The following issues are among the problem areas listed by Muleshoe Area Hospital District CEO Jason Anglin as reasons for the operational review at Park View Nursing Care Center:

- Pressing cash flow issues.
- The need to transfer \$5,000 to meet payroll.
- Delinquency of loan payments to Muleshoe State Bank.
- Payment due on the nursing home's loan with First Bank, and insufficient funds in the nursing home's account to make the payment.
- Food vender would not deliver supplies without payment.
- Former food, pharmaceutical and medical supply venders threatening civil action.
- An accounts payable balance of \$230,330.58, with \$113,282 more than 120 days past due.
- A negative cash flow each month.


Cotton's comments...

The following response was received from Chris Cotton, administrator of Park View Nursing Care Center, concerning the issues raised in support of operational

"I have been aware for months that the revenue has been coming in incredibly slow from both Medicaid and Medicare. We have been working for months to rectify this issue and had been unable to do so when certain bills came due.

About a month ago I became aware that we weren't going to be able to rectify the situation on our own and were going to need to seek outside help for the billing and payment issues we were facing. I began looking for a third party consultant and auditing company to take a look at our overall operations.







2009 Property Tax Rates in the CITY OF MULESHOE

This notice concerns 2009 property tax rates for the CITY OF MULESHOE. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's *rollback* tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value. This notice contains a summary of actual effective and rollback tax rates' calculations.
