That it is hereby proposed to amend Section 14 of Article 11 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, said article being entitled "Bill of Rights," so as to read as follows: "Sec. 14. No person shall be held to answer for a capital, felonious or infamous crime unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury or information filed by a District Attorney or Attorney General or their deputies, except in cases arising in the militia when in actual service in time of war or public danger.

**SEVENTH ANNUAL CLUB
CONTEST HELD AT N.
M. A. & M. COLLEGE**

San Juan, De Baca, and San Miguel
Counties Have the Honor of Win-
ning Grand Championships

At the seventh annual club contest of county demonstration and livestock judging teams, held October 14-16, at the New Mexico Agricultural College, the following teams were chosen as grand champions in their respective divisions: San Juan county, girl's work, demonstration of drying garments; De Baca county, garden, crops, poultry and miscellaneous division, demonstration of poultry culling; San Miguel county, livestock judging. These teams will have the privilege of representing New Mexico at the Western Livestock Show, held at Denver this year.

The Santa Fe railroad prize of a trip to the National Club Congress at Chicago for the champion boy or girl doing crops or livestock work in each of the five counties accomplishing most in these projects during the club year went to Lea, Curry, San Miguel, De Baca and Roosevelt counties. A similar prize offered by the Rock Island Railroad went to Harding and Quay counties.

The most outstanding girl in home economics work in the state, who will receive the prize, offered by Montgomery Ward & Co., of a trip to the National Club Congress has not yet been chosen. The prize of five dollars for the county displaying the best banner on its auto went to Curry county.

The state champion teams in the various lines of work put on at the contest were cooking, Harding county; canning, Curry county; clothing, Chaves county; millinery, San Miguel county; home furnishing, De Baca county; poultry, Chaves county; horticulture, Grant county; crops, Quay county; miscellaneous group, Hidalgo county.

The judges of the girls' work were Miss Madge Reese, field agent, extension service, Washington, D. C., Mrs. W. L. Elser, former state club leader, and Miss Sara Kerr, county extension agent, Roosevelt county. The judges of the boys' work were G. R. Quesenberry, extension agronomist, A. L. Walker, College poultryman, W. T. Conway, College agronomy department, and Orren Beaty, county extension agent, Lea county. The judges of the livestock judging were Dr. Hurst, livestock specialist, O. C. Cunningham, head of the College dairy department, J. L. Lantow and M. G. Snell, of the animal husbandry department.

At the contests this year twenty-one counties were represented with demonstration and livestock judging teams, and there was a total attendance of over two hundred members, county workers and chaperons. During the three days, sixty-three demonstrations were given of work in crops, gardens, poultry, canning, cooking, sewing, millinery, home furnishing and other farm and home practices. At the College barns, teams of livestock judging boys were busy with rings of cattle, sheep and hogs.

At the barracks the exhibits of work done by the juniors were on display. These included excellent examples of canning, sewing, millinery, garden produce and crops.

The New Mexico College of Agriculture entertained the encampment for three days in a very competent manner. Tours were made of the horticultural and poultry farms, and of the various College departments. Tuesday evening a moving picture show was held for the visitors in Hadley Hall; Wednesday evening the Agricultural and Home Economics Clubs of the College entertained, and Thursday afternoon a tour of Mesilla Valley was made, winding up with a picnic on the mesa. Thursday evening the announcement of winning teams and presentation of prizes took place in Hadley Hall. Among the speakers of the evening were W. A. Floyd, in charge Western division, extension service; Miss Madge Reese, Miss Isabel Eckles, state superintendent of schools, President Kent and Director Monroe.

This year both the demonstrations and exhibits aroused very favorable comment from judges and visitors, and the general feeling was that it was the "best contest ever." If everyone in the state could witness the practical and efficient manner in which these youngsters conducted demonstrations of up-to-date farm and home practices, the value of extension work among juniors would be sold in New Mexico.

STATE BRIEFS

**ROOSEVELT COUNTY TO
HARVEST BUMPER CROP
OF SWEET POTATOES**

PORTALES.—Due to the heavy rains which have fallen over a large part of Roosevelt county during the past few weeks, it is now believed that a bumper crop of sweet potatoes will be harvested all over the county. The recent rain showed a total of over one inch of precipitation and interfered with the harvesting of the crop but it will more than make up for this in helping to mature the late fields. In some parts of the county the crop is running from 200 to 300 bushels to the acre and a few small fields will run higher than this. The rain also did much for the pastures and it is the belief of the farmers that the winter feed and grazing is now assured.

**LOST CREEK MINING CO.
INSTALLED NEW MACHINE
TO SAVE PLACER GOLD**

HILLSBORO.—The Lost Creek Mining company, operating near this city, has installed a new machine at the mine for the saving of the placer gold, so that in the future there will be practically no loss in the working of the ores. The machine is driven by a gas engine and not only saves the gold but also separates it from the black sand in which the precious metal is found. The sand will be shipped to the refineries as a by-product of the mines. Reports are that the mine is now on a paying basis and is developing into one of the best propositions of the kind in this section of the state.

**CATTLE SHIPMENTS IN
SEPTEMBER BROKE ALL
RECORDS FOR THE YEAR**

ALBUQUERQUE.—September proved to be the record month for the year in the shipping of cattle from New Mexico, over 72,000 being shipped according to the report of the Cattle Sanitary board. The number shipped from the various districts are as follows:
Springer, 3,611; Clayton, 3,970; Tucumcari, 8,403; Alamogordo, 4,568; Deming, 6,238; Albuquerque, 2,076; Rincon, 2,385; Carlsbad, 4,491; Lovington, 3,476; Portales, 14,335; Cimarron, 419; Vaughn, 3,207; Columbus, 3,507; Silver City, 2,625; Jal, 1,364; Roy, 604; Amistad, 1,962; and from other districts not listed above 370.

Most of them went to the middle western states where they will be fed during the winter.

**ABOUT SENDING ANIMAL
HEADS TO THE LABORATORY**

Animal heads sent to the State Public Health Laboratory must be packed in a water-tight container, and this in turn packed in a bucket of ice. Do not kill the animal by hitting it on the head or shooting through the head. Neglect of these things has ruined more than one specimen.

The Laboratory received recently a dog's head wrapped in newspaper and packed in a pasteboard box. The brain was decomposed and worthless for direct examination.

Furthermore, the doctor who mailed a specimen in that kind of package was liable to a heavy penalty under the federal law.

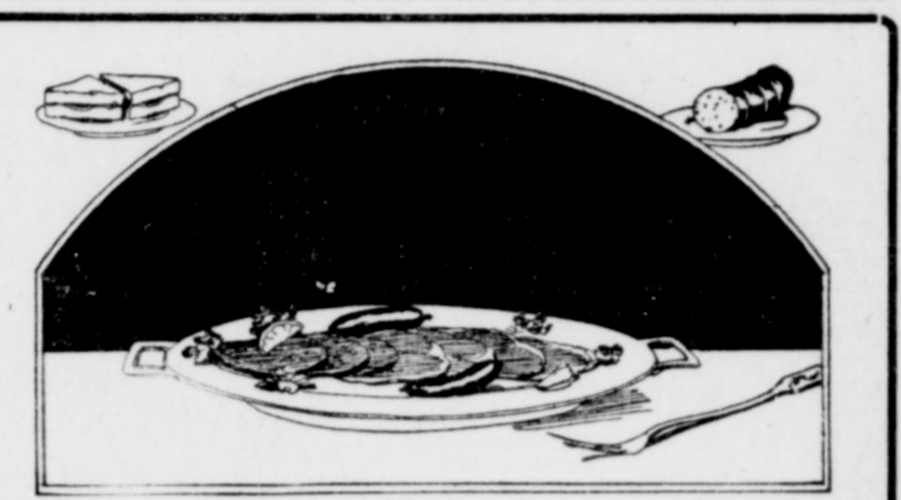
