent is that he can't think of anything else to raise.

Mr. Conn is a link, elongated, wiry, freckled individual whose appearance and inventive genius would suggest that he might have first seen the light in Androsoggin or Passamaquoddy. He is at once agriculturist, horticulturist, botanist, biologist, bugologist and general insectologist. If there is anything else in this line I have not mentioned, he's that too. His work on his little farm is one part routine and nine parts experimental. Nothing he raises is so good that he is sure there is not something else better, and so a portion of his farm is set aside for what might aptly be termed a private experimental farm.

To illustrate, he is now growing three varieties of millet, nine kinds of cow peas, three kinds of beets, (two and one half acres in all,) three plots of wheat, two of oats, one of six varieties of sugar

cane, six kinds of Indian corn, two of Kaffir corn, two kinds of teppery beans, five kinds of soi beans, besides navy, pinto and butter beans. He has Virginia and Spanish peanuts, squashes, melons, cucumbers and all the common garden vegetables. His tomatoes cover two acres of ground.

Besides this he has all kinds of fruit common to the Pecos Valley, including grapes. He has every variety of evergreen trees, also such uncommon shade trees as olive, rose of Sharon, persimmons, pomegranite, catalpa and umbrella. He declares with Yankee emphasis, that he has 3,500 rose bushes, and if one doubts his statement he asks the doubter to count them. Any way he has an acre and a half of roses of all varieties and colors which would seem to be a plenty for one of modest ambitions.

One would hardly suppose that there would be room or time for stock raising on this little farm, but Poland China hogs enough are raised to net the owner almost \$400 every year, besides a large flock of poultry. All the beets raised are fed to the hogs while there is plenty of corn for a horse, cow and the poultry. Of the latter there are now 125 that will make broilers in September. There are also 25 hives of bees that fare well on the numerous blossoms from vegetables and fruit trees.

While Mr. Conn is a prolific grower of grain and vegetables, as indicated above he has an inborn artistic taste which is in evidence everywhere. Concrete walks, gracefully curved driveways with cobble stone borders, miniature parks adorned with flowers, evergreen trees pruned into fantastic shapes from designs he dreamed out, are the first to catch the notice of the observer. A carefully pruned tamarack hedge runs the whole length of the place on the street side, being just eighty rods long. The trimming of this and other hedges on the place might be considered by some as an onerous task in hot weather, but Mr. Conn trims it as an ante-breakfast play spell.

The water for the farm is supplied by a well 1,200 feet deep which flows 500 gallons per minute and is pumped by Suter power. There is another well near the house 73 feet deep, operated in the same way, which furnishes water for the house, barn and garden. The water as it is pumped from this well discharges into a round concrete tank 18 feet across and holding 381 barrels.

One would naturally suppose the use of a tank would stop when its purpose was served

as a reservoir, but Mr. Conn found that he could not only raise all the fish he wanted for family use but that the fish kept the tank free from moss. The tank contains a few gold fishes but the food fishes are buffalo and suckers. Some of the buffaloes weigh as much as fifteen pounds. When a fish is wanted for a Sunday bake the water is drawn down to a shallow depth. The fishes may then be seen and one of the desired size scooped out with a hand net. The fishes in the tank are fed about a quart of maize about three times a week. No other care is necessary winter or summer as they don't seem to require irrigation.

To raise so much and so many varieties of the same thing on a tract of land of this size not only requires work but some ingenuity and study. Seemingly insurmountable difficulties have been bridged by ingenuity. A minister who could not afford shoes for his horses had to drive every day during winter across a patch of slippery ice. The horses could not keep on their feet while walking across so he taught them to take a running start when approaching the ice then stiffen their legs and slide across. Some of Mr. Conn's schemes are equally ingenious. His crop curriculum has attracted the attention of County Agent Knorr, who sends Mr. Conn every new variety of seed he can procure in order to have it tested out. Mr. Knorr never comes to Artesia without going up to the Conn farm in which he has a deep interest.

I wondered while looking over this wonderful little farm, with its great array of products, its fruit, foliage, shrubbery flowers, its walks, drives and artistic features, how many people in Artesia knew of its existence. Of course every one knows the owner, for his long drawn out form as he paces nervously up and down the street is a familiar figure. But how many know what kind of a place he has and what he is doing on it, and only a mile away—right under their noses, as the saying goes. All who have not seen it should go out and look it over while all these crops are growing. You will receive a hearty welcome and everything will be thoroughly explained by "the guide in attendance." It is not necessary to "tip" the guide for he will feel well recompensed for his trouble by a few simple verbal boquets, and those he is certainly entitled to.

Drowning at Spring Lake

Body of Thomas Kavanaugh
Found Floating in the
Water by Boys while
Swimming

Artesia was plunged into a state of intense excitement last Sunday by the report that the body of a man had been found in Spring Lake about six miles south of town. Some boys entered the lake for a swim when they discovered a strange object floating about in the middle of the lake. One of the boys swam near enough to discover that it was the body of a man, and he was so frightened, or shocked, that he

put back for shore as fast as he could swim.

After the report reached town a regular procession of automobiles, all filled with people, started for the scene of disaster. The body was towed to shore but the chemical effect of the water had made recognition almost impossible. It was finally found to be the body of Thomas Kavanaugh, who was a brother of Mrs. F. L. Wilson, of this place. The identity was finally established by a partially impaired foot. The deceased was partially blind and in a poor state of health, and the secret of his death will probably never be revealed. He was at the Wilson home for the last time on Tuesday preceding the day his body was found, and this fact coupled with the decomposed state of the body would indicate that he was in the lake about five days.

The body was prepared for burial in McClays undertaking parlors and was buried in Woodbine cemetery on Tuesday.

Oil News

Mr. Jas. A. Jones, President of the Home Refinery Company of Oklahoma, arrived in Artesia, Saturday, to make final arrangements for deep drilling work in the Dayton-Lakewood oil field, South-east of Artesia. Before leaving Oklahoma for Artesia, Mr. Jones had \$120,000.00 worth of drilling supplies, casing etc. loaded for shipment to be used in the drilling work here.

The Home Refinery Company is a strong company financially and will be an important factor in the development of the Pecos Valley oil fields.

Two prominent Oklahoma oil men have purchased the Franing 320 and the Williams 200 acres in the Cottonwood oil district. These farms are highly improved places, lying close to Cottoawood Draw in Township 16-25, a few miles N. W. of Artesia, and join the leased acreage that is to be developed by the Jewan Oil Company. This land was sold by Chas. S. Brown, of Okla. City.

A party, consisting of Dr. L. H. Miller and others from the Healdton oil fields of Oklahoma, autoed to Artesia, Friday, to inspect the Pecos Valley oil fields. They expressed themselves as highly pleased with the very favorable oil prospects here.

Eddy and Chaves Counties Get Woman County Agent.

Another important and far reaching step forward in the great campaign for food conservation was taken last week by the Extension Division of the New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts. Most certainly, New Mexico through the agency of the State Agricultural college is doing her share in fulfilling the request of President Wilson in his appeal for food production and conservation. The heads of the Extension Department realizing that it is in the home where the movement for food conservation should begin, have sent out into various districts of the state, women workers to assist the housewife in this work. On June 11, fourteen women, trained experts in home economics left the college for their various stations in the state. All are experienced women in this line of work, and have been chosen because of their efficiency and ability.

They will demonstrate to the women the latest and best methods of canning, preserving, cooking and methods to decrease any possible food waste. The nutrients required by the human body and the manner of preparing a well balanced meal will be taught. In short they will assist the women in any way possible

that a food shortage may be avoided.

Miss Frances Lathrop has been assigned to Eddy and Chaves counties, with headquarters at Roswell. She is now ready to actively carry on the work. If there are any women's organizations in the country that desire her assistance they should write to her at once.

The work which Miss Lathrop is to do will be of immeasurable benefit to the women of the country and it is hoped that they will avail themselves of every opportunity to secure her assistance.
