

TRAIN WITH TELEPHONES TRIED OUT 20 YEARS AGO

One of the earliest den instrations of the use of the telephone on a moving railroad train in this country was made over twenty years ago when the special train of the Chamber of Commerce trade extension excursionists from Pittsburgh was equipped with telsphones.

This was in September, 1903. Telephones were installed in each car and the members of the party were enabled to communicate with each other on the train, although in different cars and while the train was in motion. Connection was also established when the train stopped at various places en route, including Parkersburg, W. Va., Canal Dover, O., etc. The members of the Chamber of Commerce were able to converse from their individual Pullmans to their homes

surplus alfalfa producing states of the west, including New Mexico, that have produced alfalfa hay as a cash crop for many years, did not change materially in the six year period ending in 1928. Those who buy alfalfa hays are becoming more critical in their demands for quality hay. They are coming more and more to specify those types or qualities of alfalfa that have been shown by test to make the best feed.

Buyers may rest assured that alfalfa of good quality will be delivered when they specify those U. S. grades of alfalfa that are best suited to dairy feeding. Those grades include U. S. No. 1 or 2 extra leafy alfalfa, U. S. No. 1 alfalfa or U. S. No. 2 leafy alfalfa. The shipper should be asked to attach a complete federal hay inspection certificate to the invoice.

Abundant supplies of the top grades of alfalfa are not always available in some years or seasons. Alfalfa buyers should recognize the fact that greater quuntities of U.S. No. 2 and No. 3 alfalfa are produced on American farms than of the top grades of alfalfa, and that such grades as U. S. No. 2 green, U. S. No. 2, or U. S. No 3 leafy alfalfa are important commercial grades representing sound hay of good feeding quality, though not so desirable for dairy feeding as the higher grades.

Alfalfa prices during recent years have been relatively higher than for ohtre classes of hay. The past two crop years, prices of No. 1 alfalfa hay with the best leafy types bring ing substantial premiums over the ordinary grades. This season the general upward trend in alfalfa has continued. Prices during March reached the highest point in five years and nearly \$3.00 above the high point of last year.

Those who are growing this hay for market should make every effort to produce high quality hay to meet the growing demand for dairy alfalfa. It is there that the greatest profit lies in growing alfalfa hay.

A happy phrase is sometimes coined, so humanly expressive that barriers of language are swept aside and like music it becomes a universal

To the French we are indebted for such an expression, "esprit de corpa" which our English tongue has adopted and naturalized because it viualizes, as no idiom of our own does, the essence of co-operation.

"Esprit de corps" is the common spirit pervading men associated in bus-ness or social activity, implying sympathy, enthusiasm, devotion and jealous regard for the honor of the body as a whole.

In concrete form it symbolizes the story of co-ordinated effort that he gradually raised humanity from the brutish isolation of history's dave to the intensive inter-relations of today's high civilization.

lives do they transcend the narrow bounds of selfishness and become social beings, for it brings into action forces potent to lift men's thoughts from their own petty affairs to the contemplation of wider

Of this great co-ordinating emotion each of the component factors-sympathy, enthusiasm, devotion and jealous regard for honor—taken separately would be sufficient to elevate standards of conduct; taken together, they are the stuff that wins forlorn hopes, founds empired and conquers the world.

A great business is very much like the human body, many different parts working together in close harmony. A task of real importance devolves upon each one of us—so to imbue out associates by precept and example with "esprit de corps" and all that it implies that we may work together as a great harmonious whole for the common welfare which, in the end, must be for the greatest good of each.
