# POLAND MEANS TO CLEAN UP

Bathing people by law-making Saturday night a legal observance at least once a month-is the latest step taken by Poland, according to recent news reports, in an attempt to elevate the living standards and general health of the people. Only children under two, and persons over sixty-five, are to be exempted from the new law which goes into effect next New Year's.

Truly public opinion has swung a long way since the 18th century ordinances right here in the early days of the United States, forbidding baths except at certain periods of the year unless a doctor prescribed them. It may not be generally known that laws and regulations actually requiring bathing are now in effect in this country. In certain states and cities the health department requires persons using public swimming pools to bathe before entering. In more general force is the law of social opinion. This goes far beyond the Polish law, for baths have to be more than monthly, more than weekly, to accord with the requirements of good manners and good form.

AUTOMOBILE PARKING IS VITAL TO BUSINESS

The parking situation is a serious problem to every

city, town and village in the country. It is not always the fault of the present generation that many communities have horse and buggy thoroughfares and seldom can an increas in parking space in the business section be created fast enough to keep up with the ever-increasing number of automobiles. At the same steer, the more economical will be its time, the amount of retail business done in a community use of feed. 



# For Your Information on the same New Bogus or Hot Check Law

The recent session of the legislature enacted a new law making it a felony to draw, utter or deliver a check on any bank or other depository in which there are no funds or insufficient funds for the extend the new making \$1.00 Ease Roy ditch extends the new making \$1.00 Ease Roy ditch extends \$1.00 Ease Roy di the payment of the check. The new law carried the emergency clause and therefore is now in full force and effect. The text of the law follows:

To amend Section 1 of Chapter 132, New Mexico Session Laws of 1919, being an act prohibiting the making, drawing, uttering or delivering of any fraudulent check, draft or order for making and providing punishment. and providing punishment therefor.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico: Section 1. That section 1 of Chapter 13 of the Session Laws of 1929 be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. Any person who, with intent to defraud, shall P. MAY BUIL make, draw, utter or deliver any check, draft or order for the payment of money upon any bank or other depository in payment of any account, knowing at the time of such making, drawing, uttering or delivering, that the maker or drawer has not sufficient funds in or credit with such bank or other depository for the payment of such check, draft or order, is guilty of larceny, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not more than five thousand dollars, or imprisoned for not more than five years, or both such fine and imprisonment.

"In the prosecution under this section as against the maker or drawer thereof, the making, drawing, uttering or delivery of a check, draft or order payment of which is refused by the drawee because of lack of funds or credit, shall be prima facie evidence of intent to defraud and of knowledge of insufficient funds in or credit with such bank or other depository."

3. That state and local health officers should take the initiative in promoting the reporting of cases by physicians and institutions;

4. That local health officers be requested to secure more complete and accurate reporting in their respective

5. That the success of reporting tuberculosis depends upon the sympathetic support of the medical profes-

6. That the subject of the reporting of tuberculosis cases be represented to state and local medical societies, asking for their cooperation and support.

Statistics show that tuberculosis is on the decline. Annual death rates in 1900 averaged 200 per 100,000 population in the registration area of the U.S. A., the rate became 87 in 1926 and 80.8 in 1927, and tuberculosis from being the chief cause of death has gradually been pushed downward until in 1926 it occupied fifth place on the list.

Some statisticians think it is not too much to expect that tuberculosis will so continue to decline that the disease will soon be a matter of history. WASHINGTON, D. C .- J. F. Zimmerman, president of the University of New Mexico, yesterday laid before Secretary Wilbur a proposal that a portion of public lands in New Mexico be turned back to the state for the use of the public schools.

Under the plan the government would retain all mineral rights in the lands but all surface products would go to the support of public

Secretary Wilbur said after the conference that the plan had many features which might be of great benefit but that it involved a new policy on the part of the general land office and the government's handling of public land. It is his intention to give the matter considerable thought and to bring it to the attention of other government of-

If such a plan were put into effect in New Mexico, other states with public lands would have the right to ask the same privilege.
