**FROM THE HEALTH OFFICER.**

The epidemic of scarlet fever that has been prevailing here for some time is extending over a period of time that should not be and would not be if more parents of the community would take an interest in protecting their children from an apparently very mild disease. For the information of the public some quotations from an article from the State Health Department are given here:

"Because of the multiplicity of its possible complications and after effects, as well as the frequent severity of the disease itself, scarlet fever has always been one of the most dreaded diseases of childhood. Aside from a mortality ranging from four to thirty per cent, it very often leaves in its wake lifelong disablement of greater or less severity.

Many experiments have demonstrated the infection virus in the secretions of the nose and throat, in the tonsils and in the secretions from various sores. Often it is quite difficult to trace the origin of an outbreak, but it is probable that THE MANY MILD CASES, SOME PRESENTING PRACTICALLY NO SYMPTOMS CONTRIBUTE MOST LARGELY TO THE SPREAD OF THE DISEASE. WHERE THESE MILD CASES HAVE BEEN ISOLATED THE EPIDEMIC HAS SUBSIDED WITH SURPRISING ABRUPTNESS.

As a general rule and CERTAINLY IF SCARLET FEVER IS PREVALENT IN A COMMUNITY, any case presenting a sore throat, however mild, with fever, however slight, should be at least suspected of being SCARLET FEVER and a provisional isolation should be maintained till diagnosis is cleared up. It is better to err on the side of safety to the public. Many epidemics have been caused by neglect of this important principle."

The school children here have been told the important points in this several times, with request to stay at home if feeling ever so little bad and still they come to school with sore throats and even with well developed rashes.

The extremely mild weather has been favorable to the development of light cases, but even these are not immune from the most serious after effects for six weeks to two months.

The school board, the teachers and your health officer join in an urgent appeal to you to help control this disease by seeing that your children do not attend school with any indication at all of the disease.

If you do have it in your family the law requires you to so report to the health officer, and the case must be inspected by the health officer before entering school again. HEALTH OFFICER.

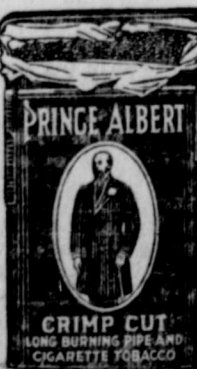



### IS AN OIL WELL A GAS WELL OR AN OIL WELL?

Austin, Texas, Oct. 28.—A hearing was held before the Texas railroad commission on the question as to when is a well a gas or an oil well, a decision which is destined to have an important bearing on the development of oils in the future. The proposition came up over a well owned by the Humble Oil and Refining company, two and a half miles south of Breckenridge, in Stephens county. The well is producing about 300 barrels of oil daily while it is claimed it is wasting over 15,000,000 cubic feet of gas every twenty four hours. On the grounds that it is a gas well and that the gas is being wasted in violation of the oil and gas conservation law, J. W. Haswell, as chief of the oil and gas division of the railroad commission, ordered the well plugged. The Humble company refused to plug the well on the ground that it is an oil well, and appealed to the railroad commission. The commission took the matter under advisement.
