SCHOOL STARTS SEPTEMBER FIFTH

School will open September 5th. The High School office is open each morning from nine until twelve o'clock for the convenience of pupils and patrons. Examinations and other routine office work are carried on daily.

Freshmen and sophomores are requested to come to High School on September first for enrollment and classification and Juniors and Seniors are requested to come on September second from nine until twelve a. m.

IN FIGHT FOR CIVIC BEAUTY

Commercial Interests of Kansas City Unite for War on Billboards on Boulevards.

The commercial interests of Kansas City have gone on record as enemies of the "uglies."

The city planning and public buildings committee of the chamber of commerce adopted a resolution, taking a definite stand against "the encroachment of either filling stations or billboards on the city's boulevards and homes."

The resolution stated that the chamber members are heartily in accord with and desire to lend their moral support to the joint resolution of the two houses of the council to the effect that filling stations and billboards should not be permitted to destroy the effect of Kansas City's boulevard sys-

After a protracted discussion the committee declared in favor of a "local option" on the uglies. By that was meant that each neighborhood be permitted to decide whether billboards or filling stations should be allowed to locate in that vicinity. The residents whose homes are within view, or within close proximity of the ugly, should have a voice in denying or permitting its location, the committee members believed

Billboards in certain localities are not objectionable if properly constructed and lighted, in the opinion of the committeemen. But their place is not in residence neighborhoods or on boulevards, they agreed.

BUNKER HILL MONUMENT.

THE elevation known as "Bunker Hill" is situated in Charlestown. Boston harbor. On this spot, on June 17, 1775, was fought the famous Battle | the 6th day of September, 1921. of Bunker Hill, between the British and American forces. Here the gratitude and patriotism of the American people have caused to be erected a great granite obelisk as a memorial.

Located in the center of a four-acre square and surrounded by an iron fence, this monument is 221 feet high and 30 feet in diameter at the base. Within the shaft is a circular stairway leading to a chamber, 11 feet in diameter and 17 feet high, at the top, from which is visible a view that thrills the heart of every American, who has been fortunate enough to witness it.

It is an interesting fact that the corner stone was laid by General La-Fayette, a son of glorious France, during his famous visit to America in 1825. The monument was dedicated in 1842, on which occasion Daniel Webster spoke these famous words: "It looks, it speaks, it acts, to the full comprehension of every American mind, and the awakening of glowing enthusiasm in every American heart. pathos, as it brings to our contemplation the 17th of June, 1775, and the consequences which have resulted to us, to our country, and to the world, from the events of that day, and which

MATHEMATICS OF BAD ROADS

Farmer Solves Problem of Hours Lost in Making Trip Over Road That Is Deep in Mud.

If it takes a farmer, making a trip through the mud one hour and a half longer than when the roads are firm, how many hours are fost in a year if 1,000 farmers make an average of 12 trips a month? What would be the monetary loss if each 11/2 hours lost be estimated at 75 cents per hour for each man and his team? This "twoin-one" proposition gave our old cat considerable trouble, but he finally, worked it out thus: One farmer multiplied by 11/2 hours multiplied by 12 trips, multiplied by 1,000 farmers, multiplied by 12 months equals 216,-000 hours lost; going a step further. and multiplying 216,000 by 75 cents, you have \$162,000 per annum lost to the farmers.
