Oil News

There is much oil activity in evidence up and down the Valley, this week, from Roswell to Lakewood and a very optimistic feeling prevails in local oil circles.

At Roswell the Toltec people are down between 500 and 600 feet in their new well and indications are said to be good.

At Lake Arthur the California people are beginning work on the Moots place, N. W. of town. The Company drilling this well, are connected with the Union Oil Company of California.

The Richfield Oil Company of California have about completed all their lease arrangements etc. and will soon commence active drilling.

At the "Altus" well, S. E. of Artesia, the Home Refinery Company, are down over 800 feet and are setting their first string of casing, which, it is expected, will case off the artesian water from the first oil sand and give a good shallow producer.

Much Needed Labor Bureau Established.

The increase in the average of farm crops in New Mexico has caused a shortage of labor in many Counties of the State. In order to aid in meeting this shortage a State Labor Bureau has been established and is already doing good work. The plan of it's work is simple but effective. The Bureau is headed by Herman R. Crile, the State Farm Labor Specialist with his office at State College, New Mexico. The plan provides for a State organization, a representative for each County and a local representative for each community in every County. The local representatives gather and list the data of the needs of the farmers in their community and also the available labor in their community. They make local adjustments adjustments based upon this information and report the deficit or the surplus of labor to the County Agent. He with the reports from all the communities of his County at hand adjusts the needs of his community and reports the deficit or surplus to the Office of the State Farm Labor Specialist who adjusts the needs of the County and the State.

It is the duty of every farmer in the State to notify his community man at the earliest possible moment how much help he will need and when he will need it. It is likewise the duty of those willing to do farm work as well as those who are now doing that work to notify their community men. This Bureau will do the State a great amount of good if the people it wants to help will help it aid them by giving their entire support and co-operation.

Institute Announcement.

Owing to the scarcity of school funds, we are taking this method to announce the institute for Eddy County for the year 1917.

PLACE

The institute will be held in Carlsbad at the High School building.

TIME

The Institute will begin August 13th, and will continue two weeks.

INSTRUCTORS

The Institute will be conducted by J. H. Vaughan, State College. He will be assisted by F. M. Hatfield, J. B. Taylor, and Mrs. Dorothy White Blue, J. W. Knorr, and Co. Supt. W. A. Poore.

COURSE OF STUDY.

Only the first grade course of study will be given. There will be a number of method courses offered for those who already have certificates. The object will be to make the Institute of real practical value to those who desire to teach successfully. The County Superintendent will give a course in New Mexico School laws, while J. W. Knorr will give practical course in Agriculture.

The course of study is planned in view of the fact that very few teachers in Eddy County desire to attend institute to prepare to take examinations. Ninety per cent of them have certificates or can

obtain them by submitting school credits. The object of the institute then should not be certification; and we believe it should be largely a review of methods in common school subjects, and in High School subjects if there is a sufficient number interested.

EXAMINATIONS

Examinations will be offered at the close of the Institute as usual.

CERTIFICATION

Teachers who desire to know how to obtain a certificate should write the State Superintendent, J. H. Wagner, Santa Fe, N. M. It is a waste of time to write county superintendents of this subject. The same applies to renewals or extensions of certificates. Teachers must have a first grade certificate or better to teach in Eddy County. The County Board of Education has passed a rule that requires a teacher either to have had experience, or if the teacher is inexperienced to have had Normal training of a quality and quantity sufficient to satisfy the board. Also, no teacher will be allowed to teach in any district who is related to any member of the board in that district.

READING CIRCLE WORK

The Reading Circle books required to be read by all first grade teachers for the year 1916-17 are: Charters Teaching the Common Branches, and Graves Students History of Education. These books may be obtained from the Charles H. Field, Co., at Albuquerque.

FEES

The institute fee will be two dollars, and the examination fee will be one dollar.

It is believed that this circular covers all the essential point of information regarding the institute. However this office will gladly supply any additional information that may be necessary.

SELECTIVE DRAFT DRAWN

CAPSULES TAKEN FROM BOWL BY BLINDFOLDED MEN.

ALL DAY AND FAR INTO NIGHT

Purpose to Decide the Order in Which the Men Registered Are to Be Called Upon to Appear Before Local Boards.

Drawing of lots under the selective draft went off at Washington without mishap except for the drawing of one blank, which means that one serial number among the 10,500 assigned to registrants was not drawn. The blank was given number 10,500 in the liability for service list and in rechecking given that place.

Purpose of the drawing was to decide the order in which the men registered would be called upon to appear before the local boards for examination as to their fitness to serve in the national army.

Number of registration districts in the United States is 4,557. Numbers were drawn from a large glass bowl by blindfolded men, who handed them to an announcer, who called out the number and the same was recorded.

Each name drawn called out the man having a like number in every district in the United States. The first number drawn was 258 and all men throughout the United States having that serial number were to be first called to appear before their respective boards for examination.

First army is to number 687,000 men able to serve and without cause for exemption. Estimates of exemptions are made running up to 60 per cent of those called out. If this holds approximately true, then about 1,800,000 men will have to be examined to select the first increment of 687,000 men.

GOODRICH MANAGER PRAISES SOUTHWEST



G. O. Simpson comes from Philadelphia to Manage Southwest Territory for Rubber Company.

KANSAS CITY, MO., July 23rd.—A great deal of history of our great southwest has been made alike by men who came here to seek fortune and by others who were sent here by reason of their capacities for doing big things.

A most significant example of this latter instance is the recent appointment of Mr. G. O. Simpson as manager of the interests of The B. F.
