NEW MEXICO WOOL GROWERS' ASSOCIATION

Albuquerque, N. M., Feb. 4, 1921.—Many questions which strike home to sheepmen of New Mexico will be discussed at the annual convention of the New Mexico Wool Growers' Association in Albuquerque, New Mexico, March 25 and 26, 1921.

H. O. Bursum will speak on "The Future of the Sheep Industry"; W. A. Spence, of Carrizozo, will address the convention on "The Marketing of Wool"; Mr. Frank C. W. Pooler, U. S. District Forester, will talk to the sheepmen relative to "Some Problems in National Forest Grazing Administration."

Mr. Prager Miller, President of the association, in his annual address as President, will be able to tell the sheepmen many things accomplished by the association the past year and of the many things which must be accomplished in the near future for the stabilization of the sheep industry and which must have the support and backing of an organized body of sheepmen.

A "Question Box" will be placed in the convention hall in which all questions pertaining to the sheep and wool industry may be placed. At the close of the afternoon session the last day this box will be opened and all questions answered or discussed. This is thought to be the better way of bringing questions before the sheepmen which might not be brought up by the regular program.

All committee meetings will be held in the office of the association, March 24, 1921, Thursday.

CRIME STATISTICS AND WORK

(Eldorado Times)
The State of New York has been compiling statistics of crime in the hope of tracing its sources, causes and manner of growth, for its alarming increase stands an undisputed fact.

One of the impressive features of the investigation is the ascertained fact that in a list of 2773 women convicted in the criminal courts of the state during the year 1920 but one was a chorus girl. There were on the list 18 stenographers, 4 teachers, 79 cooks and 89 waitresses.

Much surprise has been expressed at this comparison. If it be profitable to attempt an explanation it is possible it may be discovered in the comparatively free life of the chorus girl as compared with the hard grind of the other employments named. This view of it is to some extent borne out by the figures given which apparently increase with the severity of the employment from chorus singing to waiting on table in a restaurant.

There is always danger in an attempt to invest any particular calling or employment with virtue just as there is injustice in condemning another as overburdened with vice. Every calling has its peculiar temptations and tragedies. There are no exceptions. None whatever. Each has its failures, its moral and spiritual victories, its triumphs and its terrible defeats. Every attempt at a separation of the sheep from the goats, the "saints" from the "sinners," has resulted in ludicrous failure. It can't be done. The Pharisees of old tried it and for their hypocritical effort were denounced as whited sepulchers. The modern Pharisee may as well abandon the attempt.

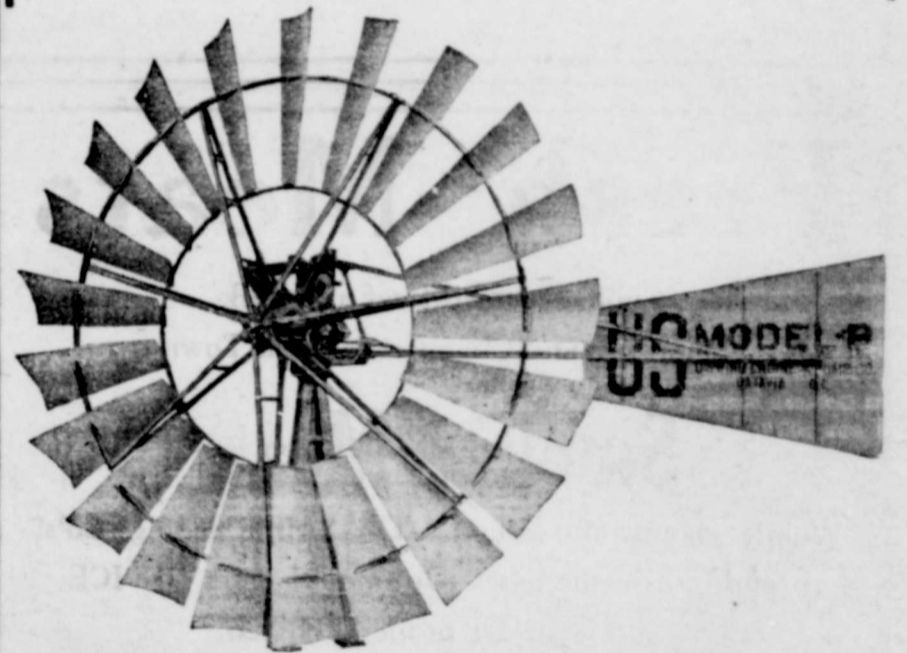
