





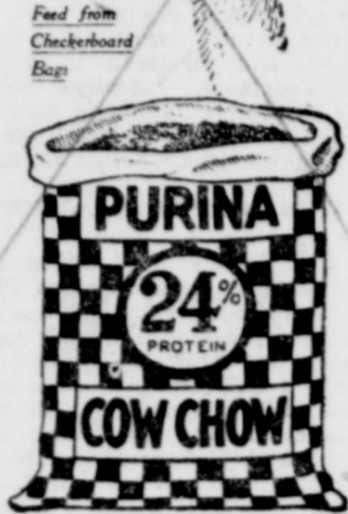

### SPECIAL TO THE ADVOCATE

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 16, 1922—Here in Old Missouri, we are having a cat-and-monkey time over the senatorial election. All the republicans praise Senator James H. Reed, who is running on the democratic ticket, and most of the old line democrats say "Jim Reed is not a good democrat" and will vote against him or stay at home Nov. 7th.

The old line democrats remember that under the mis-rule of Roosevelt and Taft about 6,000 banks closed their doors and that there was at least one year while Woodrow Wilson was at the helm, when not a single bank failed in the whole country. These old timers remember that the G. O. P., Wall Street, Jim Reed and the bankers fought tooth and nail to defeat the Federal Bank Act. The women remember (or should) that Reed wanted them to stay at home and mind the babies and let the men do all the voting. The American Legion laugh now to think that Jim thought Teddy Roosevelt and a volunteer army could whip the Germans, and opposed conscription. The temperance people are up in arms against him for his open fight for the liquor interests, and the Ku Klux Klan is against him on general principles. On the other hand Reed will get the undivided support of the German and pro-German element, and most of the hyphenates; and this takes in the saloon crowds, the riff-raff of the cities, and those who vote as the bosses dictate. He will also get the votes of a large number of republicans who are secretly opposed to a high tariff.

But many of the country democrats who now openly oppose Reed, will halt and hesitate when it comes to casting a vote for a republican for U. S. Senator, to hold office six years, and uphold the present high tariff. Those that do their own thinking will note that the steel trust, the glass trust, the sugar trust and all the "interests" are now getting back the millions they so cheerfully put up for Gen. Leonard Wood, Lowden, Harding and the Old Guard administration. Mr. Wilson wanted "free sugar" while the new tariff is 2 1-2 cents a pound. He pointed out that we produce only 5 to 10 per cent of our own sugar many years, and that a tariff to "protect American labor" was a joke, since the labor was performed by Kanakas, Porto Ricans, Chinks and Japs in the islands where the raw sugar came from. The consumption of sugar in the United States has increased to 90 pounds per capita, so the head of a good sized family, as he votes, must consider that he is paying nearly a dollar a month for his "sugar protection."

But in California, where I was born and raised they roll up staggering majorities for Sammy Shortridge and El Johnson. All they want is a very high tariff on currants, raisins, citron, olives, figs, nuts, mustard, oranges, lemons, grape fruit, honey, hops, dried and canned fruits, or any little thing they raise. If a man down in New Mexico wants a mince pie, or any luxury of the table, let him pay for it. He should live in California. The fact that these orchards and vineyards net their owners fortunes every year—that \$1,000 to \$5,000 per acre is not unusual in a good year cuts no figure with Native Sons. But the voter in the middle west who pays \$1 a dozen for scrub oranges and sixty cents a dozen for poor lemons may do a little thinking with his voting.

Up in Washington we have Senator Poindexter, who started out as a progressive and wound up a moss-back. All they ask in Washington is a good round tariff on lumber and shingles. If a farmer in New Mexico wants to build a barn, let him pay the extra cost, for the "good of the country." This policy will keep Miles Poindexter in office for some time.

In Idaho they will probably retain Billy Borah in office. He is a radical, independent thinker, who acts on his own convictions, and is not popular with the leaders of his own party. He is wrong more often than right and always stubborn, right or wrong. They want more tariff on wool up in Idaho, with the mistaken idea that a high tariff will bring high prices. That was exploded twenty years ago. Our short wool will never make high class blankets or clothing, and as long as we have to import the long staple to mix with our shorter wool, woolen prices will be higher and the voter will pay the bills. From Montana comes Senator Walsh, a democrat, a patriot, and a real statesman, but I cannot say as much for Walsh of Massachusetts. There is nothing much to protect in Montana. Senator Key Pittman of Nevada is brainy, honest and forceful—a rare combination for the senate. Gilbert Hitchcock of Nebraska can always be found fighting for the good of the whole country.

A really good democrat, I suppose should extol all of the U. S. Senators elected by his party. Most of those I have mentioned I know personally, and judging the others by their public acts and votes, I am free to say that I do not care for senators Shields, Broussard, Calloway, Walsh of Massachusetts, Reed, Stanley and a few others and would not vote for any of them.

Now I do not know Senator A. A. Jones of New Mexico personally but I do know his record, and it is flawless. I would like to be home in New Mexico this fall to cast a vote for him. He deserves the vote of every man and woman in New Mexico, who has the good of the whole country at heart. He will stand shoulder to shoulder with Key Pittman, Gilbert Hitchcock, Walsh of Montana and a few of the faithful, battling for the rights of the major-

ity, against special privilege and greedy favorites of fortune.

And I want to tell the farmers far and near, that the tariff on wheat did not help prices any. The "Emergency tariff" on wheat disrupted the business along a 3,000 mile border, and gave the railroads the "long haul" at increased freight rates. Ten thousand car loads every week go across a continent into Winnipeg. We saw thousands of cars of wheat go to Galveston after they put the tariff on, where it rotted and sprouted on side tracks for lack of storage and shipment. We once ground the good wheat of Canada in our mills and sold the flour at home and abroad, as we exported our poorer grades. With a crop of over 800,000,000 bushels coming on we have no markets for it.

Canadian wheat is 12 to 14 cents cheaper than ours, and of a better grade. They are shipping 5 to 10 million bushels per week abroad. We simply handed our big export business over to our northern neighbor. For every bushel of hard wheat we bought from Canada, we could have exported a bushel of poorer quality, and that is what I call "good tradin'". Just as an illustration of what a tariff will do to wheat, let me cite a personal experience. Wheat had been over \$3.00 a bushel without a tariff. In 1920 it "came on" at \$2.73 here in Kansas City. When they put a tariff on for a year, it was ranging from \$1.50 to \$1.60. Grain prices took a tumble from Sept. 10, 1921, and wheat was soon as low as 90 cents for futures in Kansas City. Then there came a gradual recovery. One afternoon just as the grain exchange was about to close, I read in the afternoon paper that President Harding had decided to "extend the emergency bill" for a year. Like mad I tore for a telephone and called up a sporty bank president, "Sell 50,000 wheat QUICK," I yelled. "All right," came the answer, "I guess you know what you are doing."

The following day the board of trade here was closed on account of the American Legion parade, but Chicago was open. It was about the first day of November, 1921. May wheat, Chicago, opened at 1.13 and we had sold 60,000 at 1.12 3-4. In an hour it was 1.12—by ten o'clock 1.11—by noon 1.10 and then like a ton of brick it came—9, 8, 7, 6. The next two days saw it around \$1.03 with Kansas City again below 90 cents for December.

We made a few thousand dollars, but that decline cost the American farmer fully fifty millions. Now I claim to be an expert on wheat prices and futures. Hundreds of people trade on my advice. Hard boiled brokers here heed what I tell them. So I am going to make a public forecast for the benefit of farmers at large. Time will show that I am right.

Wheat, rye, oats and corn will advance, with the usual fluctuations. In the middle of November they will drop. In December wheat will be low. It will get worse around the holidays and be very bad the fore part of January. But if the farmer will hold his wheat until the first part of February, or even into March, he will get at least 25 cents a bushel more for it, and possibly 50 cents. And when the time comes I am going to publish in The Advocate, the exact day that the upturn will start down again. The proof of the pudding is the eating.

Mr. H. J. Hagerman, president of the Taxpayers Association says: "But, irrespective of details it is the tone, the trend in the course of public affairs, and its results which an administration is ultimately to be held responsible for. What has actually been the trend, the tone of our recent state administration and of the dictators of the "Republican" policies in New Mexico as regards the all important questions of retrenchment of public expenditures and lower taxes." Here is the Trend of the "so called" State levy, three fifths of which goes back to the counties for roads, schools, etc:

Levy 1919	5.75 mills	Levy 1920	5.25 mills
Levy 1921	5.00 mills	Levy 1922	4.50 mills

Here is the trend of the Highway Levy, all of which is returned to the counties by which it is paid in: Levy 1920, 4.50 mills. Levy 1921, 3.00 mills. Levy 1922, 2.50 m.

Happened to invite a number of Independents to the Picture Show in Carlsbad and requested them to join in loud demonstration when Mr. Waller's slide (not next Tuesday's slide) was flashed upon the screen in order to try and get him into the popularity contest in this campaign

Even the children saw through this crude affair. We wonder if this same attempt was made upon the Artesia and Hope people? The chosen few don't seem to be in their usual running condition this time as they fumbled things again when they let Commissioner G. R. Howard refuse to allow the Independents any of the election judges. The people are finding out that they have the right to resent unfair practice like refusing to recount the ballots under their own promulgated rules.

### SOME OF THE CHOSEN FEW

Have let the information leak out that if the votes had been recounted, Mr. Waller would have been fourth in the race for sheriff. The good people of Eddy county are now going to sit in final judgment on appeal. The chosen few are not willing to confess their sins before the altar of the people,

### BUT

Are verbally promising an eleventh hour exposure of the leaders of the Independent party. To do this they will have to publish about ninety per cent of the names of voters in Eddy county, as this thing is being done by the people themselves this time.

### HOW MANY

of the voters had a visit from the agents of the chosen few last week concerning registration and did these celebrities ask how you were going to vote and tell you that you could not vote unless you signed their cards? **MR. RICKMAN** has never told us about that cattle assessment yet, but Mr. Reed of the Argus used a left handed method last week in trying to square Mr. Rickman through Mr. Gray. Why did Mr. Reed fail to tell the people **HOW MANY CATTLE WERE RENDERED IN THE TEXAS TAX RECEIPT HE SAW?** Here is the record evidence as shown in Eddy county and the tax payers can now draw their own conclusions: A chattel mortgage was filed which Mr. Rickman joined in No. 8603 to The Western Cattle Loan Co. on 1200 head of cattle in the sum of \$33,796.04. Why did not Mr. Reed also tell the people how much government domain these cattle may range upon out there? The subterfuge of mentioning his state lease alone in New Mexico is no answer at all. Lot one and the north half of lot three in block sixty-seven Lowe addition to Carlsbad is assessed at \$1870 for the year 1920. This is where Mr. Rickman lives. Ask our very courteous and efficient County Treasurer, Mr. Aud Lusk, to show you the tax records, and compare this valuation with that placed on your own property and you will perhaps understand what Mr. Rickman meant in his official announcement for commissioner when he told you how well informed he was about the affairs of the tax payers. Will Mr. Rickman tell us whether he has always recorded tax sale certificates which he bought so that the original owner could know when he was likely to lose his property? There are two classes of people in Eddy county, the tax payer and the tax eater. Let's put tax payers in office for awhile. **JOHN T. BOLTON**, candidate for commissioner, is a solid citizen, a tax payer and made Carlsbad one of its most efficient postmasters and is one of the best business men in Eddy county, having lived in the county for many years.

**DEAN SMITH** was born and raised in Eddy county and is one of our most successful combined farmer and stockman. The U. S. government, recognizing his ability, placed him in charge of one of the aviation training camps during the World War. ### SHALL THE PEOPLE RULE?

(Political Advertisement)  
When we, the people, of Eddy County, cast our ballot on election day, let us,

**REMEMBER**

That in Eddy County there are hundreds of voters, principally Spanish-Americans who did not know how to mark their ballots and these ballots were marked by election judges and in many instances these voters did not signify how they wanted to vote and they were not asked how they wanted to vote but they were voted just the same.

**REMEMBER**  
That under our Constitution and our laws, no man, is entitled to cast more than one vote.

**REMEMBER**  
That at the late primary election in Carlsbad precinct which is by far the largest in the county, one election judge was betting money on Mr. Waller and a large portion of the election judges over the County were vitally interested in his nomination.

**REMEMBER**  
That after Mr. Reed, the editor of the Argus, had pursuant to Mr. Batton's request, printed a large number of sample ballots for Mr. Batton, and that after Mr. Batton had circulated these ballots among his many friends and had explained to them to place an X in the square opposite his name, that the county chairman, just before the primary election countermanded his order for similar ballots and had the ballots for the primary printed with the scratch system.

**REMEMBER**  
That Mr. Batton received enough votes in the Carlsbad precinct alone to have elected him, had the ballots which contained an X opposite his name been counted.

**REMEMBER**  
That these ballots were not counted; not withstanding the law is, and democratic rules and democratic principles require that nothing more than the clear intent of the voter be shown.

**REMEMBER**  
That the county committee, by their own written rules, guarantee to any candidate a recount of ballots, upon written request of such candidate, and by such written rules they pledge themselves to the people to recount the ballots under such circumstances.

**REMEMBER**  
That Mr. Batton, who had been defeated by only five votes, made written request to the committee for a recount, but the request was promptly denied by the committee; and it was then that the people's representatives, by favoring the few against the many did not only break their written guarantee to Mr. Batton but they broke their pledge to the people whom they represented.

**REMEMBER**  
That all law, justice and fair play demands that no few people have a right to request the people to keep a pledge, when they themselves break the faith.

**REMEMBER**  
That this committee appoints its

own chairman, who in turn appoints primary election judges and that our whole primary system rests upon the good faith of the chairman and the committee; the committee at the last primary in this precinct was elected by about 40 voters, the other remaining six or seven hundred voters, had no notice, and did not vote for committeemen and thus it is that they have perpetuated themselves in office for years.

**REMEMBER**  
That the nomination of candidates, by a county convention, at the same time our delegates to state conventions are chosen; that delegates to county conventions are chosen at precinct conventions; the people by all means are entitled to sufficient notice to participate in and our governmental affairs; our precinct convention in Carlsbad was called for 7:30 o'clock Friday night. The county convention was called for 11:00 o'clock the following morning and the notice of this convention was published in the press late Friday afternoon of the same day; a few people having we presume, notice of these meetings, met and selected their delegates to the county convention for the following morning and there they ratified the nomination of candidates and selected delegates to our state convention.

**THEY SAY**, that the people, should settle their differences in primaries, before their committees and in conventions.

We believe the people's answer will echo from the polls on November 7th, and say why do you not notify us and give us a voice in the counsel of the favored few? And why did you not count the votes?

**REMEMBER**  
That the people having no notice and no voice in their own government, the only way the people have to correct such evils is to vote the INDEPENDENT TICKET.

Failure to vote the Democratic candidates into office would mean you approved a continuance of the Republican mis-management.
