

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

To this figure the Crop Re_ porting Board added an estimated number of 4,456 bales for the amount of New Mexico grown cotton that was ginned in Texas.

The yield per acre in 1927 for New Mexico was more than for any other state, and amounted to 352 pounds, compared with 340 pounds for California, and 315 for Arizona. In 1928 the yield for New Mexico averaged 360 pounds, but the California crop averaged 378 pounds, which places New Mexico second in yield per acre among the cotton producing

The acreage of cotton in Dona Ana county in 1927 was estimated at 42,000, and the number of bales (including the Texas ginned cotton) amounted to 34,000. In 1928 the acreage for this county was estimated at 53,000 and the production at 53,-000 bales. Thus the acreage for Dona Ana county was increased by 11,000 and the number of bales by 19,000 over the 1927 estimate.

Eddy county had 37,000 acres, compared with 32,000 in 1927. Its production was estimated at 18,000 bales, compared with 21,000 bales in 1927.

Chaves county picked 14,000 bales from 20,000 acres last year, while in 1927 it harvested 12,000 bales from 15,000 acres.

STAY SAYS FORD

WASHINGTON, D. C. - Henry Ford wants to see the prohibition laws enforced rather than modified. That was the burden—as far as he let it be known afterward, at any rate, of his luncheon conversation with President Hoover Friday at the White House.

"Prohibition is here to stay," he told newspaper men as he emerged from the White House. "Prohibition must be enforced. There can be no turning back. I do not believe the people of the country want modifi-

Replying to questions, he also expressed the opinion that the Deisel type engine had not been sufficiently developed for him to consider their use in airplanes and automobiles. He said he thuoght the gasoline engine being much cleaner, was better suited to automobiles and the oil burning though cheaper to operate, were too heavy as now developed for use in airplanes.

His visit to the White House followed a successful hunt in the old city of Alexandria, Virginia, near Washington, for early American antiques to add to his Dearborn, Michigan, collection. Browsing and de-liberating at great length, he purchased two Betty lamps, once owned by a niece of General Robert E. Lee; a pair of bronze vases; a banjoshaped barometer said to be more than 200 years old; a colonial sideboard; a ladder-backed chair; a brass bell, a melofion of the Civil War period, and an album.





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
